Coming to Bréhan with us?

This year it's the turn of the Olveston Parish Twinning Association (OPTA) to visit our friends in our twin village of Bréhan. For those who haven't been there, it's a lovely community of similar size to ours in the heart of rural Brittany.

We generally take a coachload of both grown-ups and children, and last time we went, in 2018, everyone who came seemed to have a great time. We would very much like to take a large group this year and children will be especially welcome.

Our trip is generally scheduled for the first weekend in May, to include the May Day Bank Holiday, but this year the Bank Holiday has been changed to coincide with the 75th anniversary of VE (Victory in Europe) Day on the 8th May, and we have adjusted our trip similarly. The detail of our plans is not yet fixed, but the outline is as follows:

Bréhan May 7th - May 10th

- Depart Olveston by coach 3 4pm Thursday 7th May.
- Overnight ferry from Plymouth to Roscoff. Excellent restaurant onboard, cabins available.
- Arrive Bréhan approximately 12 noon on Friday 8th May. Meet host families and settle in.
- The programme, organized by our Bréhan friends, will include visits to local attractions, lovely food, probably music and dancing. Whatever they arrange it is always good fun.
- Depart Bréhan approximately 9.00am Sunday 10th May. Travel back via a supermarket (for essential supplies!) and a day crossing from Caen to Portsmouth. Arrive back in Olveston around midnight,

The cost is usually in the region of £125 per adult, depending on numbers. Children come free, courtesy of the fund-raising we do throughout the year. Once we're in France, you won't need any money at all: our hosts provide for all our needs!

Christmas Charm with Crescendo Concerts!

On the Sunday just before Christmas, in the Cossham Hall, performance group Crescendo Concerts delivered a new and exciting twist on the Christmas classic, The Nutcracker. In this reworked version, two children go on the journey of a lifetime, meet a host of beloved Nutcracker characters, including the Nutcracker, the Mouse King, and the Sugar-Plum Fairy, and learn the importance of kindness, respect and getting along with your siblings! Crescendo Concerts' 50-minute show offered children the chance to experience fantastic arrangements of Tchaikovsky's original score performed by a scaled-back orchestra of five players, as well as fun circus skills, bubbles and a roller-skating Sugar-Plum Fairy! All the performers were very versatile,



playing multiple parts with very fast and frequent costume changes, and though the story may have been difficult for very young children to follow, the show more than makes up for that in heart and pure enjoyment.

or question him on any related subject. There may be some surprising answers – a lively Q&A is assured!

Part of the fun of the evening will be discovering how advertising has changed since then - and how, in some ways, it hasn't changed at all.

Severn Bridge Road Race

This cycle race, taking place on Sunday March 1st, passes eleven times through the villages of Olveston, Tockington, Old Down, Alveston and Elberton. These details about the event, with timings and suggested viewing points, will help those of you who would like to watch the race, and explain how to avoid it if that is your preference.



The timetable on the day will be as follows:

- 7:30 Race organisation team arrive at the HQ which is Marlwood School, Alveston.
- 8:00 Race warning signs are distributed around the circuit. Although no roads are closed, junctions are shut down by accredited marshals each lap for a few minutes when the race passes that point.
- 8.00 The Finish area by The Crescent in Old Down will be set up. This will not affect traffic in any way.
- 8:30 Race participants begin to arrive at Marlwood School for race sign-on. There are 80 elite cyclists taking part in the event.
- 10:30 Accredited Marshals will move to their positions on each major junction on the circuit. These marshals have police authority to stop traffic with the STOP sign they hold.
- 10:30 Race stewards and red flag marshals move into positions around the circuit, in particular to assist at marshal points in Olveston and Tockington.

11:00 – The race convoy and riders will move out from Marlwood School and the race begins. The race convoy will include several lead vehicles and officials' vehicles which are identified by signage and yellow flashing lights. They are supported by motorcycle outriders that warn traffic of the approaching race. Competitors are required to obey the rules of the road and there are race commissaires in following vehicles that can remove riders that do not adhere to this.

11:10 – The riders will be approaching their first ascent of Old Down Hill, which they will go up 11 times in total. This is the best position from which to watch the race. Please do not park on Old Down Hill. There is limited parking available at Queen Alexander Memorial Pavilion (QAMP) which is on the right at the top of the hill.

11:15 – The riders will pass through the finish point for the first time by The Crescent. This is also a good point to watch the race. The race finishes after 10 further laps.

12:30 – This is about the mid-point of the race and there is likely to be a breakaway group a few minutes ahead of the main bunch of riders.

13:45 – Approximate race finish time by The Crescent, Old Down. Several groups of riders will probably finish over a period of 5-6 minutes.

14:00 – Finish area is cleared of riders and return to Marlwood School.

15:00 – Presentation to riders at Marlwood School.

Race organisers ask horse riders and pet owners to please be advised of the race, and to take care. They apologise for any inconvenience caused.

Ashes are an ancient sign of penitence; from the middle ages it became the custom to begin Lent by being marked in ash with the sign of the cross. Ash Wednesday derives its name from the placing



of repentance ashes on the foreheads of participants to either the words "Repent and believe in the Gospel" or "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." The ashes are prepared by burning palm leaves from the previous year's Palm Sunday celebrations.

Caroline is the owner of Willow and Bear, the newly opened business in Olveston, opposite The Stores. She was born in Oldbury on Severn and attended The Castle School. Her holiday job was housekeeping at Thornbury Castle and when she left school, she became a Junior Receptionist there. She had various jobs including as a recruitment consultant and 'check in' at Southampton Airport.

She met her husband on a surfing trip to Newquay. Caroline and James travelled to

Norway with James' work and then they both took six months out to travel Australia and New Zealand.

They have three sons who attend school locally. Caroline has always been interested in upcycling and home interiors. She originally started from her kitchen table creating 'shabby chic' in pieces to offer an aged cottage look, and from this she created her furniture Facebook page 'Caroline's Shabby 2 Chic'.

Five years on she managed to create a successful small business, with over 2,500 followers on her social media page. Driving though Olveston one day she saw the old Linela shop was available for rent and, in October, moved in. It provides space for a workshop, and more importantly for us, a shop which she has named Willow and Bear.

She mainly stocks local crafts and also sources through Facebook. She opened with a Macmillan Coffee morning in October which raised £178. Since then she has been very, very busy particularly in the run up to Christmas, when she sold homemade wreaths, six o'clock gin Christmas crackers - using re-usable paper - and lots of other creative gifts.

Caroline is fully booked with commissions until April. This is a local, environmentally friendly small business, opening with occasional complementary coffee mornings. Caroline hopes for a busy summer, and she and Chewie (the cockapoo) look forward to welcoming you soon.



Do you care for someone?

Did you know you have a right to a Carer's Assessment?

Do you look after someone? Or perhaps you know someone who does? Families, friends and neighbours often provide crucial care for someone who couldn't manage without their help. You could be caring for a relative, partner or friend who is ill, frail, disabled or has mental health or substance misuse problems.

If you are a carer, you have the right to a carer's assessment. Carers Support Centre, a local charity, can help you with this.

In your assessment, you can talk about the impact caring has on your life. This will give you some space to think about how caring affects your physical, mental and emotional wellbeing and how this may change in the future. An assessment also often leads to a small one-off payment that will give you the chance to take a short break or do something for your own wellbeing.

Local carer, Vicky, gave up work to care for her mum. She visits her for many hours each day to help with household tasks, shopping, meal preparation,

paperwork and appointments. This commitment to her mum impacts her income, her other relationships and her own wellbeing.

Her carer's assessment gave Vicky an opportunity to talk about her caring role



and find out about help available. She was also awarded a small one-off payment to pay for something that would benefit her.

Vicky said: "It was helpful to meet with someone from the Carer's Support Centre team to go through the assessment process.
That's partly because, with so much on my plate,

finding the time and energy to complete the paperwork would probably have been overlooked or felt like yet another demand on me. It was good to talk about my situation with someone impartial but helpful. And I found speaking my answers out loud somehow helped me to see and think about the level of responsibility and impact of my caring role."
