Parish Players present 'South Pacific'

Following last year's sell out success for 'The Sound of Music', the Parish Players' 2020 show is the even more colourful and vibrant 'South Pacific', which is coming to the Parish Hall in Tockington for February half term.

The musical is adapted from the Pulitzer Prize-winning novel 'Tales of the South Pacific' by James A Michener, who was posted to the region in 1944 with the task of writing a history of the US Navy. He based his novel on the stories he heard told by real sailors stationed on the islands during World War II, and the characters he met there. Rodgers and Hammerstein wrote their now famous musical, well aware that their work would send a strongly progressive message about racism when it was first staged, in 1949.

The story focuses on Nellie Forbush, an American nurse who falls in love with Emile de Becque, a French plantation owner who has mixed race children from his previous marriage: a situation which Nellie finds hard to accept. Meanwhile, a passionate romance develops between Lieutenant Joseph Cable and Liat, a Tonkinese girl. Cable has to confront his feelings about the consequences of marrying his Asian sweetheart. We follow the characters as they each come to recognise what really matters to them.

The show's engaging mix of comedy and tragedy, together with the famous and much-loved score, make this a musical that you can watch time and time again without tiring. 'There is Nothin' like a Dame', 'Some Enchanted Evening', 'Bali Ha'i' and 'I'm Gonna Wash That Man Right Outa My Hair' are just a few of the memorable songs.

South Pacific is in the experienced and capable hands of Linda Evans as Director, whose talent and guidance have brought us so many superb productions, including The Parish Players' hugely successful previous staging of South Pacific, in 2004. We can all look forward to being immersed in the uplifting music, once again in the skilful hands of Chloe Allsopp-Jones as Musical Director.

Sarah Wiggins makes an exciting and welcome return this year, as she takes the role of Ensign Nellie Forbush. David Proud, having made us laugh heartily for the last two years as the Scarecrow in The Wizard of Oz and impresario Max in The Sound of Music, now becomes the romantic lead, Emile de Becque. Paul Harrod's public appearances in Olveston are usually more ecclesiastical, but we now welcome him to the Company as the heroic Lieutenant Cable, whose romance with the beautiful Liat, played sensitively by Amy Sunderland, is carefully engineered by Liat's bawdy and straight-talking mother, Bloody Mary, brought to life by Lesley Clarke.

Paul Dimery returns for this production as the loveable but roguish sailor Luther Billis, whose antics will bring a smile to your face. John Jones is the acerbic commanding officer, Captain George Brackett, while Ray Hale plays his altogether more laid-back right-hand man, Commander William Harbison. Sophie Allsopp-Jones and Nathanael Moss take the roles of Emile de Becque's charming children. David Moss (our multi-talented local vicar) is a very welcome addition to the Company, appearing alongside Richard Newley, Cath Purchase, Cath Chappel, Jane Mitchell, Mike Belsten, Evie Snadden, Isobel Lambie, Brian Brown, Judy Jones, Kate Baldwin, Timothy Mitchell and others, as they play a range of cameo roles and provide our all-important chorus.

Choreographer Jill Harris returns to skilfully craft the dance numbers – especially the lively choruses of GIs and nurses. She is supported by Isobel Lambie as the show's dance captain.

Set designer Andy Black and his construction team of Rod Williams, Brian Brown and Richard Newley have once again created the stunning scenery, which captures the mood and colours of the Pacific Islands. Richard Churchill as Lighting Designer, Cath Chappel as Wardrobe Mistress and her husband Mike in charge of Sound Effects complete the production team.

South Pacific takes place during half term week on Wednesday 19th to Saturday 22nd February, at the Parish Hall, Tockington: curtain up at 7.30pm.

Please be extremely vigilant when using anti-freeze and other car fluids that contain the substance, ethylene glycol, which is lethal to animals. Please clear up any spillage or leaks immediately and ensure it is secured away and not left open. Even better, please consider buying products that do not contain ethylene glycol. Such products are on the market although slightly more expensive.

The Police have been informed and have taken the matter very seriously, delivering letters to residents on The Green. They have reassured me that if another cat falls victim to this poisoning in the area, then they will investigate further.

Directed by Billy Wilder and based on an Agatha Christie play, this six-time Oscar-nominated classic crackles with emotional electricity and continues to keep movie lovers riveted until the final, mesmerising frame. Mon 20 Jan at 7.30pm: The original and still the best! Join Sir Michael Caine and his gang of crooks for the ultimate British comic caper movie about a plan to steal a gold shipment from the streets of Turin by creating a traffic jam. licensed bar in the evenings and popcorn and soft drinks at any morning films.



The 50 State Traveller

A person whose car won't go forwards so has had to be driven backwards all the way from Iron Acton to Olveston, and then later reversed to the pub and back, is clearly of an adventurous nature, or at least has very strong neck muscles. So, add to the names of such famous explorers as David Livingstone, James Cook, Mungo Park, Ellen MacArthur and Ranulph Fiennes, our very own intrepid international adventurer and traveller, a local farmer's son and grandchild of a former vicar of St Mary's.

This person, whose identity as yet cannot be revealed, has visited every single state in the USA in the last 30 years. As a youngster, cowboy films were all the rage, and it was this that motivated our Olveston pioneer to explore the USA. Favourite states were visited repeatedly, particularly those in the west such as Colorado, Utah, Arizona, Nevada and Oregon. Not all these journeys were uneventful, such as the restaurant fence that was knocked down in Chicago – the excuse being that an attack of gout had somehow created confusion between the accelerator and brake pedals – or

Whilst in Yellowstone National Park a mule decided it was nicer in his car than in the rain and when on Antelope Island in Utah, he inadvertently became part of a buffalo stampede. Other adventures remain discreetly untold. Clearly, what happens in the USA stays in the USA.

Our explorer of the New World decided he would like to visit all 50 states, the last, Hawaii, being ticked-off in early 2019. Whilst flying to Honolulu from Denver, someone tipped off the aircraft captain that our intrepid traveller was about to visit his 50th state. During the flight, both the captain and co-pilot came to speak to him (not at the same time, thankfully), and congratulated him on this achievement – something neither pilot nor many others could match. When asked of the lasting memories of his many visits to the USA, the reply was simple, 'The vast open spaces, the contrasting scenery and the friendliness and generosity of the American people.'
