

So you thought John and Mary had always been an item?

On 25th June, 1954, the London Gazette recorded that by order of Her Majesty in Council, the Chapelry of Aust (St John's) was detached from the parish of Henbury and attached to St Mary's Olveston.

The order ended a link between Henbury and Aust which went back to the time when the parish system was being introduced in England, about 1000 years ago. Henbury was an exceptionally large parish extending from the mouth of the river Avon along the Severn as far as Aust. As a result several small chapels were needed for parishioners who could not always be expected to travel into Henbury, especially across ground which was often waterlogged. Over the centuries, Aust's connection with Henbury/Westbury left its mark: the association of John Wycliffe's name with Aust (strictly speaking, the other way round), the medieval, perpendicular architecture of St John's nave and chancel, the seventeenth century re-ordering and benefactions through the Astry family of Henbury, and the total renovation initiated by the Vicar of Henbury in 1866 to create the church as it is today. For many centuries, Henbury had to ensure that Aust had its own paid curate.

But in the twentieth century, as the population of Henbury expanded and money became tighter, the diocese obtained the agreement of the Church Commissioners to attach Aust to Olveston. Aust was perhaps not enthusiastic at losing its longstanding heritage; but it was everyone's good fortune that the Vicar of Olveston at the time, David Cartwright, fully appreciated the sensitivities and gave care and energy to ensuring that the new association came to life.

The extent to which the relationship had consolidated over the years became fully apparent in the late 1990s when the Diocese proposed to the Church Commissioners that in the interests of the Severnside churches as a whole Aust should be moved on again. With Olveston's support, Aust reacted with vigorous opposition; the idea was withdrawn.

On Sunday 22nd June this year, to mark the 60th anniversary, St Mary's congregation will join Aust for a service of thanksgiving at 11am. The preacher will be Dr David Hoyle, the Dean of Bristol, and David Shaw and St Mary's choir will lead the music. The service will be followed by an informal lunch in the Barn at Aust, and afterwards, Roly the clown (our own Rev'd Roly Bain) will entertain.

This service will be a *double* thanksgiving, also marking the renewal of St John's roof, following 4 thefts of lead between 2010 and 2013. The Church has been re-roofed in steel (which is much less vulnerable to theft) and a cross atop the nave restored, all at a cost of £55,000, which has been met in full; a cause for thanksgiving indeed. Olveston has supported the fund-raising in many ways; and if you have bought a ticket for Aust's Christmas Grand Draw, or sponsored *Ride and Stride*, or attended the annual Ball in Tockington Manor School, or shopped at last year's Christmas Fair in the Methodist Church, you too have contributed. So thank you, and if you would like to join us at Aust for the celebrations on 22nd June, we would be delighted to welcome you.

The evening before is also a draw: *The Great Western Chorus* has been booked for a *Midsummer Concert* in the Barn; look out for further details of the entire weekend.

2014 Olveston Annual Parish Assembly

– Summary of the Address by Mrs June Lyons, Chair of Olveston Parish Council (draft minutes available on the Olveston website).

After welcoming everyone to the Parish Hall, Mrs Lyons **introduced new Councillors** - Mrs Sue Hunter, Mr Jamie Mayes, Mr Richard Panes, Mr Geoff Chappell and Mr Geoff Anderson. Recently Mrs Jane Webb and Mr Tony Heming left the Council, and Mrs Lyons thanked them for all their work since October 2007. Mrs Webb was responsible for Footpaths and Environment, had an interest in local healthcare issues and was latterly part of the Planning Committee. Mr Heming's knowledge and expertise was a great asset to the Planning Committee, and he was the representative to the local Churches.

Parish Council meetings are open to all and District Councillor, Mr Matthew Riddle regularly attends. In June the Parish Council discussed the creation of a parking area on the Aust Road verge, inviting Mr R Lloyd (who had questions about construction and utilisation), Mr M Anderson (concerned at how the project was being communicated) and Mrs M Evans (representing the School Travel Plan Parent Group and who wished to thank the Parish Council for their support over many years championing the safety of children being taken to and from school). In July, additional costs being passed down by South Glos Council as part of their consultation on Streetcare Services to make £43million savings were discussed. Mr Michael Dixon representing South Glos detailed options available for grass cutting and dog bin collection, whilst Mr R Lloyd expressed his concerns over the consequences of not maintaining the verge adequately. In September, the Parish Vision Committee provided an update on their questionnaire, and requested that the Parish Council support and administer a £2,000 grant that they had applied for. To promote other Grants available from South Glos, Mr John Hesketh presented to the March meeting of the Recreation & Leisure Committee and representatives from the local Sports Clubs.

The War Memorial steps have been rebuilt and the adjoining walls repaired. The Parish Council is grateful for the many positive comments on the good job the stonemasons have done, and very grateful for the donations received and the support from all those involved. With a generous donation from St. Mary's Church and a grant from South Glos Council, the Parish Council has constructed the **parking area on the Aust Road verge** primarily for those dropping off / collecting children from School. With donations from the Diamond Jubilee Committee, St. Mary's Church and the Sports & Social Clubs based at Old Down, three **defibrillators** have been purchased. Thank you to everyone who facilitated the installations, contributed or helped in any way with this very worthwhile project.

The Projects Committee under Mr A Baxter's chairmanship has also created the internet café in conjunction with the Methodist Church, and a facebook page on the internet. Ongoing projects include identifying a site for a new burial ground, digitising Parish documents and accessing Wi-Fi for Parish meetings.

The Recreation & Leisure Committee has met monthly under the chairmanship of Mr J Hughes to ensure regular maintenance of the parish play areas, and associated land & buildings. The Parish Council has recently negotiated a further 25 year lease on the Vicarage Play Area with South Glos Council; redecorated a substantial part of the Pavilion in line with a 5 year refurbishment programme; and, Mr R Panes is working with the various Sports Clubs at Old Down to improve parking, and to get better access to grants and funding.

The Planning Committee chaired by Mrs I Reid has considered 66 applications this year, of which South Glos Council has approved 43, and 6 were refused. Additionally, 5 were withdrawn and 12 remain pending. Whilst South Glos Council doesn't always agree with the Parish Council, it is hoped that as representatives for our parishioners, our views are taken into consideration. Parish Council representatives have also attended the 'Olveston Wind Farm Action Group' (OWAG) meetings.

The Parish was better prepared this year for the wettest winter on record, as the drains had been cleared and some of the hot spots sorted with the help of South Glos Council. Part time lighting (switched off 00:00 – 05:00) was also introduced by South Glos Council, and in August the final stretch of footpath was completed from Old Down to Alveston.

Thanks to volunteers, the redundant **telephone boxes** have been painted and cared for. The Tockington Box is successfully used for book swapping and more importantly a collection point for canned food that is taken weekly to the Thornbury Baptist Church for distribution to those in need – the organisers would like to thank all who contribute.

The Parish Council is keen to **improve the local environment** and would like to thank South Glos Council for trimming the bank at the top of Haw Lane and those house holders who ensure that footpaths are not overhung by bushes. The Parish Council is also actively supporting the residents at Daldry Gardens in discussions with Merlin Housing Association regarding the poor state of the lawns, shrubs and gardens. A £155 grant has been secured to buy daffodil bulbs, for autumn planting around the parish. Particular thanks go to Rod Williams who continues as our Footpath Warden and also organizes the litter picks.

Mrs Lyons concluded on behalf of the Council, by thanking the Leaseholder Chairmen and Committees for continuing to provide so many activities in our parish; our contractors RGS, Dave Webb, Jim Hallett, Mike Taylor, and the Clerk. Finally she thanked fellow Councillors for all their hard work, the time they give and their support throughout the year.

Ingst Windfarm Community Benefit Group

As you are aware, the Parish Councils of Olveston, Aust and Pilning and Severn Beach are the most affected by the proposed development of a wind farm at Ingst.

The three Parish Councils have agreed to work together to establish a Community Benefit Fund with the developer. This action does not affect the Councils' opposition to the development, but is necessary to protect the potential use of the funds for local parishioners.

A working group (Community Benefit Group) has been set up involving all three Councils – it has taken legal advice to ensure all current and potential aspects of the fund are covered in the negotiations with the developer in reaching an agreement with them.

It is most probable a Company limited by guarantee will be formed with 6 Directors (2 appointed by each Parish Council) – the purpose of the Company will be to decide how the monies received from the developer will be spent. We anticipate the developer will pay £5,000 per annum for each megawatt (MW) of installed capacity of the wind farm. The developer has applied for two turbines of 2 to 2.5MW each so potentially generating £25,000 a year for 25 years – it is anticipated the agreement will include an annual increase in line with the RPI.

It is essential a legal framework is in place to guarantee payment of this Community Benefit by the developer – this does not and will not affect the three Parish Councils' opposition to the development.

The telephone box outside the Swan in Tockington has been operating as a Book Swap and Food Bank Collection point since late last year and it has been a heart-warming success. Swanky book shelves have been donated as well as a posh green carpet so thanks to everyone who has shared their books or left provisions for the food bank. Donations to the Thornbury Food Bank are collected weekly and there is always something there - which is lovely.

Since the Thornbury Food Bank started operating in June last year, it has distributed over 3200 meals at an average of 112 per week and your donations have gone towards helping 221 adults and 125 children.

We all hope that the need for a Food Bank will disappear in time but, in the meanwhile, let's keep buying that extra tin when we go shopping and keep the Tockington Tardis busy.

Don't forget, all non-perishables are appreciated and there is a list posted inside the telephone box of items that are particularly needed.

Flights of Fancy – Woodpeckers Trevor Cook

Although there are properly four woodpeckers that grace our country, mostly we see the two commonest varieties in our parishes.

Of the two commonest, the Green Woodpecker is the largest and is often heard with its strange high pitched laughing call like a soprano Kookaburra. More often it is to be found to be found out in a field, or even on your lawn, seeking out ants to eat. The male is the one with the red stripe under its eye as well as on top of its head.

The second type is the Great Spotted Woodpecker which is easy to identify as it is the black and white one with a red head and underbelly. The male has more red on its belly. It too has a very recognisable call; it gives out a very sharp, short, “tschep” sound and once you learn it you will always know when one’s around. In the spring you will also hear it attracting attention by drumming on a tree branch somewhere high up. I heard one on the lane to Mumbleys recently.

Despite its colour and beauty the Great Spotted has a tainted reputation for either drilling its way into nest boxes or sitting in wait for fledglings as they pop out.

From a distance all woodpeckers can be instantly recognised by the way they fly; they have an undulating flight where, after a few wing flaps, their wing close and they drop, making them look like they are riding a roller coaster.

The third member of the family is the Lesser Spotted Woodpecker which is quite rare. It is

similar to the Great Spotted except it is quite small; more sparrow size. One was seen on Severnside in 2012. Its rarity is partly due to its size and also because it tends to move around in the uppermost branches of a tree

For completeness, the final member of the family is the Wryneck which is a small grey and brown bird, a ground loving, ant-eating bird, a summer visitor and a rarity.

The daylight hours have stretched to their longest of the year and the summer solstice is welcomed in a variety of celebrations.

Extra light is one of the very reasons most birds have migrated north. On the equator, where many have come from, there will still be twelve hours of sun and twelve hours of night. Here in the northern hemisphere the extended daylight gives parents of insatiable chicks hours more time for hunting and feeding. There isn't much singing now, as all available time is taken up with cramming as many bugs as possible into forever hungry mouths.

Luckily insects are abundant. Different species of butterfly dance in their preferred places; Meadow Browns enjoy long grass, but for Common Blues; short grass is their ideal. Down by the water side all the damselflies will have become adults, iridescent reds and blues zig zagging around the banks. Knowing what habitats creatures prefer can help so much in knowing what to look out for on a walk.


Down in the woods trees close their canopies, their leaves mellowing to deeper shades of green. Woodland flowers, lacking light, will turn their attention to seed development. But this is 'Flaming June' and colour is everywhere: Clover, Daisies, Buttercups and even Orchids dapple the fields. Dog Roses and pink Bramble flowers brighten hedges, interspersed with creamy plates of Elderflowers and Rowan flowers in the trees.

As eventually the sun sets, our nocturnal mammals are venturing out. It's worth a late dusk walk to see bats chasing moths. Badgers are at their most active outside their setts in June. All this can be seen just outside the village on many of the footpath walks. Otters have even been spotted near the centre of Bristol. So wherever you are don't stop looking for little wonders of nature all around.



I used to work in a radio studio in Gloucester, and above the mixing desk was a large sign that read “in the event of equipment failure RTFM”. I once asked the engineer what it meant and he said rather gruffly “read the manual”. (Please don’t ask me to explain!)

Faith, of whatever variety, usually has a manual of some kind. Anglicans would cite the Bible, the Thirty Nine Articles and the ancient traditions of the church. Methodists would add that nothing contrary to the honest conscience can be added, which seems a pretty good idea to me. In fact every faith I can think of has some kind of foundational document, some kind of scripture. But ancient traditions in any faith can modulate into culture and custom. The edges get rounded off with use and we reach a state where faith amounts to nothing much more than “the way we do things round here”.

So when the Prime Minister pronounces that we are a Christian country he may be right in the sense that our culture has been moulded by many centuries of Christianity. But the present Archbishop of Canterbury’s response is also true and more important. It would be far more accurate to describe us as living in a “post Christian” country. My everyday experience as a parish priest suggests that these days, huge numbers of people need the words of the Lord’s Prayer to be printed, and have no idea of any hymns nor especially the stories of the Bible. If this is a criticism, it’s aimed at the Church and not at the people we’ve failed.

Possibly, we Christians have lost our pastoral heart for the very people we’re meant to be looking out for: the poor, the outcasts, the sick and the prisoners; and at the heart of the malaise (the equipment failure if you like) lies the very thing that the Prime Minister seemed to be applauding.

If this is a Christian country, too often it’s a form of cultural Christianity, “faith lite” if you like, and it’s being held by fewer and fewer people each year. Neither a reversion to the BCP, the King James Bible and Darke in A Minor on a Sunday will fill that void, nor will drums and synthesizers and banging on about Jesus being my boy friend automatically appeal to the young; and most certainly our endless bickering about sexuality and women’s ministry neutralizes any other attempts we might make to be ‘relevant’. But to return to where I started; perhaps this is a good time to return to the ‘manual’ to find those places where we drifted away from the original calling. Because we’re human, the bits of faith that most often get smoothed over and rounded down are the hard bits, the bits that demand that we step away from the status quo and change our ways. The Bible is a tough read and it’s not optional!
