

#### Profile by Pat Thirkettle

Lucy had a happy childhood, the first half of which was spent in Stourbridge in the West Midlands. Her parents split up when she was very young; happily she saw her father regularly, but the guiding influence in her life is her mother. In the 1970s being a single mother was more unusual, but finding herself with two young daughters and no academic qualifications, Lucy's mother took A levels, went to university and trained as a teacher in a short space of time. She was a brilliant role model and very empowering for her children, showing what could be achieved in the male

When Lucy was seven her mother married again and a few years later they moved near Swansea in South Wales for her stepfather's job. This was a big leap for them all, leaving grandparents and settling into new schools. Lucy was the only English girl in her class, but she pleased her mother by coming top in Welsh language exams! However the family soon came to love the area, with lots of caravanning on the Gower until they all moved to Bristol in the late 1980s. By now Lucy's sister was at University and Lucy started sixth form at Wellsway School in Keynsham. This was an easier change and she still has many close friends from those days. She took A level French, German and English and went to Manchester University to read French; a four year course including a year in Bordeaux as a language assistant in a secondary school – a wonderful experience.

Her first job was with the French Tourist Board based in Bristol but involving much travel to Normandy. She loved it and stayed six years during which time she met her husband Phil. She moved to a PR company in London organising events in France and the U.S, but craving the countryside she only stayed one year in the Big Smoke. She and Phil married in 2000 in Compton Dando and bought Salem Cottage in Church Hill, Olveston, where their children Millie and George were born. When Salem became too small they moved next door but one into Holly Cottage where Anna was born. Around this time and rather surprisingly Lucy's father gave her a half-brother – who is the same age as George!

Working around the children for several years, Lucy taught French at school clubs, worked for three years supporting a visually impaired pupil at Red Maids' School and was a reading mentor in local schools. After stopping work

temporarily to concentrate on the children and the house move to Tockington in 2014, Lucy then worked for the Out of School Clubs, the school childcare provider.

Now is the right time to start working for herself, in translating and writing for the tourism sector. Her first projects have included sub-editing a France holiday magazine and writing content for a language holidays website. Lucy also writes her own Francophile blog. It is early days, but doors are starting to open. Unsurprisingly with her background, Lucy is now Co-chair of the Olveston Parish Twinning Association (OPTA.) The family had a great time on the last exchange and also enjoy the OPTA social events such as the quiz and 'Fest Noz' soiree. They are certainly in for the long haul!

### Parish Matters

In January, Tom Witherbed and Geoff Anderson resigned from Olveston Parish Council. Both have given significant time to supporting the Olveston Parish Steering Group and its associated Subgroups of parishioners, working on issues including the Housing Needs Survey and Traffic & Parking. The Council would like to thank both of them for their hard work. **Three of the nine seats on Olveston Parish Council are now vacant** and Councillors would welcome early responses from residents interested in applying for these positions. At the November Parish Council Meeting, the budget for 2017/18 was agreed and a precept of £50,390 was approved despite being significantly higher than the 2016/17 charge. The rise is partly prompted by the Council's own plans, replaces reduced grants and makes provision for the further services expected to be handed down from South Glos Council. In addition there is an expectation that Central Government may impose stringent caps on funding increases in future years. It is understood that many local Councils in the area are also seeking similar rises in their 2017/18 precept. Details will be presented at the **Annual Parish Assembly on May 2nd at the Parish Hall from 7:30** to which all are invited.

The Parish Council has replaced the fencing around the 3<sup>rd</sup> Tennis Court/ overflow car park. This court has also been used in the past for netball and recently 5-a-side football. The old fencing has become damaged with time, and the new fencing should be better suited for such activities. It is also hoped that the additional netting will stop footballs landing on the Parish Hall roof and the associated damage.

The Parish owns two basket ball hoops, one overhanging the 3<sup>rd</sup> Tennis Court at Tockington and the other in the middle of Vicarage Lane play area, Olveston. The forthcoming annual safety checks may advise that Health & Safety signs be added to each hoop, so the Council needs to decide whether they are being used, or whether the time has come to have them removed. The Council would welcome feedback from people interested in their preservation.

The Council would like to thank all the residents who have over recent years helped to plant daffodil bulbs, this year flowering began at the start of February and already looks good.

## Soap, Cider and Sewers

#### Friday 17 March, United Reformed Church, Chapel St, Thornbury, 7.30pm

These are not things which, at first glance, seem to have a lot in common but if you come to this month's talk organised by Thornbury and District Museum, you will soon understand the connection in relation to Thornbury.



This talk will focus on a less well-known aspect of Thornbury's history, the town's industrial past.

There used to be numerous small businesses and trades in this busy market town, from shoeing horses to making clothes and even, until the late 16th century, a thriving woollen trade.

There were saddlers and shoemakers, beer and cider makers, many butchers, tanners, candle and soap makers - and some surprises as well. Some of the industries were smelly, noisy or dangerous – not a fragrant part of the town's history! The museum has photos, documents or objects relating to many of them.

In the 19th and early 20th century, Thornbury also had a saw mill and a brickworks. As for the sewers, mains drainage came relatively late to Thornbury - and how the townsfolk coped before that is an interesting story. The advent of gas and electricity was also eventful.

The talk will highlight a number of interesting characters who played an influential part in Thornbury's industrial past.

Jenny Murray Band will be telling us what she finds so intriguing about beds when she comes to the March meeting!



Her beautifully illustrated talk is on

## The Cultural Significance of the Bed in Early Modern Europe.

Jenny worked with the Royal Collection tapestries and was awarded the MVO (a personal award by Her Majesty the Queen) in 1987 for her work in and after the Hampton Court fire.

Asked to explain what fascinates her about beds, she says:

"Having worked at Hampton Court Palace for over 25 years as Head of the Textile Conservation Lab and Studios, looking after the unique collection of tapestries and state beds there, I had become extremely interested in the social role of the pieces I conserved. This led to a curiosity about why the bed had become such an important social symbol. Hampton Court was at that time considering an exhibition of its extraordinary state beds and, as I was then doing a Masters degree, I decided to use the subject for my research.

However, the more I peered into the background of the bed - this familiar symbol of comfort! - the more strange, paradoxical - and even threatening - it became. I developed a great fascination with the subject and consequently decided to put it into a lecture format. This is the result - which I hope will give the audience a whole new perception of this otherwise benign topic!"

Jenny is still based near Hampton Court Palace – but is happy to travel to Olveston to talk to us. Her other great love these days is Bee-keeping – but Beds is her subject for this meeting!

## Cornucopia in Concert at the Armstrong Hall

Four horns with a massive range producing a richness and breadth of sound.

Cornucopia is a horn quartet of professional players founded in 1995, which for this special concert is collaborating with well-known local flautist Nicki Woodward (Barnes), experienced baritone Niall Hoskin and classical pianist Steven Hollas.

They will present a varied and eclectic programme which tracks through time from Mozart's 'Ave Verum Corpus' and Haydn transcriptions of vocal quartets. In contrast we will hear an interesting rarity, a work written by Mozart's son for flute and two horns. Pianist, Steven Hollas read music and history of art at Corpus Christi College. Cambridge, teaches the piano at St. Laurence School, Bradford on Avon and plays continuo harpsichord and organ for Baroque groups and accompanies several choirs in the Bath area. Nicola Woodward studied at the Royal College of Music where she won Exhibition scholarships on both flute and piano. She has won many prizes and performed in many prestigious venues with world class orchestras. She has an interest in folk music which led to a tour in South America for the British Council. - Do not deal with unexpected visitors at your door if you do not know who they are or what their history may be.
- Do not allow any unknown and unexpected visitor into your home. If possible, try to deal with them through a window or use a door chain.
- Ensure your front and back doors are closed and locked if your attention is elsewhere.
- If you are unhappy or feel intimidated by the visitor shut the door and call the police.

## Yours Faithfully

March – the month that sits between the dark gloomy winter days of February and the sometimes rainy but often promise-of-spring days of April. And the month that is always associated with Lent – that season of 'giving up something'. For many we have only just finished our 'Dry January' (no alcohol) or our 'Veganuary' (no meat or dairy) challenge and it's tough to be faced with another 'giving something up' challenge.

So – here's the good news! Why not do something extra for Lent instead? You don't have to give up chocolate, a particular TV programme, social media or other indulgences for Lent – take on something instead!

Lent is the period of six weeks (40 days) when we prepare for the sadness of Jesus' death and the celebration of His resurrection, God's victory over wrong doing and death! The thinking is that the better the preparation the more effective the celebration will be. The purpose of Lent is to separate people from what they do wrong, from selfishness etc through a time of self-denial and prayer, and create in them the desire to be closer to God and to want to serve Him.

So – rather than giving something up which very often means you think about it more, do something extra. It could be as simple as resolving to write a note/send a text of encouragement or thanks to someone each day, saying something positive to someone you might not otherwise speak to, lightening someone's load by doing something for them or any number of kind and thoughtful gestures which will brighten someone's day.

If that's too difficult how about a 'gratitude' jar? We have so many things to be thankful for and yet we take a lot for granted. Find a clean jam jar and put it somewhere you will see it every day such as on a windowsill or kitchen table and cut some coloured paper into strips. Each day write one thing you are thankful for on a strip of paper and add it to the jar. By the end of Lent you will have a jar crammed full of thanks. You won't have given anything up and yet when you look at the jar your heart and mind will, hopefully, be more prepared for celebration!

Of course – if you're bit of a traditionalist and Lent 'wouldn't feel right' if you didn't give something up then think about what you're going to do to make your sacrifice a positive thing. So if you're going to give up chocolate whose day could you brighten by giving them a chocolate bar? If you're giving up your favourite TV soap what are you going to do with that extra time? If you're giving up alcohol could you collect the money you save and donate it to a good cause?

As we all prepare for that celebration of Easter, the promise of joy, of new life – let's make Lent a positive time!
