

A Very Quiet Revolution

A bright Sunday morning and as I walk to the shop to pick up the morning papers a soft whirring sound approaches from behind. I turn to see a small group of men and women streaming past on racing bikes. Where have they come from, where are they heading? Before I can answer these questions they are around the bend and out of sight. This is not the only group I will see today. Groups like this are becoming more and more common in our villages.

What is happening? A cycling revolution is taking place in front of our very eyes.

Why is this happening? To answer this question I need to look at the local, national and international level.

In 2008 Bristol was named the first cycling city in the country and given a substantial amount of money to develop cycling within the city. This money has been spent upgrading and installing new cycle lanes on the major roads leading into Bristol. Education and training programmes have been implemented to encourage children and adults to get on their bikes. Money well spent? I will let you decide.

Alongside this, sustainable transport charity Sustrans have been a major mover and shaker in developing new dedicated safe cycling routes across the whole region. The latest being a tunnel underneath Bath where classical music is played to ease us on our way.

Following on from this, Bristol's new Lord Mayor, George Ferguson, has spoken very publically about his desire to see more people on their bikes around the streets of Bristol. One of his first policy decisions is to commit £760,000 (half of which will come from central government) to create safer road junctions on nine dangerous routes into Bristol. He hopes to create a cultural change in how people use the roads in the city. A long term target is that by 2025 20% of all journeys made in the city will be made on bicycles, a 400% increase over current levels. An ambitious target indeed.

On a national stage Boris Johnson has been one of the strongest advocates for better cycling provisions in the capital. Cycling superhighways, Boris bikes and maybe one day SKY cycling routes above the roads are all part of his vision.

At an international level our newest superstars are becoming household names. Sir Bradley Wiggins, Sir David Brailsford, Sir Chris Hoy, Mark Cavendish, Victoria Pendleton and Laura Trott to name but a few. These athletes are role models who offer us so much more than our highly paid footballers in the Premier League.

A quiet revolution.... I don't think so.

Bristol to Berne by Bike

Many readers will be familiar with the Bristol based charity Penny Brohn Cancer Care.

A former pupil of Tockington Manor School, Poppy Thompson (pictured left) who lives in Ingst, and whose family and friends have experienced cancer at first hand over several years, has decided to do something to help. So, after her GCSE exams this summer, Poppy is setting off with her cousin to cycle from Bristol to Switzerland, to raise money for the charity.

The route will take them from the Centre at 10am on 4th July, over Salisbury Plain, across the channel and into France. They will then skirt round Paris and head for the

mountains via Berne to finish at the foot of the majestic Eiger in Grindelwald. The challenge is about 760 miles over 10 days.

Penny Brohn Cancer Care changes the lives of people with cancer, and their families. Littleton - a very brief history

We bought an old farm house in Littleton in 1986 and after my son had completed his exams at a school in north west London we eventually moved in the following year.

The house still contains lots of old beams and features which despite the woodworm have survived for hundreds of years. Linda Hall in her book about Gloucestershire farmhouses describes the house as having clay mortar in the oldest part of the building which dates back to the fifteenth century, whilst the "new" part was added in the seventeenth century. We were also told that there was a tunnel which led to the church, or the river, or (and this was my husband's favourite) to the White Hart. Everyone we spoke to knew someone who had seen the entrance, or had been a little way down the tunnel, but the whereabouts of its exact position was never forthcoming.

This was exciting information to me as I have always been interested in history and I eagerly looked at the deeds, but what a disappointment to find that they only went back as far as 1898. Who had lived in the house during those six hundred years that it was known to have been on the site? In order to get clues about its previous inhabitants I began to find out more about the village of Littleton.

The area was known to our early ancestors; a flint axe was found on the higher, drier ground above the village and a Roman coin dating from the time of Vespasian (69-79 AD) or his son (Titus (79-81 AD) was discovered in a garden at Brick Cottages.

The first written record of a settlement here was in 986 when King Ethelred the Second was on the throne of England. He gave land "commonly called Lytletun" to one of his followers, a man called Wenoth. Wenoth later donated it to Malmesbury Abbey and it was owned by the Abbey when the Domesday Survey was taken in 1086. The Survey shows that there was a church with a priest, five hides of land, eight ploughs and about 70 – 80 people. The Abbey owned the village for the next five hundred years.

This ownership ended in 1539 when Henry VIII took possession of Malmesbury Abbey and its lands. He gave Littleton to one of his followers and then over the next five hundred years it passed from owner to owner with small areas of land gradually being sold off until the last Lord of the Manor to own a significant amount of land was Robert Cann Lippincott of Over Court. He owned 245 acres here in 1891. Littleton remained a small agricultural settlement of about twenty families and the two open fields Northfield and

Eastfield, with the remains of the strip system, can still be seen in places today.

In the late 1850s George Wintle opened a brickworks on the riverbank. He built ten cottages for his workers in the lane leading to the works and one for the foreman on the site. These new families increased the number of pupils to over fifty at the two room village school which was built in 1858. There was a teacher and an assistant: unfortunately many of the weekly entries in the school log are "nothing in particular". I suppose that, with fifty children to manage all week, the teacher would need to switch off at the weekend and not write detailed notes! Sally Taylor was the last pupil to be admitted to the school before it closed in 1965.

In 1871 George Wintle bought a single masted boat called the 'Matilda'. This he used to take the bricks to ports up and down the estuary, returning with coal which was sold in the neighbourhood. Sand was also collected in the estuary and used in the brick making process. The brickworks continued under various ownerships until the 1930s when it closed.

There was great excitement on 24th January 1885 when a sixty eight foot whale became beached in the pill. A large number of visitors arrived at Thornbury Station on special trains from Bristol and, together with local families, converged on Littleton causing traffic chaos. The whale was claimed by the Crown and taken away to Bristol. As it was now rapidly decaying, Littleton was glad to see it go. Another unexpected visitor to the river bank was in February 1954 when a Britannia on a test flight made a crash landing on the mud flats. No one was seriously injured but it proved impossible to recover the aeroplane and it was cut up for scrap and removed.

Have I found out more about previous owners of the house? Only a little. I know that there were various tenants in the house after 1851 and that before then Robert Taylor owned and lived there for thirty years and his father, William, was there for thirty five years before him. This takes it back to 1787. I think that I shall have to keep up my research for a bit longer...

Olveston Parish Council Matters

The Parish Council would like to welcome Mrs Sue Hunter, Mr Jamie Mayes and Mr Richard Panes who have kindly agreed to become Councillors, and wishes them well for the future. Both Mr Panes and Mr Mayes have already joined the Rec & Leisure Committee, while Mrs Hunter has joined the Planning Committee. At the recent Annual General Meeting of the Parish Council, Mrs Lyons was again elected as Chairman, with both Mrs Reid and Mr Hughes agreeing to stand as Vice-Chairmen. Mrs Webb is to continue her responsibility for Footpaths and the Environment, with Mr Baxter becoming chairman of the Projects Committee. There are always opportunities for others who are thinking about serving the Parish in this way to get involved. All are welcome to come along to Parish Meetings to find out what goes on.

The Parish Council has approved funding to help the Methodist Church set up internet facilities in Olveston for the benefit for all parishioners (more details to follow), and is helping the Jubilee Committee to purchase the first defibrillator for the Parish.

Recent meetings have been held with Olveston School and the School Travel Plan Group to alleviate traffic congestion around the School by providing additional parking on the Aust Road verge. However, this requires active support from parents to succeed.

Speeding through the Parish continues to be an issue, and it is hoped that the recently formed 'Speed Watch Group' will shortly begin active 'monitoring' at various points. Reducing the speed of everyone coming into each of the three villages, and more consideration being given to responsible parking to benefit traffic flow and avoiding parking close to junctions and blind corners, should reduce the risk of accidents and associated injuries to the benefit of all.

The trial Parish Council facebook page is now regularly updated and, with the Olveston Website as well as articles in this periodical and the notice boards sited round the Parish, the Council feels that it is better placed to inform parishioners of what is going on. However, to improve communications, feedback is vital and your views are always welcome.

Severn Estuary Flood Risk consultation The Environment Agency is consulting about flood prevention and management in this area and what it should do about it between now and 2060 – the consultation closes at the end of July. See www.environment-agency.gov.uk/severnestuary

Street parking in Aust village Residents and the Parish Council have been concerned about the number of commuter cars parked near the church, and also on Passage Road. We are discussing possible measures with South Glos Council and hope some measures can be taken. The Council doesn't think residents would like a formal yellow line scheme – which would anyway take at least two years and be costly - so any measures are likely to be advisory.

Woodwell Nature Reserve A national register of meadows is being prepared to commemorate 60 years from the Queen's coronation. There will be one from each local authority area, and it is likely that Woodwell will be the one in South Gloucestershire.

Flooding in Aust village Residents in some parts of Aust suffer periodical flooding. The Parish Council has for some time been pressing for proper measures to be undertaken to deal with this. The Council is keeping up the pressure but the matter is not helped by the number of agencies involved – the Environment Agency, South Glos Council, the Highways Agency and the South Glos Internal Drainage Board.

South Gloucestershire consultation on grass verge cutting

South Glos Council has proposed reducing the amount of grass cutting of verges, where this has been more than 2 cuts a year, one metre each side, and road safety measures. If parishes wish to have more done, then they will be asked to pay for it out of Parish Council funds – so there would be an increase in the Parish Council precept. It looked initially as if Aust might be asked for a high amount to cater for the grass around the Aust roundabout. However, after a meeting with South Glos Council, it has been agreed that there will be no extra charge on the residents of Aust parish.

New Permitted development rights for large home extensions The new law allowing larger rear extensions to houses came into force on 31 May. In general, house owners may now construct single storey extensions to the rear of a house, up to 8 metres (if detached) or 6 metres (in other cases) so long as they are not more than 4 metres high. No planning permission is required, but prior notification must be made to South Gloucestershire planning department.



Cook's Calendar: July

So many things in life are enjoyed for their scarcity; just as diamonds would not be put in rings if they were commonplace, so a perfect English summer's day would be unremarkable if we had more than a handful of them

This recipe is the encapsulation of English summer. Half of the ingredients could come from our garden, although I suggest frozen peas as it seems a shame to puree precious home grown ones. For me, it is the smell and taste of home in the sunshine which even my pea-hating husband loves as a part of our July ritual.

The only mildly taxing part of this recipe is taking the broad beans out of their papery shells. I pay my children to help with this, small fingers are remarkably agile. If you have no biddable children to hand, you could always pod to a podcast.

So, what to do with your glowing emerald bowl of summer goodness? It is very versatile. I like to spread it on bruschetta and have it as a starter; it is delicious with breadsticks as a dip or stirred through tagliatelle as a pasta sauce.

Broad Bean and Pea Puree

250g broad beans (weighed after they have been podded)
250g frozen petits pois
Juice of 1 lemon
A bunch of mint
3 tablespoons of olive oil, preferably extra-virgin
150g parmesan, grated

You need a food processor to make this recipe.

Get two saucepans on the boil. When they have reached boiling point, add the broad beans to one pan and the peas to the other. Allow them each to boil for five minutes, then drain them separately, putting each into a bowl of iced water. Chilling them quickly in this way keeps the amazing jewel-like colour.

When they are cold, drain again and put the peas into your food processor bowl. The broad beans need to be skinned, each of the papery white skins removed and the green inner bean put in the food processor. This may sound like a hassle but I never liked broad beans until I tried them this way, the taste is fresh and clean rather then muddied by the tough skin.

Add the mint leaves, oil and lemon juice, and pulse until chopped but still retaining some texture. Add the parmesan and pulse until the cheese is incorporated, but be careful not to lose the texture.

Eat in the sunshine with Pimms on a sunny day and capture the moment of English summer perfection.

Householders and community buildings all over the West of England are paying less for their heating oil by joining a community oil buying scheme run by a local charity, the West of England Rural Network (WERN). The scheme works by placing a single collective order at the beginning of every month, and having greater negotiating power with heating oil suppliers.

Scheme co-ordinator Jill Baker says: "Summer is a really good time to fill up your heating oil tank, as demand drops and prices tend to be lower. Members can order as little as 500 litres, and as infrequently as they choose, and still pay the negotiated price. The member oil price in May was 55.35p per litre (plus VAT at 5%). The annual membership fee is £20 for households, £30 for community buildings and £100 for businesses.

Dear Friends

GOD OUTSIDE THE BOX

A recent survey conducted in this country revealed that 76% of those questioned admitted to having some form of "religious or spiritual" experience. In a society that is so dominated by materialism and the scientific worldview, I find this is a surprisingly high percentage. As a Christian Minister I am fascinated as to why many of these spiritual people do not look for answers to their questions within the family of the Church. I have to ask "What are we doing wrong in the Church that means we are irrelevant to many of you who are reading this letter!?"

Most people who take the trouble to study the life of Jesus are drawn to Him as a very good man and wise teacher. Many non-religious people would say that if everyone followed His ethic of loving our neighbour the world would be a much better place. So why is the family of Jesus, the Church, not attracting people?

No doubt there are many different and complex reasons why people do not attend Church! Sadly, the Church is not without fault! Those of us who belong to the Church, have not always been as welcoming as we should. We have sometimes condemned people because we think they do not keep to "our standards". Some people think that we have made worship boring and uninspiring. We have not always cared for people with their needs as we should have done. We have not been prepared to search for ways to meet people who are asking the deep spiritual question and have conversations with them. For all these, and our other failings, we need God's forgiveness.

The main function of the Church is to introduce people into a living relationship with God through Christ (which, in essence, is what Christianity is). We inside the Church must listen to those who feel alienated from us and be prepared to move "out of our boxes"! The great genius of John and Charles Wesley, the founders of the Methodist movement in the eighteen century, was that they were prepared to go to where the people were and to listen to them and talk with them. They were also willing to help in practical, caring ways. As well as preaching, the Wesleys set up clinics and dispensaries for the sick, visited the prisons, provided food for the hungry and schools and orphanages for children. Actions must back up words.

For me, as someone who has been privileged to experience something of the wonderful spiritual richness and fulfilment within the family of Christian believers, I want to help those now outside of the Church to discover the difference that knowing Jesus can make to everyday living. How tragic if we have shut Jesus up within the "box" of our churchy institutions and worship, so that people cannot find Him!
