#### Village Person Introducing Tim Pyper – clerk to Aust Parish Council

Tim and his wife Phyllida have lived at Stock Farm, Littleton for twenty five years. They moved to the Bristol area thirty seven years ago when Tim started at Lawrence and Co, a well established Bristol law firm. He has just retired after a distinguished career, culminating in being awarded the first 'Lifetime Achievement in law for legal practitioner' by the Law Society. The many facets of the nomination included being a Past President of the Law Society; playing a pivotal role in the development of the firm during his working life from thirty employees to seven hundred; being a long term member of the solicitor's assistance scheme, which provides free help and advice to other solicitors on financial and partnership issues; being a member of the Bristol Chamber of Commerce and playing a central role in the development of three charities.

In 1990 Tim was invited by a client to visit a ninety foot cutter moored in Bristol, run by the charity Fairbridge. This works with young people aged 13-25, giving them the self-confidence and skills they need to change their lives. The charity helps young people facing issues ranging from school exclusion and homelessness to anti-social behaviour and crime and substance abuse, by offering them personal support and opportunity in the form of a wide range of challenging and structured courses and projects. The Bristol branch was about to close and Tim was so impressed that he helped to start a fund-raising committee, did six years as chairman and is still involved.

Tim was the fourth generation of his family to go to Cambridge University and his son George made it the fifth. His mother died when he was six and his father married a family friend who was widowed. His father died when he was sixteen and Tim says he was a poisonous teenager, but maybe he exaggerates! He and Phyllida were married in 1969 – she is an Oxford graduate so there's always a row on boat race day. Tim and Phyllida have a daughter Zoe, who has two girls, and a son George who has two boys, all living in the Home Counties.

Tim has been treasurer of Littleton Parochial Parish Council for over ten years, and also represents them on Deanery Synod. Phyllida was deputy chairman of Aust Parish Council up to seven years ago and incidentally, since then, is just completing her second degree, in Italian! Having retired, Tim felt he hadn't been involved enough locally, so has taken over the job of clerk to the Aust Parish Council from Tom Fothergill, who was ready to retire after twenty four years. Aust Parish includes Elberton and Littleton and the Council usually consists of three people from Aust and two each from Elberton and Littleton. Naturally Aust has a small budget, but Tim is looking forward to interesting planning issues in the offing, including Whale Wharf.

It's great living in our villages: escaping the noise and dust of the city, green fields, nature and fresh air. But, escaping comes at a price; commuting and getting to be where we need to be demands some transportation and for most of us

this means using a car

However, fuel prices are high and although things might change (we will have a new Government by the time you read this), I cannot remember any manifesto pledges to lower motoring costs. Meanwhile, at council level, South Gloucestershire, and the other former Avon councils, have teamed up with "Liftshare" and created a car-sharing website.

Might it work for you? Would you share a car or give someone a lift? It would help with costs, introduce you to new friends and (if you're ever coming back from Warmley) allow you to use the 2+ car lane.

Our community website, <u>www.olvestonandaust.com</u> has a link to the councils' site, it's on our home page under "Car-Sharing". This directs you (one more click) to 2Carshare.com

You have to register (well, you will want to know a little bit about who you are going to share your car with) but it's free. Once registered you'll be able to enter your own journey and see whether anyone else travels your route.

The scheme can be used for regular journeys or for one-off events. And you don't have to be a driver; you can be a passenger looking for a driver. Have a look and see whether it would be useful to you. It's free to join and the savings are yours. You can even calculate what your car is costing you just in case you need any more convincing.

This popular social event could not be held last year because of the alterations in the church. This year it will be held, once again, at the Parish Church of St.Mary the Virgin, Olveston, on Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> June at 7.30pm by kind permission of The Rev. Philip Rowe and the P.C.C.

The Walker organ in the church was donated by John Henshaw Britton, industrialist and organist of repute, and was moved from a special small theatre at his home Shortwood Lodge to St.Mary's Church and dedicated in 1990 by Bishop David Cartwright. The wood carving on the organ casing depicts John Britton holding a shoe and Mrs. Nan Bernays, his sister, a much loved member of this parish, holding a bunch of flowers, as she was one of a group of those dedicated to providing floral arrangements for the church. Since the installation of the organ, there has been a recital given by distinguished organists each year in their memory.

This year David Bednall, Sub-Organist at Bristol Cathedral, will be performing works by a variety of composers. He has recorded a critically acclaimed CD of choral music and performed widely on cathedrals in the United Kingdom and France, and also as stunt organist in Dr.Who!



### Recipe of the Month

Focaccia Bread with Rapeseed Oil

30g yeast (fresh) 550ml warm water, plus more if needed 1kg strong flour 30g sea salt 118ml Rapeseed oil

#### For the Topping

tbsp fresh rosemary, chopped without the stalks
tbsp thyme leaves
tbsp fennel top, chopped
garlic cloves peeled and sliced
sea salt to taste
rapeseed oil

Crumble the yeast into the warm water and mix until smooth. Put the flour and salt into the bowl of an electric mixer with the dough hook in place. Start the motor and slowly pour in the yeast mixture, then the rapeseed oil. Knead until it becomes smooth and elastic. Don't be alarmed if it looks sloppy as it will pull together. Lightly grease a large bowl and turn out the dough into it. Cover with a clean damp tea towel and place next in a warm place if possible until it has doubled in size.

While the dough is proving (or rising), mix together the herbs, garlic, salt and enough rapeseed oil to slacken the mixture. When the bread has had its first proving, knock it back by punching the air out. Line a large roasting tin with a large piece of bake-o-glide and shape the dough in the tin, stretching it to fit. Pour over the herb oil and, using your fingers, press the oil and herbs into the dough, giving it a dimpled effect. Leave in the tin to rise again.

When dough has doubled in size, place the tin in a pre-heated oven to 220degreesC/ 425 degreesF/gas7 and bake for 30/35 minutes. Once out, move to a wire rack for cooling.

#### Rapeseed oil and Lemon dip

Juice of 2 lemons, 5 tbsp rapeseed oil salt and pepper, 1 tbsp capers 2 garlic cloves, 2 tbsp oregano Whizz all the ingredients together in a food processor and keep in a jar. It will last a week in the fridge. Use as a cold dip for the bread and enjoy..

### Google Map

Back in March you will remember that the villagers of Broughton, near Milton Keynes, were outraged to find pictures of their homes on Google maps and fought to have them removed.

Now you have the chance to form your own opinion because some of us are already on the site. Internauts amongst us can go to http://maps.google.co.uk/maps and have a look. You have to key in an address or a postcode into the search banner.

When the map appears, there is a link to "more" on the left hand side; if available there is an option for "street view" (otherwise 'greyed out') and clicking here will zoom you down to the street. You can navigate to and fro along the street, moving in the direction of the arrows or moving the viewing rectangle and zoom into points of interest.

My own 'investigations' showed that Olveston, Tockington, Littleton and Old Down can be seen but not yet our friends in Aust. Is it an intrusion or an interesting take on our villages today? I leave you to decide.

### Problems with your computer?

South Gloucestershire Trading Standards would like to remind residents to be wary of unsolicited calls, whether by telephone or at your door.

Trading Standards have been made aware of a telephone scam currently in practice whereby the caller rings unsolicited, claiming to be from Microsoft. The caller then goes on to explain that there have been reports of slow computer connections in the area and that they can guide you through the steps necessary to combat this problem via your computer. The caller does not advise of there being any charge until the process has been completed and then they ask for a one-off fee of £100.

It is not clear whether the steps taken on the computer actually have any effect on the connection speed or are designed for any other purpose e.g. hacking to obtain personal information.

Instances such as this highlight the need for people to be vigilant when they receive unsolicited telephone calls. If you receive such a call, be suspicious. If they claim to be from Microsoft or another well known company, ring them directly to verify, using a number found in the telephone directory or their website. Never give out your personal or financial details over the telephone unless you are certain with whom you are dealing.

If you are at all in doubt, hang up!

### War and Peace

The Singers' concerts will be held at **Alveston Methodist Church on Tuesday 8th June and at Thornbury Baptist Church on Saturday 19th June; both starting at 7:30pm**. As with all their concerts, admission is free and there will be a collection in aid of The Willow Trust and Home Start Bristol.

### Volunteering with a difference!

The numbers of people entering prison aged 50 and over has trebled in the past twenty years and Age Concern Older Offender Project was realised to address the particular needs of this group within the prison environment and towards release and resettlement.

The project aims to help reduce re-offending by offering rehabilitative type services and to develop social and awareness skills. The project is to be involved with the running of a centre at Leyhill, for all men aged 50 and over. ### Did You Know?

In the heyday of sailing ships, all war ships and many freighters carried iron cannons. Those cannons fired round iron cannon balls... It was necessary to keep a good supply near the cannon. However, how to prevent them from rolling about the deck? The best storage method devised was a square-based pyramid with one ball on top, resting on four resting on nine, which rested on sixteen. Thus, a supply of 30 cannon balls could be stacked in a small area right next to the cannon. There was only one problem...how to prevent the bottom layer from sliding or rolling from under the others. The solution was a metal plate called a 'Monkey' with 16 round indentations.

However, if this plate were made of iron, the iron balls would quickly rust to it. The solution to the rusting problem was to make 'Brass Monkeys.'

Few landlubbers realize that brass contracts much more and much faster than iron when chilled. Consequently, when the temperature dropped too far, the brass indentations would shrink so much that the iron cannonballs would come right off the monkey. Thus, it was quite literally, 'Cold enough to freeze the balls off a brass monkey'. (All this time, you thought that was an improper expression, didn't you.)

### Parish Assembly

The annual Parish Assembly was held on Thursday 29<sup>th</sup> April – very many thanks to those who attended. The following is a précis of the Chairman's report:

The Chairman welcomed everyone, and advised that all the Councillors were wearing their new identity badges. We have a full complement of 9 Councillors and Mr Riddle, District Councillor, attended 8 meetings. All the Councillors remained on the same committees as last year, with the same Chairmen. Once again, the Council has not raised the precept, and has money in reserve. Some of

this will be used for the Tockington play area. The clerk's salary is in line with ALCA recommendations.

During the year, 5 parishioners attended our meetings, to discuss the proposed development on the Mill site, and the proposed refurbishment of the Parish Hall at Tockington for the Pre-School (who received confirmation of a grant of £350,000). We also had two speakers – Reehana Sayeed with some of the young people of the area to discuss a youth project, and the Chairman of the Standards Committee to discuss their role in promoting good conduct and minimise complaints against Councillors. We also had two visitors to observe our meetings.

I would like to thank all the local clubs who have leases with the Parish Council for their continued success.

Last year things went well: the Parish Council is becoming Holding Trustee for the Parish Hall at Tockington and is pleased to be involved with the new development of the Hall; three new notice boards have been erected in the villages and a donation given for the new notice board at the Parish Hall in Tockington. The Council was very impressed with the IT suite at Olveston School and awarded a perpetual shield and 2 medals and gift vouchers for excellence in IT work. The youth of the Parish benefited from a summer course in Vicarage Lane and a week away, plus the use of facilities in Turnberries; the Council hopes this initiative will continue. The Council is also considering new play equipment in the Tockington play area, which will entail seeking out grants. We also hope to renew safety surfaces under the play equipment

Parking at Olveston School and in general throughout the villages still poses a problem and the Council had a recent meeting with South Gloucestershire Council to discuss this. We also get complaints about dog fouling, and would ask dog owners to show more consideration and clear up after their pets.

The Recreation and Leisure Committee of four have monitored the play areas weekly throughout the year, maintenance work has been carried out as required and new signage installed, grass cutting has been monitored and leases for the Scouts and the Tennis Club renewed. Remedial work has been done between the Football Club and the Scouts land. Some dangerous trees at Old Down have been removed. The committee continues to work with the Police to ensure that the play areas are safe and not abused.

The planning committee of four has dealt with 47 planning applications, about 1/3 less than last year, and has attended site meetings, including the Scouts at Woodhouse Down, and the appeal for Windmill House car park. The committee has no further information regarding a suitable site for affordable housing.

Footpaths and the Environment: for most of the year the footpaths have been very wet and overgrown. Repairs have been carried out on stiles and kissing

gates have been installed. The chestnut trees on the Aust Road were pollarded as they were becoming unsafe, and new lime trees have been planted. The footpath by the Parish Hall has been cut back, and | would remind dog walkers that dogs should be kept on leads whilst walking through fields with cattle or horses.

Thanks are due to Footpaths Warden Peter Cabban, and to Rod Williams and parishioners who carried out two very successful "litter pickers" events, and those who co-ordinated the Village of the Year entries, as well as those who look after the bus shelters and planters and the Recreation and Leisure committee members who planted spring bulbs around the Parish. I also hope that more parishioners will use our footpaths and enjoy our beautiful countryside and remember to take their litter home.

On behalf of the Councillors, I would also like to thank Matthew Riddle, our District Councillor and the Police for all their help over the year, and Dave Webb who keeps our property well maintained and repaired. I would also like to thank the clerk for all her hard work and my fellow Councillors who give generously of their time, ensuring the Parish Council runs smoothly.
