Eric Garrett



We sadly report that Eric died on Christmas Eve at the age of 94. Eric had often written for Meeting Point, mostly on the past life, events, buildings and characters in the local villages. Local history was a driving interest for Eric; it was aided by a remarkable memory and power of recall. You could ask him about anything that had happened locally in the past 90 years and be sure to get a detailed answer. Unsurprisingly, Eric had been a leading member of Olveston Parish Historical Society from its origin in 1966 and became Archivist after a couple of years, staying in the position until almost the end of his life. Whenever Eric gave one of his talks to the Society he could be sure of a capacity audience. In fact, on at least one occasion we had to turn people away. His historical research also

provided material for him to write half a dozen books, and to contribute to others.

Eric's other long-lasting interest was his vegetables. Eric took over his allotment when his father died in 1938, to feed the family. He continued gardening there for seventy years and for much of that time he was the representative of the allotment tenants.

Eric was passionate about preserving the village and its surrounding countryside and fought to retain and improve the footpaths so that our rural environment could be enjoyed by all.

We are fortunate that during the past couple of years Steve Humphries produced a book and accompanying film "For the love of Olveston" published in early 2023, which describes the life and times of Eric Garrett and some of his contemporaries. We'll miss Eric, and we send our sympathy to his family.

just off Vicarage Lane and Newland Homes - who presented the proposed development on the Aust Road.

A capacity gathering attended and engaged in very constructive and at times critical comments relating to the proposed plans. Whilst the meeting was chaired by the Parish Council, South Glos.Councillor Chris Willmore, who is the Cabinet Chair of Planning, Regeneration and Infrastructure was in attendance to give the Council's rationale and future plans as the Council addresses its Housing requirements over the next five years. She was particularly impressed that the Council had invited the developers as part of the overall meeting. She also made it clear that the Council was looking for schemes of over 10 houses such that low-cost affordable houses could be part of the submission.

Her very important recommendation to all was to prepare a 'shopping list' of their concerns and recommendations. This can be emailed to the Parish Council: clerk@olvestonparishcouncil.gov.uk. The Parish Council will be compiling its list, which will incorporate both its comments together with those of the Parishioners, which will then be forwarded to South Glos. Council.

The consultation period has now been extended to 16th February 2024. She also made it clear that it is for every parishioner to submit their views from a local perspective. There will be further consultations as part of the process under L19 later in the year.

The Sparrowhawk

The sparrowhawk is likely to be the only bird of prey (raptor) to enter our gardens. We may see other raptors overhead, such as buzzards and kestrels, but unless you have a large patch of land you are unlikely to see one in your garden. I often hear stories locally of the sparrowhawks in the area, nearly always a story of one hunting. Its population was in decline but has now recovered. Being at the top of a food chain it was hit hard by the use of pesticides, but changes to this practice have enabled its recovery. It was also persecuted by humans, especially when in the proximity of pheasants. It is mostly a resident breeder and approximately 33,000 pairs now nest in the UK. Adult birds will establish a territory and stay resident whilst juvenile birds may wander in autumn and winter, therefore possibly boosting populations locally.

There are two species of hawk in the UK; the goshawk and sparrowhawk and the latter is the much smaller of the two. It would be very unlikely for a goshawk to visit your garden for they are large, guite secretive birds of the woodland and forests. You can see them in the Forest of Dean especially in the breeding season when they display above the tree canopy.

The sparrowhawk is an extremely attractive bird with the male being significantly smaller and more colourful than the female. The male has bluegrey upperparts with strongly barred reddish brown underparts and underwings. The female has grey-brown upperparts and pale underparts with fine dark barring. The bird photographed below is a male. (The photographs in this article were taken on a very wet day in December 2023 from our kitchen window in Olveston). The sparrowhawk has rather short, rounded wings with a long square tail. This makes it very adept for hunting small birds in tight places amongst trees and hedges. It mostly catches its prey in flight and has



extremely long toes which it needs to catch its prey. The smaller male takes mainly tits and finches whilst the larger female will take blackbirds and pigeons. Therefore, as well as its size and colouration, the prev it is hunting could also be a distinguishing feature of its sex.





Birds are its primary diet, and it is quite likely if you have been successful in introducing birds into your garden, then a sparrowhawk will not be too far away. For myself this can present a dilemma as I take great iov in the birds which feed in our garden and, of course, we do not like to witness any of those birds

being eaten. However, I do need to remind myself that this is part of the balance of nature. It means that the numbers of small birds regulate the numbers of sparrowhawks and vice versa. As with all predators they will not deplete their food source as it would not be in their interest to do so, and the presence of a sparrowhawk is an indication of a healthy bird population.

Another way of considering this is that blue and great tits will eat the caterpillars from our garden. But we encourage moths and butterflies into the garden through planting good food source plants and grasses. The butterflies hopefully lay eggs in our garden producing caterpillars. However, we do not discourage the blue or great tit who may eat those same insects. I believe we have to have a natural healthy balance.

It is also true that when the sparrowhawk enters our garden, I take joy in that, but we do not make it easy for it to hunt. We place feeders where it does not have a direct line of flight and ensure the feeders are very close to natural cover. It is however occasionally successful!

The sparrowhawk is typically only seen when it is attacking its prey. More often than not this is a surprise low level attack from somewhere close by; on a roof top or from another tree, where it launches itself at speed using its very powerful legs. I always feel that it has been nearby for some time just waiting for the right moment. The sparrowhawk is well established across the Meeting Point area, so keep an eye out for it especially as we move into spring where you may also see them soaring over fields and woodland looking for a mate.

You can also see buzzards soaring over fields throughout the year, red kites especially in summer when fields are being cut for silage, peregrine falcons along the Severn especially by the power station at Oldbury and kestrels hovering over our fields. Occasionally across the salt marshes at Aust and Northwick, marsh harriers and merlin. So, there is a lot to see out there. For all of these birds to be present in our area we need to ensure we protect and maintain our unique landscape here in the Severn Vale.

A Local Man Ahead of His Times Part Two

Harry Grindell Matthews local connections largely ended after his divorce in 1930 and his work took him to other parts of the country and abroad. His relationship with the British Government had deteriorated after the end of the Great War. His device for submarine detection had not been taken up by the navy and the air force seemed disinterested in aerial voice communication. To be fair, the Government was too involved with post war recovery. They kept in touch with him, but without its help Harry pursued his passion for innovation and invention. Harry always needed finances, the lack of which always seemed to haunt and hamper his work.

In 1921 Harry produced a film of Sir Ernest Shackleton talking about what would be his last expedition. He claimed this to be the first talking movie and released it in several cinemas. This was not a great success and as no copies have survived his claim cannot be confirmed. In 1923, working at New Passage Hotel, Harry had progressed and invented a device for adding sound to moving pictures. The British film industry was uninterested in his sound concept. Films with talking actors were inconceivable and as one commentator wrote, 'would never catch on'. Undeterred Harry took his invention to America. The first recognised 'talkie', in 1927, is 'The Jazz Singer' starring Al Jolson. Warner Brother's had employed Harry to assist with the sound for the film.

Despite his 1923 talking movie device. Harry chose to use a traditional silent format for a 1924 film he simply called, 'The Death Ray'. Filmed in Paris, this was accompanied by a pianist in the theatre matching images. It was heralded as, 'The most startling and breath-taking motion picture ever made'.

The film in its entirety has been lost, but small extracts still exist to give an idea of the content. Harry appeared throughout sometimes talking directly at the screen, but it would need a lip reader to give him voice. The scenes are punctuated by title boards telling the story. The viewer is told that the Grindell Matthews Death Ray, in the future, may control the destiny of the world. Harry was one of the boldest thinkers of modern times and predicted that within 15 years the machine gun would be obsolete. Many viewers would have been aware of the use of the machine gun from the war years. Artillery pieces were long range weapons, the machine gun less so. Was this an indication that Harry's invention had a short range at that time? Whatever the range, the Ray was such that it would stop all wars.

With appetites thoroughly whetted we are taken to a laboratory where Harry is dressed in a white laboratory coat. He is working around an impressive device, with a stepped coned shaped ceramic base on top of which is a large projection device. The room has much evidence of electrical switches and wiring. Harry and three assistants examine the machine and stand back whilst it is switched on. The device has the ability to remotely illuminate a free-standing light bulb and as a spectacular finale explodes a tray of gunpowder some feet away. A title board explains that these feats are achieved by an electrical beam being created through which a controlled electrical energy is transmitted. The device can illuminate or burn dependent on the power used



and range could be increased to cover great distances. The film ends with an outdoor scene. purported to be on Flat Holm in the River Severn. Hinting that the Death Ray could be used to destroy a city, the device is fired after Harry and his assistants take cover behind a protective screen. The next scene shows a large section of warehouse like buildings in ruins and on fire over a large area. The film ends.

Audience figures for the film's London debut are unknown, but some of these were newspaper

reporters. The title of the film became shocking headline news, imaginative reporters gave over enthusiastic accounts of the deadly potential of Harry's invention. He was alarmed at many of these, his apparatus was in its infancy. The notion of a death ray spawned several fictional films whose characters used rays of destruction.

We now know that Harry had offered the Death Ray, to the British Government and the Air Ministry requested to see his apparatus in action. Other Government departments heard of this and asked to attend. His work was not without risk, one assistant was rendered unconscious and Harry lost the sight in an eye during one test. Harry gave a successful demonstration in his Harweood Laboratory. One observer described the beam as being blue in

It had illuminated light bulbs and stopped working engines. Some officials were unimpressed, others looked for trickery, but admitted to finding none. It seems that a good impression was made, and Harry was offered a £1000 (£50,000 today) to aid his work if the device was kept exclusive to Britain. He declined this as he had had a better offer from a French company and he had also raised finances from a public share offer. Harry went to go to France to pursue the offer, the Ray had been lost to England. Worldwide interest in Harry's invention is evidenced by thousands of newspaper articles. Harry kept connections with France and often went to America, his ship passenger lists giving his occupation as an inventor.

The development of his Ray and achievements entered a secretive period. In 1930 he returned to England and amazed Londoners by using an invention he called a 'sky projector'. Using a beam of light, he projected images onto clouds. An angel floated across the sky trailing a 'Happy Christmas' banner. This was accompanied by another invention, the 'Luminaphone', an organ which was played by a beam of light.

In 1934 Harry was declared bankrupt and the press, which had been supportive of his work, used headlines like 'Grindell the Swindle'. He moved to an isolated bungalow on top of a mountain in South Wales. He built an extension to accommodate a laboratory. The site was surrounded by security fences and guarded by devices of Harry's invention. He became almost a recluse.

It is known that he was developing a hydrogen powered rocket plane which could reach speeds of 6 miles per second. This sort of propulsion was to take men to the moon. His home had its own air strip and light aircraft used this. Alarming to British authorities, an interest in Harry was shown by the Nazi Party in German and General Franco in Spain, but he shunned contact. At one time army soldiers were seen guarding his home. The site was often visited by Americans, some military, some civilian. Their purpose and indeed Harry's work then is still shrouded in mystery.

On the 11th of September 1941 Harry died at the age of 61 of a heart attack at his home. He left £522 in his will (£22,000 today). He had grown up in a world of technological change and wonderment. Names like Guglielmo Marconi, Nikola Tesla and John Logie Baird were pioneering radio communications and became household names. Harry had not. His inventions were many, radio communication devices, machines controlled by light, an autopilot for aircraft and the device to automatically switch on streetlamps at night. The Death Ray, his 'Ray' as Harry disliked the press description, died mainly due to lack of funds. The modern laser is an invention of the 1960s. In 1941 Harry had visited 10 Downing Street, where Winston Churchill had told him he was 100 years too advanced. Many other people accept that he, a Gloucestershire man, was indeed ahead of his times.

So, what were all these agreements? **Kyoto** committed industrialised countries and economies to limit and reduce Green House Gases (GHGs). **Paris** aimed to strengthen global response to keep the temperature rise this century below 2 degrees Celsius. **Glasgow** agreed to accelerate to close the emissions gap from 2 to 1.5 Celsius ie: Net Zero. **Egypt** was advised to cut down on fossil fuel for energy and to replace with more renewables. This is a hard number for Egypt as it is a big producer of fuel in the continent of Africa and especially since the Ukraine war.

Dubai agreed to 'Transition'. This means that all participating nations should move from fossil fuels to produce renewable energy linking for the first time fossil fuels to global climate change. This means that effort must go into

The Shirehampton Remount Depot: collecting and sending horses to the front Jenny Newley

The Shirehampton Remount Depot was a major supply base in the First World War for war-trained horses, needed in great numbers to replace those lost at the Western Front. Professor Richard Coates's main area of expertise is the origins of placenames and surnames, but he is also a Shirehampton resident

and he has drawn on local work into the Shirehampton Remount Depot and also carried out his own research into newspaper archives to tell us the story he will share with us on 7th February.

He will explain how this vitally important site at Shirehampton coped with the logistics involved in assembling and transporting mindbogglingly vast numbers of horses and mules needed for haulage and pack duties on the Western Front.

He has written a slim booklet about the Shirehampton Remount Depot and I've asked him to bring a few copies along; they'll be available for £3.50.

In September 2023, the statue of a War Horse was erected in Shirehampton, to commemorate the



role of horses in the war effort and Shirehampton's role in supplying them. It's in the Daisy Field, close to Shirehampton station, at the extreme south-eastern end of the site of the Remount Depot. Here's Richard's photograph of it. I'm sure he'll tell us more about it in his talk. We look forward to seeing you there.

Tucked away in Lower Hazel is a Quaker burial ground where people have been buried for 350 years. It is a very special place, with a wonderful feeling of peace and tranquillity. The first burials there were at a time when Quakerism was illegal, hence the choice of a quiet spot with a wall around it.

All Quakers are different, but for me they are, as a group, still very radical, and for me that is a positive. They are radical because they believe that there is that of God within every human being, and they believe in peace, equality, simplicity and truth. Just for a moment imagine a world based on those principles, to me that sounds like heaven on Earth.

These are the things that first attracted me to Quakerism. I remember once early on in my Quaker journey I said to one of the other women in the meeting that I wasn't sure if I should be there, and she said that if I felt drawn to be there then that was where I should be. That feeling of welcoming acceptance has been very important to me. There is a sense of unity, even when we see things differently, that is very special too. It might sound trite but there is definitely a feeling of something greater than us when we sit in silent worship together. There is a feeling of peacefulness, of calm and of unity that gives me strength throughout the week to do what I feel I need to do.

I'm sure it is not everybody's cup of tea, but now it feels like a big part of who I am as a person, and I know I would feel a big hole if I didn't feel part of the Quaker family. Just to sit once a week with other people who care about what happens in the world and who I know do whatever they can to make the world a better place feels like a real privilege. I honestly wish that everybody could be so lucky as to belong to a community of Friends.
