

'If we can't do it, it can't be done'

'If we can't do it, it can't be done' is the motto of the new business in Olveston. Gary Harris has opened a bike shop in the barn previously an upholstery workshop.

He is Bristol and bike minded born and bred. At the age of eight he cobbled two wrecked bikes together to make one functioning bike. He is a member of AUDAX – the initials stand for a long distance cycling club, and I mean long distance. Each ride is between 200 and 600k; the latter equals a spin to Anglesey and back.

Gary left school at sixteen after a one week placement at a bike shop and frame builders in his last term. Through what was then the Youth Training Scheme, he became apprenticed to the same shop, where he worked for five years. Through no fault of his own he had to leave, but within a week he was a delivery driver for Comet and also worked part time for Bakers Cycles. By now he was married with one daughter and a keen member of Bristol Cycling Tourist Club.

His next job was delivery driver for Park Furnishers, which later became a life saving decision. In 1999 some employees were taking part in a Bristol to London bike ride in aid of Action Medical Research and asked him for mechanical back up. The next year, two days before the ride, the official firm supplying mechanical back up dropped out and Gary took over. He has done it ever since and also for about another thirty events.

In 2006 he began to feel very unwell. Six months of visiting his GP with headaches and nausea produced nothing, but when his colleagues at Park Furnishers clubbed together for a CT scan, events moved extremely quickly. Within a week he had a tumour the size of a fist removed from the cerebellum in his brain. The operating surgeon told him he had only a week to live without the operation and an eighty per cent chance of impairment with it. His full recovery was thanks to his fitness from the neck down, due to cycling.

After rehabilitation he took redundancy and became a school caretaker at several successive schools. By now he was divorced and remarried with another daughter. Last year he decided to work full time on bikes from his home in Bedminster. One day visiting a contact in Olveston, he was buying his lunch from the Crusty Loaf when he saw that the barn opposite was available for rent and the rest, as they say, is history and he moved in December.

He has a contract with NHS/Sustainable Travel Solutions. He maintains electric bikes for NHS staff who have replaced their own cars and buses for transport to home visits. Staff sick leave and missed appointments have gone down significantly since the introduction of these bikes. The shop offers: sales, repairs (while you wait if wished), and DIY cycle maintenance programmes. He would like redundant old bikes for his apprentice to practise on, or for cannibalisation of parts for those on a tight budget. He has recently completed the Campagnolo pro shop mechanic course and offers bike maintenance to gold standard.

Gary hopes the business will spread by word of mouth and recommendation. As well as being on the Avon Cycle Way, it is also on the Land's End to John of Groats route which might be lucrative in the future. There is a comfortable sitting area for those waiting for repairs or briefly resting on a ride. He intends to offer coffee and tea, the proceeds of which will be donated to the charity Hammer Out which supports sufferers of brain tumours and their families. After his operation he went to some of their meetings, and is very aware that he is a fortunate survivor of the condition. Gary has already found that Olveston is a good place to be. He is particularly grateful to the three or four couples who helped him look for his daughter's escaped Jack Russell terrier last month. We wish him well in this new venture.

One of our comonest birds is the chaffinch, the male with its pink breast and grey head and its more sombre mate who is dressed in brown. The first sign

that they are around is their sharp "spink" note as they perch. To recognise them is also easy due to the white bars on their wings and on the outer edges of their tail which flash as they fly off.

Also common is the greenfinch, which as you may guess, is green; olive green to my eyes and with a bright yellow edge to its wings. The male is quite distinctive although his mate is less brightly coloured. They will chew away at

sunflower seeds as long as they feel safe. As March progresses we will hear the male "churring" from the top of a tree or a high place; look in the highest places. The prolonged repetition of the song is very distinctive and, dare I say it, a little irritating after a while.

However, the most beautiful visitor is the goldfinch which will visit, especially if you provide Niger seed. They usually approach in a group or "charm",

constantly chattering to one another. It is a very distinctive bird with its red face and buff colouring and with the bright yellow wing bar that gives it its name.

Less frequently one might glimpse a bullfinch; the beautiful rose pink breast of the male being distinctive, and he is often accompanied by his somewhat duller mate. If you only catch them flying away then look out for their bright white rump.

If you want to go further afield, try to see if the twite return to Aust Wharf where they spent several weeks last year. The name gives away its call. Although visually you may be disappointed by this small, little brown finch, it's an exciting find.

Spring

March, and spring will be officially declared, although our weather often blatantly enjoys ignoring red tape. Chill winds and frosts often still bite. Even so the gradual increase in daylight hours encourages the undeniable urge for nature to stir. The first splashes of colour are starting to show, primroses, violets and celandines painting the hedgerows and woods that have been muddy brown for so long. Birds are answering the call to migrate. Swans and geese, honking their farewells, head to Russian tundra. Using our rich shores as a refuelling depot, turnstone and knot head North, having started their epic journeys in Africa.

Now is a great time to catch the birds of the dawn chorus. Before the leaves on trees fully unfurl you may spot them too. Listen for the new arrivals joining our residents. The chiffchaffs and many warblers will be adding to the morning crescendo as territories are established and mates are called.

Check ponds for gooey clumps of frogspawn. One of those cold snaps may seem disastrous but frogspawn under the ice is usually fine. Our native snakes might even pop out to warm themselves on a sunny stone. Grass snakes (which should really be called water snakes) might even enjoy a meal of the frogspawn, often retiring to the warmth of your compost heap when things get chilly.

Mammals are coming out of hibernation: hedgehogs looking for the slugs and snails that have also emerged; bats twitching their wings, then finally flying off looking for the myriad of insects arriving on our shores with the migrating birds, or waking from their own winter's sleep.

So now is the time for us to stir also. Pop on your coat and wellies to seek the signs of spring arriving all around us.

Aust Parish Council Matters: a Parish Plan

Aust Parish Council wishes to consult residents on whether there is a need for a parish plan, and if so, what it should contain.

A parish plan should set out what we, the residents, like about our parish, what, if any, development we should like, and what improvements to environment or services we should like. The parish of Aust consists of three separate communities (with others living in between) and we expect that there may be some things that residents of all three villages would like, and other things that would affect each village differently.

South Gloucestershire Council is in the process of establishing its planning policies to cover the next 10 to 15 years, and this would be a good moment for us to decide what we want. Our plan would have persuasive force with the Council in its own deliberations.

Your Parish Council proposes to set up an overall working group, consisting of some Parish Councillors with two non-councillor residents of each village. It would be the task of this group to lead the process for the whole parish, first of all to establish whether there is any need or desire for a plan, and, if there is, to write a plan that reflects the wishes of all three villages, together and separately. Our current thinking is that this group would establish a sub-group in each village to work on the aspects of the plan that would apply in the respective villages.

The first steps for the main group would be to establish the groups in each village, and to compile and distribute a questionnaire to every household; and to analyse the results.

There will be some cost in this process, mainly in printing and distribution. We hope that a contribution may be obtained from South Gloucestershire Council towards this, although some cost will fall on the Parish Council.

Olveston Parish Council Matters

The Parish Council is relieved to learn that this years **Severn Bridge Road race** due to be held on Sunday March 2nd has now been relocated to a course around Malmesbury. Meeting Point readers may recall the tragedy during this cycle event last year, and we wish the organisers, local residents, participants and especially their families an enjoyable and safe race.

The **Annual Parish Assembly** has now been confirmed for Tuesday 29th April from 7:30 at the Parish Hall in Tockington, and everyone is invited. There will be opportunities to meet Councillors, and most importantly give parishioners a chance to present their observations and opinions.

Olveston Parish Council will present its Accounts for 2013/14, and 2014/15 Budget. A **Precept** of £36,000 has been set for next year, representing a 0% increase despite a number of 'optional' costs passed down by South Glos Council (which will also be discussed). It is also possible that, due to further changes defined by central government, the actual charge per resident may fall this year.

The key theme at this year's Assembly will be the local services. There have recently been significant changes to Policing, the Fire Brigade and also the 'Street Care' from South Glos Council, and the presentations will go a long way towards clarifying what these services are and how residents can utilise them.

The Parish (through generous donations and grants from a number of clubs, societies and organisations) is in the process of procuring three **defibrillators**, and the meeting will close with a presentation and hopefully instruction on how these devices can be used. We look forward to seeing you there.

The BRI and the Health of the Working Poor in 18th & 19th Century Bristol & Gloucestershire

Olveston Parish Historical Society: Wednesday 5 March 2014, 7.30pm Methodist Church, The Street, Olveston BS35 4DR



In the last 40 years, various building developments in Bristol have resulted in the clearing of the graveyard which used to serve Bristol Royal Infirmary until 1854.

Drawing on her examination of 18th and 19th century bones from this graveyard and her research into old BRI inpatient logbooks, **Dr. Annsofie Witkin** will give us an historical and archaeological insight into the health of the working poor in Bristol and Gloucestershire from 1757 to 1854.

The portrait shown here, from the Wellcome Collection in London, was painted in 1824 by John Hazlitt and shows

Richard Smith, who became a surgeon to the Bristol Royal Infirmary in 1796 at the age of 24 and remained so until the year of his death 47 years later, in 1843. Some of the bones which Annsofie has examined must have been from patients on his operating table.

The 'villans, bordars and slaves of Tockington' Nick Fear

The mention of Tockington Village conjures many images for residents or people who travel through it. It has a long history and one of the first records of it strikes a modern cord, but also reveals how different it once was. In 1085 William the Conqueror commissioned a survey of his lands largely for tax purposes. Every human, animal, facility and piece of land was to be recorded, the reckoning was likened to the Day of Judgement mentioned in the Bible. That appraisal would be used by God in the Last Judgement, or Doomsday, the name given to the volumes eventually compiled by William's officials.

The entries from the assessors were brief, but revealing, written in old English one entry read;

In Langley Hundred Wulfgar, a thegn of King Edward, held Tockington. There were 8 hides, and 5 ploughs in demesne; and 20 villans and 12 bordars and 10 slaves and 20 ploughs. This manor did not render farm Tre, but the person who owned it lived off it. Earl William held it in demesne and the reeve added 1 plough, and a mill rendering 8d. Now it renders 241 blanch money at 20[d] to the ora.

A hundred was a division of the English country, often managed by a nobleman who served the king. Wulfgar has served a predecessor of William, King Edward, rendering nothing to the crown and simply living off his farmed land, Tre, meaning in that time. A hide was a taxable measurement of land which equated to about 120 acres, to work this Wulfgar owned 5 ploughs, indicating a team of oxen as well as the implement. Living alongside him were 20 villans, men who were ranked as a higher class of peasant and 12 bordars who were unfree peasants obligated to their lord. Perhaps the most surprising mention is of 10 slaves, men whose bond was as it would be today. They collectively used 20 ploughs on the land they worked. Women and children also lived alongside the men of the village, but did not feature in the survey. A missed taxable opportunity perhaps, recognised in later generations.

For Doomsday time, Earl William held the manor, in demesne, meaning for his exclusive use. He appointed a Reeve, a manor official, sometimes elected by local peasants, to manage his land. This man apparently did well as he added 1 plough and a built a mill which would have served the whole village. More importantly for King William the facility rendered 8d in revenue. The 'd' referring to a denarius, we know better as an English penny, the only silver

coin in existence at the time. The final line of the tally comes to the point of the exercise, giving the unchallengeable revenue which would be paid annually to King William, 241 blanch money at 20d to the ora. Norman accounting methods were complex, but blanch, white, money is usually recognised as meaning silver, ora was an accounting device equating to the twenty pence.

The Doomsday reckoning, written in Latin, was never finally completed, but the books give a fascinating view of early life. It is fortunate for us that Tockington featured in this.

Free Oil Scheme Membership for Over 70s

Local charity the West of England Rural Network is giving away 100 free memberships (normally £20) of a community oil buying scheme. The offer is open to anyone living in the West of England who is over 70 and relies on oil for their heating and hot water.

Most members of the scheme save around £120/year on their oil bills, with some local people saving hundreds of pounds. Mrs Tucker from Severn Beach said "We were paying £250 a month for our oil before we joined the scheme. Now we're members of the community oil buying scheme it works out at more like £150/month; that was the best phone call I ever made." In January members paid just 52.9 p per litre of oil (plus VAT).

The community oil buying scheme aims to reduce the cost of heating and hot water for people in the West of England who depend on oil. The scheme works by placing a single large order once a month, and negotiating with the all the local suppliers to get the best price. The free memberships are funded by a 'surviving winter' grant awarded by Quartet Community Foundation. I wonder how many of you can recall the words of the song 'He's got the whole world in His hands'? It has been sung and presented in many ways and has been described as an American Spiritual and a Children's song.

This seemingly simple title statement, along with words in the other verses, actually present profound truths that can have considerable impact on your life depending on whether or not you believe them.

Similarly, and yet even more profoundly, there are numerous verses in the Bible that speak of the love and faithfulness of God and the measure of confidence you have in Him depends on your perspective and understanding.
