A life on the ocean wave (part two)

Peter Grindal - village person

On being promoted to Commander in 1977, Peter took command of the frigate *Zulu*. She was based at Rosyth, but, as well as Fleet duties in the North Sea and North Atlantic, she took part in a seven-month deployment to the Far East and Australia, exercising with every friendly navy on the way. Following a staff course at the National Defence College in 1979, he returned to Dartmouth as the Training Commander, and in 1982, as he was doing some refresher courses before joining the aircraft carrier *Hermes*, the Falklands war began. He spent most of the conflict in the Operations Centre in the Ministry of Defence, and then finally joined *Hermes* as the Commander (second in command) at Ascension Island on her way home. So he missed the war but got the welcome home!

After ridding herself of South Atlantic rust, *Hermes* spent much of the following year on NATO exercises off Norway and in the North Atlantic, and visiting the USA. Peter was then promoted to Captain, and mouldered at a MoD desk for two and a half years before thankfully returning to sea in command of a squadron of eight frigates, one of which was his own, *Ariadne*. For three months she was the West Indies Guardship and took part in disaster relief in Jamaica after devastating storms. She then went to the Arabian Gulf where Peter was in charge of the patrol protecting British shipping during the Iran-Iraq conflict.

In 1987 he returned ashore to command the training establishment HMS *Raleigh* at Torpoint, Cornwall, which gave initial training to all ratings joining the Navy, and two years later, although based ashore in Plymouth, he began a sea appointment as Commodore Amphibious Warfare. As well as directing amphibious warfare policy and training in close coordination with the Royal Marines, this also included command of British amphibious forces and, in NATO, of the United Kingdom-Netherlands Amphibious Task Group, and for this he was awarded the CBE. That, however, was the end of his naval career.

On retiring, he was recruited to be the Captain of the Sea Cadet Corps, a nautical youth organisation of 400 units around the UK. He also became Chief Executive of the parent national charity, the Sea Cadet Association. Although based in London, he travelled widely to visit units and attend regattas, sports days and conferences, and he led the reorganisation of the charity. Exhausted after four years, he retreated to work part-time at home for the

Association for two years. He then retired properly in 1996.

He had bought a flat in Bath some years earlier, having friends there and finding it an attractive and geographically-convenient base, and became involved with Bath Abbey as a sidesman, a member of the PCC, and, despite having no musical talent, Chairman of the Bath Abbey Music Society, which he still is. He also began work on his *magnum opus*, a weighty tome on the history of the naval campaign against the Atlantic slave trade from 1807 to 1865. This sounds like a specialist subject on 'Mastermind', and is still a work in progress!

His settled bachelor existence was turned upside down in 2005 when, in Bath Abbey, he married Julie, and, to his delight, acquired two step-children, Francesca and Alexander. Julie, a lawyer with long experience in criminal defence, was then working for the Crown Prosecution Service in Bristol. Both she and Peter are from farming stock, New Zealand in Julie's case, and they both wanted to move to the country. Julie needed to travel daily into Bristol and Peter wanted to stay in touch with Bath, and Olveston, a "proper village", was ideally placed for them. They were overjoyed to find the perfect house on the Green, and living here has fulfilled all their expectations. They walk a great deal, some of it long-distance, sailed a small yacht until recently off Cornwall, and have been travelling widely. Peter is a sidesman at St Mary's, and, if only he could finish his book, would like to return to his watercolour painting.

Action to address Olveston School traffic problems June Lyons & Caroline Brewser

Everyone who lives in the village will be familiar with the congestion around the area of the Church and School every weekday morning and afternoon. As part of its Travel Plan, the School wants to address this problem for the benefit of the children, parents and other villagers alike.

The School has done much over recent years to encourage local parents to walk their children to school, and has arranged parking places around the village, where those travelling from further afield can park to walk the final stretch. Most parents say they like to walk to and from school if they have the opportunity. But many will tell you how dangerous the walk between the village and the school can be, especially around 9am. This is why many parents still choose to drive.

Traffic moves along the main road very quickly (particularly from the direction of Aust, but also leaving the village), and pedestrians crossing the road near the Church cannot easily be seen, and cannot see the approaching traffic. Cars are usually parked legally around the junction, but even so they block the line of sight in both directions. Near-misses where small children are almost knocked over are a regular occurrence here.

The problem has worsened significantly over the years with the increase in traffic travelling through the village. It is particularly bad if extra drivers use the village as a cut-through when there's a blockage on the motorway, or if a very large lorry comes through and mounts the pavement. Ironically, the Council says the situation would be even more dangerous if there were no congestion around the school, because the parking that spills out at the bottom of Elberton Road serves to slow the traffic down!

So, unfortunately, the problem isn't one that parents can solve on their own. Improvements are needed to make the area around the Church and down towards the School much safer. This should in turn encourage parents to walk, and so improve the congestion around the school gates, making that area safer too.

The School has been working closely with the Parish Council, local Councillor Matthew Riddle and officers at South Gloucestershire Council to find the best way of addressing the problem. The Council has allocated £5000 towards identifying a solution during 2012, and will hopefully find further funding to make the improvements during 2013. Until the Council has completed its investigation of the site, it's not clear what its recommendations will be. However, possibilities include a reduction in speed limit in the area around the school to 20mph during peak periods, and restrictions in parking along the main road by the Church for the same limited periods of time. Another option might be a school crossing patrol outside the Church.

The School is very keen to find a solution that works for local residents too, and that is why liaison between the School and the Parish Council will continue as a very important and valuable part of the process. The date and place have now been fixed. The meeting will be at 7.30 pm on Tuesday 17th April at Elberton Village Hall. This meeting is your opportunity to have your say about what the Parish Council has done, and what you think it should be doing. And generally to air your views about your parish. Please come! Planning issues:

Last month, I mentioned two particular planning matters. First, the proposed treatment facility at Harnhill Quarry to treat water from gully cleaning vehicles. As I anticipated, the Council welcomed the proposal and gave it their support.

The other one was the proposed wind farm at Ingst. While no application has yet been made, the Council discussed what is known about it. Though a formal decision will only be taken once an application has been made, the view of the Council was that this is the wrong scheme in the wrong place, and it is likely to oppose it.

The owner of the site adjoining Quarry House in Littleton has appealed against South Gloucestershire Council's latest refusal of permission to create a separate dwelling. The Parish Council will continue its campaign against this proposal.

Diamond Jubilee Celebrations

The Parish Council will be organizing a **beacon at the lookout above the Severn at Aust** as part of the national network of beacons. The Council is grateful to Mr and Mrs David Spratt for kindly agreeing that their land may be used. The Council will also present **commemorative mugs** to all those under 18 – we hope to have a sample at the Annual Meeting - and these will be available also for adults to buy.

Further to the report in last month's Meeting Point, the Parish Council would again like to thank all the parishioners who answered the recent Wind Farm Questionnaire. A staggering 772 replies were received, which represents an unprecedented 46% response. Of the returns accepted, 107 (14%) were in favour of the Wind Farm and 662 (86%) were against. This result will give the Parish Council a clear steer when the planning application is submitted, and South Gloucestershire Council will be made aware of parishioners' views.

Since last summer there have been an increasing number of complaints about dog fouling in the play area at Vicarage Lane, and recently along the Street and around the Stores. It is very sad that a small minority of dog owners should be so inconsiderate, especially as, apart from the visual impact, smell and general unpleasantness, there is evidence that dog faeces carry e.coli and hepatitis. Additionally 100 people each year (mainly children) have eye diseases caught by swallowing the Toxocara egg, which can lead to blindness.

Toxocariasis is an infestation of humans with the larvae of *Toxocara canis*, a small threadlike parasitic worm that resides in a dog's intestine. A dog harbouring the small round worm causes large numbers of worm eggs (each about 0.07mm diameter) in its faeces which can contaminate the soil. Children who play with contaminated soil can then inadvertently put their fingers in their mouths and swallow some of the worm eggs. The swallowed eggs hatch in the intestine of the child to liberate larvae, which then travel towards the liver, lungs, brain and eyes. Here they can trigger off allergic reactions such as asthma, and they also have more serious affects such as loss of vision.

The Parish Council would urge all people out walking or exercising their dogs to take plastic bags with them so that they can clean up as they go. 'Dog poo' bins have already been provided around the parish that are regularly emptied, and more warning notices have been erected. The South Gloucestershire Council Dog Warden is happy to contact dog owners to make them aware of the regulations concerning dog fouling and if necessary issue a £50 fixed penalty notice. He can be contacted on 01454 868000 or via email to streetcare@southglos.gov.uk. However to be effective, the dog warden will need to know a description of the dog and the owner, where the dog is regularly exercised, and if possible details about discrete incidents. Given the increased use of all three Play Areas in the parish as spring approaches, it would be wonderful to ensure that they are suitably safe.

With the coming of spring it also time for the Annual Parish Assembly. This year it is to be held at Olveston Parish Hall on Thursday 26th April starting at 7:30, with tea and coffee available beforehand. Please come along to meet your councillors, to hear what has been done in the last financial year, and to air any concerns that you may have. There will also be opportunities to get first hand knowledge on Localism and the Parish Plan.

Increasingly, information is being sent to the Parish Council via email and through website links. Topics that could affect the parish (like updates on the M4/M5 roadworks, or opportunities to discuss or get involved in local Health issues, etc) are regularly being passed to the website manager for inclusion on the council pages at www.olveston.com, so if you have access to the internet it is well worth a look.

Proposed New Pole Taxes

New proposals before South Gloucestershire District Council mean clubs and organisations can no longer use telephone poles free of charge to display posters for their events and shows.

It is estimated that complying with new EU regulations will raise the cost of monitoring telephone poles by 13.7% per annum. Forensic examination of damaged poles shows a multitude of pinholes can allow bacteria, new to this country as a result of climate change, to penetrate the poles and make them unsafe and a risk to the public.

Under the new regulations, applicable from the first of this month, posters must be forwarded for approval, three months prior to display, to the Planning Department at Thornbury, with the appropriate forms and fees. Charges will be 50p per week, or part of a week, for an A5 sized laminated poster and $\mathfrak{L}1$ for an A4 sized laminated poster.

Details of where and when the posters are to be displayed must be provided, together with a full specification of the drawing pins or staples to be used, as these must meet recent EU Health and Safety requirements.

The Garden Line

From articles (1991-92) by Cecilie Turton

April for me is a most exciting month, so many seeds to be sown and cuttings to take. Fuchsias root easily –you can't have too many for hanging baskets and borders.

I'm looking forward to growing *Nicotiana silvestris*, for the first time. This is a half hardy annual, 3-4 feet tall, pure white and beautifully scented. Imagine groups of three or four planted in a shrubbery or at the back of the herbaceous border. Hurry and plant seed now.

Towards the end of the month plant out dahlias, divide clumps carefully with a sharp knife, make sure each rhizome has a shoot, discard any unhealthy ones. Divide large clumps of herbaceous plants, eg michaelmas daisies, rudbeckia etc. Replant healthy outside shoots. Stake delphiniums late in the month. I prefer twiggy sticks to canes; apart from the obvious danger of canes, twiggy sticks are soon hidden by the foliage.

Time now to plant onion sets and sow salad crops, not forgetting parsley and various herbs. Plant out March sown seedlings of sweet peas and remember to manure the trench bottom not the top – this only encourages surface rooting. Prepare ground outside for late flowering chrysanthemums.

As the ground warms up, apply mulching to beds and borders - garden compost, or rotting leaves. Put straw round fruit bushes to conserve moisture. Give a general spring clean to indoor pot plants. Remove dead leaves, wash off dust and slightly increase watering. Cacti, which should have been kept dry through winter months, will appreciate plenty of water and feeding now.

Although there is much to be done, never overdo it. Gardening is for pleasure and enjoyment, and what is forgotten this week can often be done next week.



Easter is often the time when we go to visit friends or relations. Our son and his family often travel to North Wales to visit his wife's mother. Their children cope with the long hours in the car because they have on screen and other electronic entertainment. When our children were small we spent our time playing 'I spy' or word association games.

If we were playing a word association game now what word would pop into your mind if I called out the word 'Easter'? I suspect many people might answer 'egg' or 'bunny', perhaps recalling the episode of The Vicar of Dibley that featured Geraldine (aka Dawn French) dressed up as the Easter bunny. For others, the word 'Easter' may conjure images of 'springtime' or 'daffodils'. For church goers Easter is the season of 'resurrection' or, to use less churchy language, 'new life' and 'new beginnings'.

Another word game might be to see who is quickest to call out the opposite of a given word. So if I say 'despair' the word I'm looking for is 'hope'. If I say 'death' the word I am looking for is 'life'. Easter is the season of hope and new possibilities.

There is no doubt at all that many people we know both near to home and far away are facing continuing Good Fridays when it seems that illness, or debt, or fear, or bereavement ... the list goes on, makes an Easter experience seem an impossibility. Yet without Good Friday there could be no Easter Day, and without the journey of Lent (as Christians re-imagine and in some way re-live the way of suffering, the Via Dolorosa, that Jesus travelled to the cross) there can be no real experience of Easter.

While my husband was in intensive care throughout December I sat at his bedside and watched relatives of other patients doing the same. I knew that many people were praying for us, and your prayers helped me to remain aware of God's presence throughout those difficult days. I was certain, however, that God's presence was not confined to the space around Gil's bed but was there throughout the ward and beyond the ward, beyond the hospital, flowing into every corner of the earth where people were in need of healing and comfort.

If I were playing our word association game and someone said 'Easter', I hope I would respond with the word 'joy'. Joy is often thought of as a synonym for 'happiness' but that is to misunderstand the nature of joy. Joy is the inner conviction that despair can never have the last word. Joy is at the heart of

Christian experience even during the Lenten journey and even during Good Friday experiences. This is because, when things look bleak and when, like Jesus, people are abandoned by friends, or abused by human cruelty, or experience pain and suffering, there is a certainty that God's love will lead us through times of despair and will bring new hope and a healing of past hurts. My husband is still far from well but he came out of intensive care. Many people never went home to their relatives. I felt then, and still feel now, that if my husband had not come home I would still be able to rest in the certainty that his love would always be a reality in my life, and that I would never lose the conviction that God's love would continue to surround us both.

Jesus was prepared to face the cross to show the world the nature of God's love, the God who never abandons us and who suffers with us and for us. If we really wish to experience resurrection life, we too need to be ready to accompany those who need us, and then Good Friday will become Easter Day and the distinction between the two will disappear.

Gil and I thank everyone who held us in your thoughts and prayers and for accompanying us throughout this difficult period in our lives.

I wish you all a joyous Eastertide.
