### Village Person - Dave Stone

Dave was born in Horfield, the youngest of four sports-mad brothers - not unusual, but few go on to become professional footballers. He played for Bristol Boys under-15s when they won the English Schools Shield - a national competition, for the uninitiated. They played Swansea Boys using Bristol City's ground in front of 22,000 people and Swansea's Vetch Field, winning over the two games 8-4. When he was 15, Dave had a trial for English schoolboys at Chelsea's ground, Stamford Bridge. He lost out at the very end to – Terry Venables.

The sports master at his school ran the junior Bristol Rovers team and recommended Dave who became a full-time professional with the club when he was seventeen. His family were ardent supporters and he found himself playing with his heroes, staying there eight years. In those days, all professional footballers earned £20 a week with bonuses of £4 for a win and £2 for a draw. The highlight was playing West Ham in the League Cup drawing 3-3 at Eastville and losing 2-3 in the replay at Upton Park, to a side that included Bobby Moore, Geoff Hirst and Martin Peters who had all played in the victorious World Cup team of 1966. He married Margaret in 1965 and their first son was born in 1966. Dave transferred to Southend Football Club in 1967 for six months then moved to Hastings Football Club as player/manager for a short time, living at Bexhill-on-Sea. Football is a precarious profession and by now they had two sons, so Dave and Margaret decided to move back to Bristol, where they had kept their house, and Dave to get a 'proper job'.

This he did in the accounts department of Strachan and Henshaw for the princely sum of £16.10s a week. On getting the job, the manager (a Bristol City supporter) told him not to talk football all the time, but in fact the manager talked to him about it more than anyone else! Dave also worked part-time as player/manager for Glastonbury, followed by Welton Rovers and Weston-super-Mare, then Clevedon and finally Portway Bristol all in the Western League. Dave worked there thirty three years before being made redundant. He soon got a job in the accounts department at St Monica Trust four days a week and has been there for nine years.

He and Margaret always liked coming out of Bristol this way for walks and the pubs and in the late 70s they moved to Woodbine Cottage in Church Hill. As their sons became teenagers, instead of providing a taxi service, they moved into Westbury, but later, when the boys were grown up, they moved back to Silverhill Cottage on the A38 in 1998.

When Dave was fifteen he got an audition for the choir of St Mary's Redcliffe and sang there two years, becoming head chorister. However he had to give this up

as Bristol Rovers Youth Team trained on a Sunday. In 2005 they were talking to John Jones in the White Hart when he asked them to help behind the scenes for the Parish Players production of South Pacific and they have been involved ever since. June Robbins asked them to perform at a Harvest Supper and then David Shaw asked them to join St Mary's choir in 2006.

Since then Dave and Margaret have done three 'The Stones in Concert' for the re-ordering of St Mary's. This year Dave became Church Warden. As well as choir practice on Friday evenings and singing on Sundays, they are also committed to singing and dancing two nights a week and occasional Sunday afternoons, for this year's production of 'Carousel'.

# Olveston Parish Historical Society

The Hat Industry of Bristol and South Gloucestershire, 1530-1900



For over three centuries, felt hat-making went on in local villages and hamlets such as Frampton Cotterell, Rangeworthy and Watley's End, near Winterbourne.

It started in a small way in hatters' cottages but, in the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> centuries, hundreds of men were employed. Manufactories were built for hat-making, factories without power or machines. Some of those buildings can be seen today.

Chris Heal, a PhD student at the University of Bristol, has carried out an enormous amount of research, using censuses, company records, port documents and Merchant Venturer archives, and will give us a highly entertaining illustrated talk about the working conditions of the hatters and how the hats were made, the materials and toxic substances used, as well as the trade relationships between our local villages and Bristol, London and the wider world.

## Parish Players: Carousel

The Parish Players are looking forward to their Annual Production. Following on from their success with 'The Gondoliers', they are presenting Rodgers and Hammerstein's favourite musical, 'Carousel', from April 12-16<sup>th</sup> at the Olveston Parish Hall @ 7.30pm.

Premiered in New York in 1945 to great popular acclaim, it transferred to London's Drury Lane in 1950 and has enjoyed many professional and amateur revivals, being made into an unique evergreen film starring Shirley Jones and Gordon Macrae in the Fifties.

The score and lyrics show just how great a musical can be, bursting with abundant life and full of memorable melodies and acute lyrics such as 'If I loved you', 'June is bustin out all over', the Anthem 'You'll never walk alone' adopted by the Liverpool football team, 'When I marry Mr Snow' and the not-to-be-forgotten, vibrant carousel waltz.

The backstage team, led by Rod Williams and Keith Richards, are working hard to bring Andy Black's technically challenging, artistic designs to life. The carousel itself, a daunting prospect on a small stage, is being created by rotating coloured lights in the capable hands of Richard Churchill, the Company's imaginative lighting technician.

A talented cast, with an encouraging influx of young people, is well into rehearsal. Mike Jones and Lynn Shelley play the star-crossed lovers Billy Bigelow and Julie Jordan, with Maedene Webb in her first leading role as their daughter Louise, whilst Almondsbury-based Heather and Mark Collins are cast in the comedienne's role of Carrie Pipperidge and Jigger Craigin, the bad lot of the piece. Phil Savage as Enoch Snow, in spite of the old adage 'never work with children or animals', is enjoying rehearsing with 'his' nine offspring, aged between 4-10 years, who have joined the Company for the Show, with Jacob Warn, the gifted recorder player, cast as his 15 year old son Enoch Junior. Cath Chappel, who made her debut in 'The Gondoliers', is cast as the maternal Nettie Fowler and Lesley Clarke as the unscrupulous owner of the carousel, Mrs Mullin.

The musical is unusual in that, amongst all the humour and vitality, it has a spiritual theme, with John Jones playing the heavenly friend, Brother Joshua, and Andy Black, the magical Starkeeper. The many cameo roles are played by local actors including David and Margaret Stone, Brian Brown, Richard Newley, Felicity Hemmett and Tad Olewicz, whose wife Gill has the formidable task of organising all the costumes.

Gill Harris is in charge of the varied choreography. As with all good storylines, there are exhilarating chorus numbers amongst moments of pathos, such as the

poignant ballet revolving round Louise, the children and a newcomer, Simon Harris, as the leading male dancer.

Chloe Allsop-Jones is the invaluable Musical Director. Direction under Linda Evans.

### Our Parish Matters

Few of us can possibly have failed to notice the financial difficulties that the country is in at the moment. All of us are likely to be affected in some way or another and local services are feeling the pinch too.

Thornbury Hospital is currently facing drastic changes or even closure, which leaves many of us wondering what would be left in its place. How can the Hospital buildings and grounds best be used to serve the community? What will happen to replace the services previously catered for in the Hospital? Perhaps it is time for all those who feel strongly to follow this up if we are not to lose out. The Parish Council is concerned and will be taking appropriate action to express their views on the Parish's behalf.

Closure faces Thornbury Police Station front office where, in future, the public may soon be unable to call in personally with their concerns. It may, however, be possible for someone to be made available to receive the public instead at South Gloucestershire's offices in Thornbury.

On a more positive note, Patchway Fire Station is promoting a scheme of fire prevention. This entails free fire-safety inspections at any householder's dwelling-place, followed by the fitting of up to two free smoke alarms. Anyone interested should ring 0117 926 2061 Ext.8040.

Another service being offered by South Glos. is the Handy Van Scheme. This is to provide DIY help for home owners and private tenants who are either over 60 or of working age with disabilities. 

### What is art therapy?

I am an art therapist. I have lived in Tockington for 15 years and am often asked "What is art therapy?" As I am running workshops locally, I thought an explanation would be a good idea.

A common misconception is that art therapy is the same as an art class. In an art class, the emphasis is on producing something that's "good" and on learning and improving skills. An art therapy session will focus on using art materials to support health and well-being. Often the artwork isn't shown to others and usually it is not about the art looking "good" but more about using art materials and imagery to help the client look at their lives and explore difficult areas.

The art therapist will be a practising artist with a good understanding of materials and art making. In art therapy, no art skills are required – you are free to make images which express feelings and emotions. Sometimes clients will use unfamiliar materials or make physical objects. Sometimes clients will like their images, sometimes not.

Another misconception is that the therapist interprets images or tells the client what their image means. This is not the case - the art does not even have to be talked about, and art therapy works well for those who may have had problems with the "talking therapies".

Why does art therapy work? As children we use visual language (drawing) before we use verbal language. It is a natural way of expression or connecting with others. Many lose this ability as we become adults and see art as something done by artists to be looked at in a gallery. As adults, our images are criticised and judged and not seen as a way of communicating and expressing ourselves and our feelings.

Often people turn to art therapy because they have a specific problem, but art therapy can help people deal with stressful life events and enhance quality of life, wellbeing or simply to have fun. The artist Louise Bourgeois said "Everywhere we are unappreciated in this world. Art is about appreciating ourselves."

I am a qualified HPC-registered Art Therapist, nurse and teacher. I teach mindfulness meditation, on its own and in combination with art therapy. I offer individual sessions and group workshops in central Bristol and locally.



# 100 Years of Scouting in Thornbury, 1911 - 2011

The international scouting movement is regarded as having begun with Baden-Powell's experimental camp on Brownsea Island, in August 1907. Soon after that, scouting took off in this country, with new scout groups springing up all over the UK. Eleven thousand scouts attended a rally at Crystal Palace in September 1909. A year later, there were over 100,000 scouts in the UK.

Now, in 2011, the Scout Association offers adventurous activities and opportunities for personal development to almost 400,000 young people across the UK. Scouting has come a long way!



March 2011 marks the centenary of the start of scouting in Thornbury. To mark this one hundred-year history, Thornbury and District Museum is hosting a display of materials associated with the Thornbury Scout Group over that period. This is a good chance to discover how scouting has changed over the last 100 years.
