

## The History of Bristol in 45 Bridges

Wed. 4th December at 7.30pm. Methodist Church, The Street, Olveston.



The importance of bridges to the City of Bristol is shown by its name. The first written reference to the city, in the Anglo-Saxon Chronicle of 1051, calls it Brycgstow, 'place by the bridge'.

In this December talk for OPHS, Jeff Lucas tells the story of some of the 45 bridges, old and new, which span the main waterways of Bristol, and of the dramatic events which have swirled around and, often, on them: for

instance, the Bristol Bridge massacre of 1793, the Bathurst Basin naphtha explosion of 1888, and the mass gas workers' strike of 1889.

The 45 bridges can all be crossed on foot and can be linked into a 45km circular walk that takes you from the nooks and crannies of the inner city to the open vistas of the Severn Estuary and back again. This walk is also the solution to an intriguing mathematical puzzle called 'The Königsberg Bridge Problem': how to walk around a given set of bridges, crossing each one, once only. The problem was solved for Bristol by a young University of Bristol mathematician called Thilo Gross and, in this talk, Jeff will show the solution. ## Olveston Young Farmers Club

Olveston Young Farmers covers a wide area beyond the Parish and is thriving. It is open to people from ten to twenty-six in three sections, Junior, Intermediate and Senior. They meet weekly at Rockhampton Village Hall on Mondays from September to July. Often it is a talk on topics such as farm safety or the police; recently a video entitled 'funky farmer' about them can be seen on You Tube. Sometimes it is stock judging practices at local farms or a fun evening like ice skating or pumpkin carving; however, everything is serious practice for the annual County Young Farmers Rally.

The Rally takes place on a day in July, and the Olveston Club competes against the other clubs at everything from baking and dancing to stock judging, football and netball. This year Olveston was placed third in Intermediate and Senior sections and fourth overall, one of their best results.

With around fifty members OYF is the third largest club in the County and has a reputation for fun and friendliness. They won a cup for recruiting the most new members in 2018/19. This is partly due to extensive use of social media like Facebook, and partly due to a new members night held at the White Hart Olveston that resulted in fifty-six potential new members attending, of which twelve signed up.

The group has weekend socials at the White Hart, Olveston or the Huntsman at Falfield and county wide dances which provide a veritable marketplace for marriage. (This is the third generation I have interviewed, so I know it is a fact!) Fifty per cent of members are from farming families but the other half are those interested in countryside matters. The annual holiday is taken at the Royal Welsh Show in Builth Wells, when the two senior sections camp there for a week.

Fund raising is important; they run a strawberries and cream stall at the Berkeley Show, an annual Whist Drive at Falfield and the Annual Harvest Supper. The latter sold ninety tickets this year; they all donated food, cooked and served a supper of hot soup, ploughman's platter, apple crumble and

cheese. It raised £1,500, of which £1,000 was for club funds and £500 was donated to the DPJ Foundation that helps men in rural communities with mental health issues.

All this takes a lot of organising by the committee of five. There is also a committee of parent/grandparents who meet once a year, are always available for advice and are eligible to vote at the Annual General Meeting. This year's chairman Jess Vizard is a good example of the fifty per cent with no farming background. She joined because of her school friend Beccy Lyons, who is third generation at Valley Farm Ingst. Jess is now working on a farm and is in her third year studying agriculture at Hartpury College. She explains that the Club is a group of people who are like minded with the same interests and hobbies, who lead very busy lives and have little time for other pursuits. It is a big family with a weekly opportunity to meet to discuss problems, questions and socialise. Anyone interested in this lively club only need to come along on Mondays at 7.30pm at Rockhampton Village Hall and will receive a warm welcome.

## News from Pilning Station Group

We are hugely disappointed in GWR and Network Rail for their lack of action in making their new Class 800 trains compatible for stopping at our station. It appears that Pilning was not added to the trains' onboard computer system, meaning that we lose a well-used service here.

The very same service (the 15:00 Cardiff to Taunton) that stops at Pilning now will still run, making the same calls as it does now, bar the Pilning one. We feel disenfranchised by GWR, as they are denying us access even to the remnants of the service that they should be providing. But most importantly, we see this lack of action as their attempt to close Pilning railway station by stealth.

What happens when all the trains go over to electric operation – will Pilning station close altogether? This decision is inexcusable and unnecessary and is a disgraceful way to treat passengers. We have raised the issue with Ministers and the Rail Ombudsman and have demanded a rethink.

**Mon 2 Dec at 7.30pm:** Jack is a struggling singer-songwriter in a tiny English seaside town whose dreams of fame are rapidly fading, despite the fierce devotion and support of his childhood best friend. Then, after a freak bus accident, Jack wakes up to discover that the creators of the most famous pop music in the world never existed... and he finds himself with a very complicated problem indeed. The film is both a toe-tapping pleasure to watch and an occasionally scathing look at how we get things wrong. (2019, 1h 56m, Cert 12A)

**Mon 16 Dec at 7.30pm:** Set in America in 1962, the film tells the heartwarming true story of a working-class Italian-American bouncer who takes on a job as a chauffeur for a world-class black pianist. We weren't lost, it was just that the footpath, clearly shown behind the chicken farm in Oldbury Naite, couldn't be found. And that is why we ended up wandering along the Power Station Road seeking another route to get back to Oldbury village.

As we strolled along the wide verge, very sadly, we stumbled upon a dead creature lying in the grass. Now, I am not an expert and I confess that I have never seen one before, but I am convinced that it was a Polecat. The reason for my doubt about the identification was that I thought Polecats were limited to the wilder places of the United Kingdom such as Scotland and Wales. I never imagined I might find one by the side of a road in South Gloucestershire.



So, I went to Google to find out what I could and the description I found on the Wildlife Trust's site fitted perfectly. It said that the Polecat has a two-tone coat: having dark brown guard hairs covering a buff-coloured underfur; and further that it has a distinct bandit-like appearance, with white stripes across its dark face. It has a short, dark tail and rounded ears. Exactly what we had seen.

The website also added that the Polecat has been undergoing a recovery recently and can be found in rural Wales and *parts of England*. Is it possible that polecats are living in wildest Oldbury? It seems they might be. Perhaps they are already skulking around our local fields and hedgerows.
