
We are open Wednesday, Thursday, Saturday & Sunday evenings, when we would give you a warm welcome.



# Weather Record January to March 2011 Marcus Bean





#### January

The early part of the month continued the cold conditions of December, with two falls of snow totalling 2.5cm. On the 7<sup>th</sup> the wind direction changed to Westerly and mild wet conditions then continued until the 18<sup>th</sup>. High pressure then built again bringing cold Easterly winds with these conditions continuing to the month's end.

Rainfall for the month was very close to normal and pressure was close to average, but temperature for the month was  $1\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}C$  below norm continuing the trend of cold Januarys over the last three years.

### February

After a cold start to the month Atlantic depressions moved in bringing gales and rain for the next seven days. Changeable conditions continued for the rest of the month with rain on most days. On three days we had over ½ inch. High pressure built again on the last two days of the month.

Rainfall for the month was very close to normal while pressure was marginally below average, but average temperature was approximately 1½°C above norm.

#### March

High pressure dominated the first nine days of the month bringing cold dry conditions and Easterly winds. Atlantic winds then set in with warmer conditions until the 14<sup>th</sup> with a little rain. High pressure then returned with an extended dry period of thirteen days with no rain and some warm sunny days. The last three days saw a return to more changeable conditions and some rain.

Rainfall for the month was about a third of norm and the driest since 2000, whilst pressure and temperature were both higher than average.

It's wonderful to announce good news and the completion of the changes to Olveston Parish Hall is a marvellous example of co-operation between Parish Hall Management, the Pre-School and the Parish Council – not to mention the builder who met every target set. Congratulations to all concerned.

Co-operation is the watchword too between the Parish Council and St.Mary's Church, Olveston. The Council is currently in discussion with Rev. Roly Bain to consider local burial requirements in the future now that the churchyard cemetery has only limited burial space left. While new provision is not urgent, it will be required in a few years time and we must be ready for it.

The new pathway from Old Down towards Alveston is a boon to walkers but horse riders should note that it is not for their use. Neither should they use the footpath towards Olveston from Old Down to Foxholes Lane.

Old Down features heavily in this article and the red phone box topic is aired again. While Tockington's box looks to have a positive future there has been little response so far to the future of the Old Down box, when it becomes decommissioned in the near future. Please tell us your thoughts.

Woodhouse Park Scout Campsite at Fernhill is now under new management. It is no longer under local administration but under the control of the national body for scouting. However, new resident wardens have been installed and there will continue to be regular meetings between them, local residents and interested parties to ensure a comfortable co-existence between the site and the rest of the area.

Finally the Parish Council is holding its Annual Parish Assembl+y on Thursday 28<sup>th</sup> April at the Old Down Pavillion, starting at 7.30pm. There will be a summary of the Parish Councils' activities over the last year as well as a talk on the History of the Parish Council by that fount of local knowledge Mr. Eric Garrett.

# Thornbury's Own Local Organic Veg Box Scheme

Do you like home-grown vegetables but are too busy to grow your own? Do you want vegetables that are truly locally grown and organic? Do you want to be able to visit the fields where your vegetables are grown, and maybe volunteer?

If so then Thornbury CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) is your answer.

What is a CSA? This is when local farmers work closely with local people to produce local produce for them. The idea is that the farmer gets a guaranteed market for the crop while the members know how the food was grown and pay a modest price for local organic food. It also means local farmers are supported in growing more sustainably, using fewer chemicals, less imported animal feed and less packaging.

Thornbury CSA is a new not-for-profit scheme, started in 2010, providing good quality locally grown food for people in the Thornbury area. It is similar to a vegetable box scheme in that you buy a share of mixed vegetables each week. Members of the scheme can even come and meet the growers, join in social events and help with the sowing, planting and weeding. The fruit and vegetables are grown at the Sheiling School, which is between Thornbury Church and Castle School. The produce is seasonal, locally grown and biodynamic. Biodynamic is roughly the same as organic, and no artificial sprays or fertilisers are used.

**How do I Join?** Membership costs £10 per year for a household. You can choose either a Standard Share, (enough for two adults) for £41 per month or £480 per year or a Half Share (enough for a single adult) for £20.50 per month or £240 per year. Vegetable shares are collected by members each week from the Sheiling School (currently 4-7pm on Thursdays). Members who can't collect can pay an extra £2 per week to have their share delivered, if they live in the Thornbury area.

Last year's vegetables included a fantastic selection of potatoes, onions, carrots, parsnips, turnips, cabbages, spinach, broccoli, brussels sprouts, beans, peas, courgettes, squashes, lettuces, tomatoes and apples. In future years there will be more salad crops, more exotic vegetables and more fruit.

# Bogus charity collecting clothes

A flyer is being distributed in the South Gloucestershire area, seeking to collect clothes on behalf of a bogus charity called 'Breaking the Waves'. Checks have found that the website on the flyer does not connect, the phone number is no longer valid and the company BTW Ltd does not exist. In addition the charity number,1133899, listed on the flyer has been withdrawn.

South Gloucestershire Council's trading standards officers and neighbourhood police are warning people in the area to be wary of door-to-door leaflets asking for unwanted clothing.

Trading Standards said: "Clothing collections are regularly conducted throughout the area and, although some are genuinely for charitable purposes, we have concerns that others are just done for commercial gain and that the public are being misled by false claims about the use to which their donations are put and the use of bogus company details. The only way to guarantee that donations benefit good causes is to deal only with charities you know are genuine, or take unwanted items direct to a charity shop. At the moment textile prices are high and consumers need to ensure that their valuable donations reach the organisations they wish to give to".

# Police Report - March 2011

A total of 5 crimes have been reported for the month of March, which is a significant drop from previous months.

Two of these crimes occurred on the same night, whereby outbuildings in Olveston and Mumbleys Lane were broken into and a garden shredder and a chain saw were stolen. A lorry parked up overnight in Aust had a battery stolen. Animals at Old Down Country Park have been harmed again; pens were also broken into. We recently attended a Neighbour Hood Watch meeting in Tockington, where it was pointed out that the recent changes to the recycling collection could advertise new high value electrical items in your house. For instance, if you buy a new television, please do not leave the box out for the recycling as it may draw unwanted attention to your property. Please be aware that there is an ongoing problem of theft of drain covers. This seems to be all over the South Glos district. If you see anyone working on the road that doesn't appear to be South Glos or sub contractor, please try to get the registration of the van and either pass to me or crimestoppers.

You may have seen in the local paper about the launch of Rural Watch Scheme. What are the main aims of the Rural Watch Scheme?

- 1) To reduce local opportunities for theft of livestock and deadstock.
- 2) To reinforce the community spirit so that everyone can contribute towards the protection of their property by mutual co-operation and communication.
- 3) To introduce early warning systems in farming and countryside areas.
- 4) To improve the intelligence flow between the countryside communities and the police.

## What are the advantages of a Rural Watch?

- 1) A reduction in crime and the fear of crime impacting on the community.
- 2) Suspicious people and vehicles can quickly be reported to the police and other members of the countryside communities.
- 3) Information and advice can be quickly and efficiently circulated between the police and the community.
- A crime vigilant community in partnership with the police will create a safer environment.

We are so lucky to have a choice of pre-schools in Olveston. Stepping Stones in the Methodist Hall is well loved by the parents and children that use it. My daughters were both unsure of large groups so I chose Stepping Stones because it is small and friendly, and the leaders, Gill and Catherine, quickly got to know my children well. They treat children as individuals which helps <u>so</u> much towards settling them.

Stepping Stones attracts children from the surrounding villages, including those who aren't settling well in their local pre-schools. They may be shy or have individual requirements and they all flourish in Stepping Stones caring and personal environment.

Any anxiety I felt leaving my child for the first time was quickly dispelled. I was encouraged to settle them as I wanted to. I stayed with Josie often to settle her, but many leave children to be comforted by a cuddle or game with their favourite teacher. It is a very safe environment too, they are extremely careful about this – from everyone having a hand held on walks out, to hand washing and what the children touch, eat and smell.

We have very happy memories of picnics and play at Cattle Country, Sports Day picnics and paddling at Mundy Playing Fields, walks out to St Mary's churchyard to collect leaves or to look at the spring flowers, and playing in Peggy's garden next door. There are many seasonal activities and the children seem to have something lovely to show their parents after each session, the staff were exhausted at Christmas after all the crafts they had arranged! Looking forward to a variety of activities and fun really helps keep children enthusiastic.

It has been a joy watching my children grow in confidence, thank you for such a wonderful preparation for school. Grace settled easily at Olveston School, we were so pleased. As Josie starts there this September we will miss you all at Stepping Stones, but I might be back for one of the walks out!

## Thanks From Canon David Sansum

I would like to thank my friends who attend the 8 am Communion service for their kindness and generosity in presenting me with a card and a cheque on my last Sunday of taking the service, at least on a regular basis. I have been doing so about twice a month for 13 years, taking over from the late Reverend Harry Stoppard, and have also sometimes taken the later services.

Although not a native of Olveston I have known the village since childhood. My parents were very friendly with Harold and Margaret Haskins who then lived on Haw Lane, and we frequently visited them, when I would play with their children, one of whom, Michael, still lives in the village. We were also friendly with George Green, the organist, and as I was keen on playing organs he allowed me to play the huge old three-manual organ which then stood in the area where coffee is now served after services. In those days it needed to be pumped by hand.

In fact my main interest in the Church at that time was in the music, and I have played organs all over the country. Sometimes when I arrive at a church to take the service, as a retired priest, they will say "Sorry but we have no organist today". I say "That's alright, I'll play it", and I end up doing what they call multitasking. It is a bit awkward if the organ is in a west-end gallery with the altar at the opposite end, but at least I can usually knock out a few hymns.

At theological college I finished up being in charge of the music which was quite a responsibility as Evensong was sung every day and I had to play for it. We sang all the psalms which were appointed for the day. If you look at the Prayerbook you will see that on the  $27^{th}$  evening of a month 6 psalms are appointed to be used. We sang every one of them, each to a different chant. We also sang the Litany once a month, but being the organist spared me there, as while I was playing I couldn't sing the lead part, as every student was expected to do in their turn. I have survived 55 years in the ministry without intoning the Litany and think it's fairly certain that I'll never do so now.

Much of my time as a priest was spent away from the Bristol diocese, firstly in the West Midlands, in the Birmingham diocese, and then in the East Midlands, in Derbyshire, where I was Vicar of a market town not unlike Thornbury, for 22 years. Eventually I became a Rural Dean and then, to my amazement, an honorary Canon of Derby cathedral. It sounds good but there isn't a penny extra stipend when you are in office or of pension once you are retired!

As you know a Vicarage is a tied house and as soon as you resign you have to leave it for your successor. (If there is one. You can't be too sure of that today.) I was most fortunate in that I'd inherited my family home in Easter Compton on the deaths of my parents, and so was able to come back to my roots in South Gloucestershire. I hadn't been back long before I started to find work in the dioceses of Bristol and Gloucester, which is how I came to enjoy the enormous privilege of serving for so long in the beautiful church of St Mary, Olveston.
