

Tockington girl strides ahead at the London Marathon

A huge round of spontaneous applause echoed around the hall at Tockington Manor School, when Headmaster Stephen Symonds announced that Year 8 pupil Dalis Jones came 6th in the U'13 girls London Mini Marathon just behind the GB Number 1 runner. Dalis led the pack for most of the three mile course but was overtaken by five very strong runners near to the finish line, completing the race in 17 minutes 30 seconds, a fantastic achievement just 29 seconds behind the winner who broke the course record.

Deputy Headmaster Jonathan Jones, who is also Dalis' father, said "We are immensely

proud of Dalis. She has had a fantastic cross country season and this really is the icing on the cake." Dalis is the Gloucestershire League CC Champion, the Gwent League CC champion and the National CC Silver Medalist. She is also the National Prep Schools Cross Country Champion 2017.

Washingpool Hill Residents' Association.

Towards the end of 2016, the residents on the lower part of Washingpool Hill were becoming increasingly anxious about the volume and speed of traffic on the Hill, together with worries over what appeared to be the dangerous way in which coaches often parked outside Tockington Manor School.

The concern was so great that every one of the nine property owners on the lower part of Washingpool Hill eagerly signed up to form a properly constituted Residents' Association.

Washingpool Hill Residents' Association (WHRA) declared a mission statement: 'to ensure the safety of all users of Washingpool Hill by seeking traffic calming measures on the road in an aesthetically pleasing manner.'

Members were aware of traffic problems throughout Tockington and Olveston but it quickly became clear that Washingpool Hill was the start of a 'rat run' from the A38 to the Severn Bridge all the way through the villages. Bearing in

mind that this road is unclassified, with many blind bends and single track sections, it seemed illogical for the speed limit to be 60 mph – not just unsafe, but extremely dangerous.

The scope of WHRA's aspirations was therefore extended to include discussion about the whole traffic scene in Tockington and Olveston. Consideration was even given – and is still ongoing – to the possibility of a professional and independent study of traffic.

There are indications that the coach-parking problem outside Tockington Manor School is at least under review and might possibly be resolved in the not too distant future. In the meantime, WHRA will continue to press for action on resolving road safety.

Phil Biddle, landlord of the Fox Inn, Old Down, is indeed local: born in Alveston, educated for one year at Thornbury Grammar School before moving to the brand new Marlwood Comprehensive School for the rest of his education. After school he worked at the Cranbrook TV shop in Thornbury High Street, which more recently housed Hard Pressed for Time; incidentally, as they have moved to St Mary's Precinct, the old Cranbrook sign is now back in evidence.



After twelve years he decided to travel the world, from Australia and New Zealand via the Cook Islands to Mexico and the United States. This took nearly two years and of the seven who started out on the trip. Phil and a friend were the last to come back. Back home he stayed with his brother in Thornbury and met his future wife Lynn, a near neighbour. They married in 2007 and Phil became father to Lynn's three children, and he has just become a grandfather.

Various jobs followed until in 1999 they decided to buy a pub, so Phil spent a year at the White Hart,

Littleton learning the ropes. In 2000, the Fox came up for sale and seventeen years later business is booming. It was a bit of a financial struggle at first; they had to extend the dining room and add a family room and new toilets. The kitchen had a much needed refurbishment and today is home to three full time chefs. Later the interior was redecorated and refurnished and he now employs fifteen people locally.

It is a Freehouse, an increasing rarity these days, which offers the chance for Phil to serve whatever he likes. It is mostly a drink orientated pub with a wide variety of local beers, yet today food accounts for fifty percent of the turnover compared with ten percent originally. Most of the beers and food are sourced locally.

Phil and Lynn divide their time between living upstairs and their duplex in Portishead Marina. Their daughter Jessica runs the bar and other members of the family have helped in the past and may again, so Phil no longer needs to be hands on full time. Life is good; the family Biddle have no intention of moving on, and look forward to welcoming you at the Fox.

Vegetable Matter

Marelin knows I have an allotment in Olveston and she asked if from time to time I would contribute some reflections for Meeting Point readers on matters vegetable, as it were. Since she kindly agreed to take over as Editor from me, I was hardly in a position to refuse, was I? On the other hand, she probably didn't realise what an amateur she was approaching.

So I'm not well placed to offer expert ideas or observations of my own. However, I do of course have many expert neighbours on the allotments, so my thinking is that I will use it as an opportunity to chat with some of them and see if, at the same time as getting some tips for myself, I can garner something interesting to write about.

This month I talked to my immediate neighbour Jerry Harding, who really is an expert, with a passion for organic cultivation of vegetables and a deep knowledge derived from professional experience. I noticed that he was planting some seeds in a separate little bed, so I asked him what they were. Turned out they were brassicas for transplanting later on. What I found interesting was his explanation of their destination.

Elsewhere in the plot, Jerry showed me his broad bean plants, springing up enthusiastically like everybody else's. He explained to me that the half-moon shapes that were being removed from their leaf edges (and even more extensively from mine!) are due to the ravages of weevils, but that they were not going to cause any serious problem for the bean plants.



However, unlike my beans, his are planted in double rows, each with plants in two parallel lines a few inches apart. The reason for this is that when the beans are finished and the foliage has been removed, Jerry will leave the roots to rot in the ground, and transplant his infant brassicas into the corridor between the two lines where the broad beans had been.

Evidently, in his experience the bean roots will have fixed enough nitrogen to benefit the brassicas. So I will watch those plants with great interest. Only trouble is, watching the plants on Jerry's plot always makes me feel very inferior!

"Curious Works & Stately Lodgings" - The Art of Thornbury Castle

A NEW exhibition at Thornbury & District Museum, Chapel Street

A Grand Design

In about 1507, one of the highest ranking and richest men in the country began altering his manor house at Thornbury in order to create a fortified, palatial residence. Edward Stafford, Third Duke of Buckingham, already owned eleven castles and thousands of acres of land spread out around England and Wales but decided to build Thornbury Castle as his power base. It was strategically placed to give him good access to most of his properties, while still allowing him to attend the King's Court in London when required.

Although the defensive parts of the castle seemed to hark back to medieval times, the new residential accommodation incorporated many features of the latest style, taking inspiration from the recently erected Richmond Palace, built by Henry VII.

Downfall

Buckingham did not live to complete the works. Perceived by Henry VIII as a threat to the throne, the duke was tried for treason and everything he owned was taken by the Crown. The scroll pictured above, which reads "Nat: 1477. Decap: 1521", spells out his fate. Born (Latin: *Natus*) in 1477, he was beheaded (Latin: *Decapitatus*) in 1521.

Aftermath

King Henry granted many of the estates to his own followers but he held on to Thornbury Castle, perhaps because of the quality of the impressive building, with its beautiful gardens and three nearby hunting parks. The king's surveyors had reported that, 'The south side is fully finished with curious works and stately lodgings' – here the word 'curious' meant skilfully made or rare. We have chosen this phrase for the name of our exhibition.

Princess Mary (later Mary I) stayed at the castle for about eighteen days in 1525, attended by a huge entourage of two to three hundred advisers and servants. Similarly King Henry VIII stopped at the castle twice on royal progress. The first time, in 1535, he was also accompanied by Queen Anne Boleyn and his first minister Thomas Cromwell. In 1554 Mary I returned the castle to the Staffords, but they could not afford to maintain it.

It is thought that they removed and sold roof tiles, lead, window glass and many structural timbers to raise money to repair Stafford Castle. Much of the remaining structure of Thornbury Castle then slowly fell into ruin, although a section near the inner gateway was kept habitable for the steward. In the 1850s the castle was restored by the Howard family.

The legacy of Buckingham's 'Grand Design' survived him. Thornbury Castle is described as one of the finest examples of Tudor domestic architecture in the country.

Our new exhibition

The exhibition looks at some of the finer points of the building's architecture and how this magnificent residence was adorned in Tudor times. Did aspects of Buckingham's lifestyle and the running of his great household contribute to his downfall? It comments on the mid-19th century restoration and shows how Thornbury Castle has been represented in art and photography over the centuries.

Free entry to this exhibition and to the rest of our local museum, run entirely by volunteers. Open to all: Tues to Fri 1 - 4pm, Sat 10am - 4pm.

Thornbury Open Gardens



Solution to May's puzzle

Aust Parish Council Matters

Aust Parish Council Annual Meeting

The annual meeting took place on Tuesday April 11th at Elberton Village Hall.

Katie Scaife, of the Forgotten Landscape Team, gave us an interesting talk about the programme. The project is a study to increase knowledge about our part of the Severn Valley below the 10m contour line from Avonmouth to Berkeley. Projects so far include the registration and survey of old orchards, surveys of the great crested newt and water vole populations, and taking of oral histories. There have also been training and educational events throughout the area.

Plans include proposals, subject to the necessary permissions, to make a 'feature' of the former Aust Ferry Ticket Office, for a Victorian styled bench to be placed at/near Littleton Pill or on Littleton Green, and three toposcopes, probably at Woodwell Meadows, Whale Wharf and Littleton Green. Another plan is to create a circular walk between the two Severn Crossings. They would like to found a community orchard and are looking for a site that could accommodate six to eight trees

Mike Hawkins, having served as chairman for 10 years, has decided to retire from that role – although he will continue as a Councillor. At the Council meeting on 9th May, the Council noted his valuable contributions – of which more will be in Meeting Point next month. The Council elected Catherine Collinson as the new chairman and Steve Meredith as vice chairman. More information on these changes next month.

Parish Matters

The April Meeting of Olveston Parish Council welcomed two new members - Catherine Offer and Martin Gibson, both of whom have lived in Tockington for many years. There is still one vacancy, and the Parish Council would like to hear from anyone interested in applying (particularly those from Old Down, whose residents are currently not well represented).

Thank you to all those 73 parishioners who attended the Annual Parish Assembly held on 2nd May 2017. Amanda Deeks, Chief Executive of South Glos Council opened the evening with a presentation on the reasons for having a Metro Mayor, and why parishioners should exercise their vote on May 4th. Richard Lloyd then updated the meeting about walks around the Parish and guidance Map Boards. The meeting also reviewed the Parish Accounts, and heard from Parish Councillors of the achievements in the last year and the plans for the forthcoming 12 months. The meeting built on some of the core themes from the Parish Vision and the Olveston Parish Steering Group, discussing Housing, Communications and above all Traffic & Parking. Further details of the meeting can be found on the Parish Council website in the 'Annual Parish Assembly 2017' folder.

Olveston Parish Council has now arranged its own Contractor to keep Tockington Green trimmed instead of South Glos Council, and would welcome any feedback regarding this change. ROSPA Playsafety have completed the Annual safety check on the three play areas (look for reports soon on the parish website). The Old Down play area has been cleared for another year, although further and terminal decline is indicated. The Parish Council undertakes regular safety checks, but would welcome feedback from any users who find damage or safety hazards.

The Parish Council would like to thank Sally Worster for taking over responsibility of the Tockington Tardis from Claire Ackland. The Tardis is used for book swapping, and more importantly as a collection point for non-perishable foods donations to the local food bank. A list of required items is regularly kept updated in the Tardis, for anyone wishing to donate.

Dog Fouling is always a problem and needs to be reported to the South Glos Dog Warden (01454 868000). If you walk a dog, even one belonging to

someone else, you are responsible for clearing up after it. Under the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act of 1996, anybody who lets their dog foul land open to public access and does not clear up afterwards can be given a fixed penalty notice. If you get such a notice, you have to pay a £50 fine within 14 days. Otherwise, you could be prosecuted and might be fined up to £1,000. It can also be an offence under the Environmental Protection Act 1990 to allow large amounts of dog faeces to build up in your garden. It is no longer necessary to separate dog waste from other types of household waste - but the absence of a dog waste bin or litter bin is not an excuse to leave your dog's waste behind, please take it home.

Swifts Trevor Cook

I was encouraged to write more about birds because the magazine can now offer full colour photographs, so it will be disappointment for some that I write about a little brown bird

However, I make no apologies because I love to see and hear the Swifts and as I write, in early May, I am waiting daily for their arrival. For me the Swift is



the stunt flyer of the bird world, cutting through the air like small new moons.

Arriving at the beginning of May they are easily recognisable as a dark brown bird apart from a pale white chin (but look all black in the sky). However from a distance, it is the crescent shape that will immediately tell you it's a Swift.

You will not see them perching for they never land except to build a nest and raise their young. It is said of the juveniles that once they fledge it will be two years before they touch land again. Actually they will never touch the ground, except

by accident, because they are unable to take off from the ground!

The best place that I know to see them is at their roost in the Old School Hall in Olveston and they can be seen there throughout the summer, diving into or launching themselves out from under the eaves. They are particularly

noticeable after the young are born and fledged when the young ones tear after the adults literally screaming for food. For me it is one of the most evocative sounds of high summer

By the end of July and into August the show is over and the birds set off back to Africa where we hope that as many will survive to brighten up our summer skies next year.

One of my favourite sections of the Bible takes place after Jesus' death and resurrection. It is an account of when the disciples were starting to spread the message of Jesus - and were facing strong opposition.

The Pharisees are discussing how to stop these Christians. Their response will be violent, and some are suggesting having the disciples executed. But then one of their number, a man called Gamaliel, says a very surprising, but incredibly insightful thing. He tells them not to even bother trying to stop the Christians. Why is that?

"If their purpose is of human origin, it will surely fail. But if it is from God, you will never be able to stop these men; you will only find yourselves resisting God." (Acts 5: 38-39)

Whether you believe in God or not, it is an historical fact that the Christian church has grown from a handful of frightened, uneducated fishermen and tax collectors, to a global movement of over 2 billion people that has lasted two millennia. There are more Christians alive today than at any other time in history.

On June 4th all the local churches will celebrate Pentecost - which was when the disciples and their earliest followers received the gift of the Holy Spirit. It was actually a brief moment of respite before the persecution and attacks from secular and religious authorities continued.

We are amazingly fortunate to have the freedom to attend worship - or not to. Many of you might strongly object to what I am writing, but I will not go to prison for doing so, or fear for my life. Yet of the 2 billion plus Christians across the globe, hundreds of millions in large parts of Asia, Africa and the Middle East are suffering active and persistent persecution.

In a rural area, many of our churches have small congregations. It is easy to lose sight of the fact that we are part of a growing, global Church. So, this Pentecost, may I encourage you to remember your fellow believers across the world who are suffering - and also to be thankful that we live in such a wonderful part of the world and have a freedom denied to so many others.

If you are not a regular part of a church, then I can assure you that you'll get a warm welcome at each and every church in Severnside! Maybe you could come along and ponder those words of Gamaliel, and decide for yourself what it is, or WHO it is, that sustains the global Church?
