Olveston's Past

Transcribed from the Severn-Side Parishes Magazine October 1926:

The Old Font

The enquiry, "Where is the Old Font?" has been responded to by a parishioner who has written as follows: -

"When a small girl (about 50 years ago) I saw an old Font in a garden of one of the cottages near the Church, below the Inn. I was on a visit to an aunt, who lived where Mr. Thos. Hicks now lives. (Currently the bakery) I remember going with her to this cottage. There was a small square grass plot at the back or side of this house, and in one corner on the grass was the Font. It was filled with mould, and creeping plants were growing from it. I remember standing before the Font, wondering what it was; my aunt had gone inside to the kitchen, and when she came out, accompanied by the occupant of the cottage, an elderly man, she made some remark about it, and this old man said it was an old Font from the Church. This is very clearly impressed on my memory, because I thought it was 'very wicked' to use something from the Church to 'grow flowers in'. I cannot recall which cottage it was, only setting off with my aunt, who was holding me by the hand. She carried a small basket, and wore a crinoline. We turned down between the Inn and the Church. Vaquely I fancy the house was opposite the Church. The grass plot, which was bordered with gay geraniums, and the Font with creepers growing over it, are as clear as yesterday. Perhaps if I am allowed to see the back gardens of all the houses there I should recognise the place. My father thinks it may have been the house Mr. Selman now lives in, or the one where an old Mr. Vinnicombe lived.

The writer of this letter has since ascertained where the remains of the Font, with other stone fragments were(supposed to be a part of the old parapet of the Tower), and one who lived there 30 years ago distinctly remembers that, it being necessary to build an outhouse on the ground where the fragments were placed, they were removed in a cart (there were two loads), and cast in a gully by the side of Catherine Hill.

So there are the remains of the old Font, buried under heaps of rubbish, and if they could be recovered, it is most probable that it would be impossible to restore it.

The gully referred to at Catherine Hill, is now filled in. Before the village refuse collection in 1935 started, the gully (it being the original Catherine Hill road before 1800) was used by the villagers to dump waste. The gully commenced at the entrance to Port Farm and continued parallel to the road.

The Tower fragments would be from the slim pinnacle replacements of the 1880's.

The Norman Font was displaced in 1871 following a fall from its plinth and shattering its lid.

The old man may have been James Niblett who was in his late 70s and resided opposite the south gate next to Holly Cottage that has an enclosed front garden.





Weather Record April to June 2010 Marcus Bean





April

Rain and changeable conditions occurred for the first four days of the month, but then a large area of high pressure established itself over the Country and much of the Continent, bringing dry sunny weather. The last two days of the month brought a return to showery conditions.

We had twenty two days in the month with no rain and total rainfall was slightly less than half the normal. This was the driest April since 2007. Average pressure and temperature were both marginally above that expected at this time of year.

May

The first half of the month was cold; temperatures being well below normal with prevailing winds from the North to East quarter with little rain except on one day. Later in the month the temperature warmed up with more sunshine, and winds coming from the Atlantic caused temperatures to soar on the 22nd and 23rd with slightly cooler conditions at the month's end.

Rainfall for the month was just under half the normal and the driest since 2004. Average pressure was thus high, but average temperature was 1°C below norm making it the coldest May since 2003.

June

High pressure was the dominant feature with most Atlantic depressions forced to the North resulting in long periods of dry weather and in total twenty two days without rain. Sunshine levels were also high.

Rainfall for the month was just over half the average and for the first six months of the year was nearly five inches below average making this the driest start to the year, for England and Wales, since 1929. Average pressure was above normal and temperature was 0.75°C above that expected for this time of year.

If you were lucky enough to be around Olveston on Sat 19th June, either in garden, allotment or walking around the village, you would have heard the Church Bells ringing for 3hrs and 1 min.

What you were hearing was something very rarely heard.

The Ringers, a visiting team from the Bath & Wells Diocesan Association of Change Ringers, rang a Peal. The particular peal they rang is called Spliced Surprise Major and has 5152 different changes (i.e. the number of different sequences on 8 bells) & contained within that were 23 different methods with names such as Bristol, Cornwall, Double Dublin, Cambridge and other towns. It is one of the most difficult peals to ring and requires 100 per cent concentration from all the team to ensure success and for that reason often fails. However on this, occasion, in Olveston, it was successful.

In days gone by, personal hygiene left much room for improvement. As a result, many women and men had developed acne scars by adulthood. Swarm!



Sometimes, a colony of honey bees becomes too big for its existing home, which might be a hive, a disused chimney or a hollow tree. Then the queen and many of the bees leave to find a new home. This is a swarm. Whilst doing this, they may pause and hang in a large cluster on a convenient

tree, bush or post. They will not hurt anyone unless disturbed. Before leaving their old home, they fill themselves with honey and are quite docile. Swarming happens most commonly on a hot day in early summer. In almost all cases, the swarm will take off again within a day or two at most, to occupy a more suitable permanent home elsewhere. However, a bee swarm can be intimidating. It is important not to disturb the bees. You can ring the local council for advice on 01454 868000. They may be able to put you in touch with a local bee-keeper.


This is just what happened to local photographer, Peter Haworth. A large cluster of honey bees took up temporary residence in a cotoneaster bush in his Olveston

Police Report

No Cold Calling Zones Launched in South Gloucestershire

Cold callers are being frozen out in Yate thanks to a new initiative between South Gloucestershire Council Trading Standards and Avon and Somerset Police.

'No Cold Calling Zones' have been launched in parts of the town in a bid to help reduce doorstep crime. They have been set up by Trading Standards officers with support from police and local Neighbourhood Watch schemes.

Doorstep crime can range from rogue home improvement firms, to bogus officials and charities.

The first No Cold Calling Zones are being introduced in the Walton Heath and Ferndown areas in Yate.

No Cold Calling Zones are identified by street signs and stickers on the front doors of houses. Residents are provided with advice on how to say 'no' to unwanted callers and also encouraged to report callers who ignore the zones to trading standards or the police.

If an area is interested in a particular area becoming a No Cold Calling Zone, they are advised to contact the council's trading standards department.

The No Cold Calling Zones scheme does not prevent all callers. Utility services staff, registered charity collectors and canvassing politicians can still do so. As can traders involved in door to door selling if they have made a prior appointment.

In exchange for this we offer generous fees and allowances, structured training, interaction with existing foster carers and continuous, ongoing support.

Adoption

We always need adopters for children aged 1+ and sibling groups. Adoption is a way of providing new families for new children who cannot be brought up by their own parents. It is a legal process, which transfers all the responsibilities held by the child's birth parents to the new adoptive parents.

Family Link

This scheme is a way of providing regular short breaks for a child/young person with a disability. Family Link caring offers the opportunity for a person to forge a long term relationship with a disabled child/young person and their family. This sort of care suits people who can offer occasional short breaks and who feel positive about disabled children and young people. The Family Link Scheme always needs more carers and once approved they are carefully matched up with a child or young person through gradual introduction.

Build Project at the Parish Hall

Following the great news of the award of a grant and planning permission, build work is starting on the Parish Hall during the first week of August. For those of you who have not been following events, the grant has been awarded by South Glos to provide better facilities for Olveston Preschool which operates from the Parish Hall, and the plans have been drawn up to improve the hall for all users.

This fantastic opportunity to upgrade the hall facilities will inevitably cause some disruption while the build is in progress; however we are working hard with the contractors to keep this to a minimum. The footpath leading to the play area behind the hall will be temporarily rerouted through the third tennis court to ensure that access is maintained at all times. An area within the third tennis court will be securely sectioned off to allow the contractor to store materials and construction vehicles and there will also be further contractors' vehicles. There will still be plenty of parking at the hall, and the part of the third tennis court which does not form the contractor's compound will be available as usual. Access and use of the two main tennis courts will be unaffected.

In order to minimise the disruption for those wishing to book the Parish Hall, the work on the new kitchen will be done first. The hall and the Jubilee Room will be available for hire as normal for the entire duration of the project. The building will be finished by the spring and we look forward to the new and upgraded facilities being available to the entire parish. We are sure that the disruption will be worth it and thank you for your patience as the build takes place.

Can You Hear Me?

If you think about international calls, I'll bet you think of long numbers and high bills. If you have relatives that live abroad, it is a real pain, especially if you also have to think about time differences.

While it has been possible to talk to someone over the internet for at least 10 years, until recently it wasn't easy. Slow connections meant call quality was poor, even getting a connection seemed to require a degree in computing, certainly not for the general user. What we want is a service that is easy to use, tells us when our friends and relatives are available; it would even be nice if we could see the person we are talking to.

Funnily enough as I'm writing about it, now you can. Broadband has inspired a sudden advance in technology. Skype was the first service to allow everyone to make free calls over the internet easily and at very high quality. There are now many services competing with Skype from the likes of Microsoft and Yahoo. They work in a very similar way, although of course they don't work with each other (when is technology ever that easy?).

In general these services are worked in a similar way; you add friends and colleagues to a contacts list. The contacts list allows you to see who is available, then all you have to do to make a call is click on the contact's name and press call. By clicking on additional names, you can start a second call or a conference call. You can open text chat windows, useful for leaving messages or sharing website links. You can also send files to the person/people you are talking to.

There is one obvious snag in that you're stuck at your computer. So the more recent innovations have been phone-sized handsets, and software for mobile phones, the ability to call standard land line numbers (worldwide) at very good rates, and finally to get a real phone number for your PC so you can be called from a normal phone.

While calling from your computer is not for everyone, it can be invaluable if you need to talk to someone in a different country, or collaborate with one or more people over the internet.

Right At The Centre

One of the fascinating things about being a Christian is that we see all that goes on around us from a different perspective. Belief in an eternal, all-knowing, all-powerful God means that we should have (and hopefully do have) a longer-term, less 'human-centric' view of the world. This is in stark contrast to the trends in the world itself, where thinking is becoming ever more short-term and ever more driven by human needs and wants.

These diverging positions have led many to assume that religion in general, and Christian belief, in particular, are now less relevant than they once were. In our proudly post-Christian society, many would say that Christianity has been outgrown and that we move on to this 'brave new world' on our own. However, what intrigues me is that, whichever way we turn, we find that there are issues that refuse to conform to this model that 'man is in control of his own destiny'.

Apart from the obvious impacts of the natural world (earthquakes, volcanoes, floods, droughts etc.), we see that mankind is unable to muster the collective will to address the primary injustices of our age such as poverty, resource degradation and child exploitation in all its guises. We even struggle to identify and implement technological fixes for our misdemeanours, as witnessed by BP's vain attempts to cap an oil well in the Gulf of Mexico. Of course, the thing that we are all best at is blame, and there has been no shortage of that flying around in recent weeks.

So, if we must conclude that 'man is not in control' then who is? Well, the Christian answer is, of course, clear....but the outworking of God's hand is not always as obvious as we might expect it, or like it, to be. Paul notes, in his letter to the Ephesians, that there is still a battle on-going in the world. He notes that it is not a battle against 'flesh and blood', but against the 'principalities and powers of this dark world'. Indeed, as we look around, this is exactly what we see. God is working the victory out that has already been won in Christ. However, He is doing so according to His timetable not ours.

As unpalatable as many find it, I see the Biblical narrative of the world-order as far more compelling an explanation for what we see around us than any other commentary. Far from seeing Christianity marginalised, I see it moving to centre stage. If only many Christians would believe that too! Paul Ashford – The Oasis Church, Old Down
