


The Roof Problem - St John's, Aust

Many of you will have heard about the thefts of lead from the Church roof — what you may not know is that the thieves came back again at the beginning of this year, this time stealing lead from the Chancel roof. We have had discussions with English Heritage and are now able to go ahead and replace the lead with *Terne-Coated Stainless Steel*. The other problem has been that we are only entitled to make 2 claims from our Insurers; the first 3 thefts all took place in the same insurance year and therefore will only be eligible for 1 claim. The fourth theft was in January of this year, a separate insurance year, and that will make the second claim.

You will understand that a tiny village like Aust cannot raise all the money needed (in excess of £40k), and we are intensifying our fundraising campaign – we had to delay doing so until we had local planning authority and diocesan permissions. As well as producing a campaign brochure to go to Charitable Trusts etc, we have planned a super concert in the Church on Saturday June 22nd – Midsummer's night – featuring the award winning **DURSLEY MALE VOICE CHOIR.** More details of the concert next month BUT, please do put this date in your diary now and do please buy a ticket and come and enjoy an evening of Music, Prose and Song.

A Short Walk in the Wye Valley

To get there: cross the Severn Bridge (£6.20) and take the A466 Wye Valley road. At the northern end of Tintern, turn left at the Wye Valley Hotel into the lane signposted Catbrook. Ascend for 1.5 miles to a T-junction. Cross over the junction into the small 'Whitestones' car park, immediately opposite, and park.

The walk: take the wide stone track behind the car park (green posts) and ascend gently past a barrier through woodland and continue for about 20 minutes (brisk), stopping at the viewing points to enjoy river views. The track eventually curves left into a T-junction where you turn right and follow another track for about 5 minutes to Cleddon Falls. Descend steps to the viewing area. Return to your car the way you came. Good under foot and suitable for dogs.

Aust Parish Council Matters

Annual Parish Meeting

The annual parish meeting was held on 9th April 2013, attended by almost all the councillors, Ward Councillor Matthew Riddle and 4 residents.

Councillor Riddle reported on his past year. For the third year running, South Gloucestershire Council (SGC) had kept the council tax at the same level, despite a 28% reduction in central government grant over this period. 30% of middle management posts had been abolished with many staff redeployed. Two out of five director posts had been abolished.

One result of the smaller staff was a reduced requirement for office space. In rationalising its space requirements, SGC had got rid of 18 leases and concentrated on its new building at Yate – saving £1.8m a year. Unfortunately, SGC now needed less space in Thornbury. Councillor Riddle is fighting to ensure that SGC remain in Thornbury for public access and that some meetings – and in particular planning meetings – continue to be held there.

SGC had found more money for older people, aiming to help as many as possible to remain independent by supporting them to living in their own homes.

SGC would shortly be signing off the Core Strategy – the inspector had pushed for more new homes in South Gloucestershire including an additional 800 in Thornbury. Apart from barn conversions and the like, there should not be many new homes in rural areas. He noted that the Environment Agency is getting more restrictive about building in any flood plain.

The chairman of the Parish Council (APC), Mike Hawkins, made his report of a relatively uneventful year, with few major issues. There had been no desertions or fatalities in the membership of APC – all councillors had served the full year.

As in previous years, planning issues predominated in council business, with those in Littleton causing the greatest concern for residents. There had been no planning matters to consider at Whale Wharf, and the proposed educational facility had not yet materialised. The land between the White Hart and Quarry House, Littleton, had been a continuing concern to APC and residents, with a current application to use the incomplete building for a

tourism purpose. Other issues in Littleton were the proposed manège at Home Farm and the adjacent footpath, and the state of the pond. Also, the state of the storm drainage around the Green and in the lane leading from the Green to the Church.

Elsewhere, the Council had not opposed an application for a certificate of lawfulness at the Sandy Lane gypsy camp; and had discussed with SGC the state of the slip road between Sandy Lane and the M48, B4461 slip road; it was hoped that SGC would repair it. Title issues remain to be resolved before the Greenacres restoration could be completed. APC had also been worried about the problem of houses with agricultural ties being occupied by non-qualified people.

A number of other issues have received attention during the year, particularly with the Environment Agency. These include flooding generally, and in Aust village specifically.

Earlier in the year, APC had seen off a proposal to build 8 large and 4 small houses in Elberton, which would have increased the number of houses in the village by over 20%. The Council had also opposed the proposal to erect two very large (130m tall) wind turbines at Ingst - not actually in Aust parish, but very close and visible. They would be on green belt land and in the coastal zone and would be an unreasonable and inappropriate intrusion.

Councillor Hawkins concluded by thanking Ward Councillor Riddle for his energetic help with many issues, particularly those requiring discussion with SGC staff; and also thanked his colleagues on APC and the clerk.

During the open forum, Councillor Hawkins said that information was available on the SGC website about broadband provision in South Gloucestershire. Over the next three years, the Council and BT expect that 100% of subscribers will be able to obtain download speeds of at least 2Mbps, and 94% will have superfast broadband, i.e. over 24Mbps. It was not yet known how this would affect individual properties in Aust parish.

One resident asked whether APC was considering a neighbourhood plan and suggested cooperating with neighbouring parishes, particularly Olveston. He also urged the Parish Council to think about generating green energy in the parish.

Allen joined in August 2007, primarily representing the Tockington area, was an active member of the Rec & Leisure Committee, and brought to the Council technology changes to help us be more efficient and deal with working practices like Health and Safety.

Olveston Parish Council wishes all three happy and healthy lives, and success with their new challenges. Adverts for replacement Parish Councillors have been posted around the Parish Notice boards, local businesses, and on the Website. Alternatively contact the Clerk or Councillors if you are interested.

The Annual Parish Assembly at 7:30 on May 2nd at the Parish Hall, Tockington will be an ideal opportunity to hear the Parish Council's review of 2012/13, as well as to appreciate the challenges facing the Parish over the next few years. The meeting will be headlined by a talk from the Environmental Agency.

At last year's Parish Assembly and the subsequent inaugural meeting for the Parish Vision, parishioners raised a number of concerns, especially flooding and traffic through the Parish. Flooding has been a continuous and difficult issue to solve, although some advances have been made with the servicing of drains. Much work has also been done over the past year in dealing with certain flooding "hot spots", and the Parish Council will continue to work with S. Glos Council and other agencies to resolve on-going problems.

Whether parking congestion, safety around the School, access for large vehicles, or speeding, traffic continues to dominate the Council agenda. Last month's Meeting Point carried an article about proposals close to St Mary's Church and the School, whilst revised signage is to be prepared for Lower Tockington Road, and Haw Lane - local residents have also offered to coordinate a Speed Camera scheme. Speeding through the Parish is not just the preserve of residents, but one thing that we as Parishioners can think about is to

be more considerate when parking to allow traffic flow, as at times both Orchard Rise and Church Hill become chicanes that neither buses, nor lorries nor especially emergency vehicles can get through.

S. Glos Council has informed local Parish Councils that they are proposing to extend their 'part-night' lighting scheme throughout South Glos. Last year the effect was limited when some of the lights along the main roads were converted to switch off between midnight and 5am. This year S. Glos Council plan to convert all village streetlights to operate on a part night basis. They are offering a consultation period running from 2nd April until the 13th May, and more on the scheme can be found at www.southglos.gov.uk/partnightlighting.

Cook's Calendar: May

This extraordinarily cold spring will bring an inevitable rise in the price of this already expensive meat. In this recipe, a little lamb goes a very long way. Even more so if you manage to make your own lamb stock as the lamb flavour permeates the

whole dish. I have experimented with more tagine recipes than I care to remember and this one, adapted by me from one on a scruffy scrap of paper passed to me from a friend of one of my sisters is far and away the best. It is also dairy and gluten free.

This recipe is the culinary equivalent of leafing through a holiday brochure of exotic warm locations; you can ignore the weather outside and immerse yourself in the warm spices and fragrant lamb, dreaming of souks and minarets

Lamb tagine

600g diced lamb shoulder

1 tablespoon olive oil

1 onion, chopped

2 garlic cloves

100g apricots, chopped

1 teaspoons cinnamon

1 teaspoons ground cumin

1 teaspoons ground coriander

1/4 teaspoon ground chilli

1 teaspoons ground ginger

400g tin tomatoes

200ml lamb stock, homemade if possible

3 tablespoons ground almonds

400g tins of chickpeas

300g cubed butternut squash

2 tbsp honey

Juice of a lemon

A handful of flaked almonds

Small bunch of fresh coriander, roughly chopped

Preheat the oven to 180C

Take a good solid casserole with a lid put on a high heat. Add the oil and brown the lamb, add the chopped onion and crushed garlic and cook over a gentle heat until the onion is softened. Add spices, fry for a few minutes, stirring, then add tomatoes, ground almonds and lamb stock.

Simmer for an hour, then add the chickpeas and squash and simmer for 45 mins. Finish with honey and lemon, tasting as you go, then sprinkle with flaked almonds and coriander. Serve with cous cous or rice.

Please note: cous cous contains gluten, rice is gluten free.

Police Report for February/March 2013

In February we received 37 calls for the month of which there were 8 reported crimes: three for burglary to outbuildings where power tools and copper piping were stolen and an attempted burglary to a residential property where the rear doors were smashed but no entry was gained.

In March we received 52 calls, of which there were 7 reported crimes: theft of fuel from a residential property, theft of vehicle from the driveway of a property and theft of stone statues from gate posts.

Within the Severn beat crime has decreased in the last few months, now averaging between 10 - 8 per month for the whole of the beat.

Even though crime is low, please ensure that all doors and windows are secure, remove all valuable items from sight and please tell your neighbours if you are going away so that they can keep an eye on your property. Please also ensure that any suspicious person(s) or vehicle(s) are reported so that incidents can be checked out.

Take not for granted – but give thanks

My friend, Derek, is profoundly deaf and even though he has a hearing aid, life is very difficult for him and his family. Communication is practically non-existent and attempts at talking – develop into shouting. All right at home but impractical outside. He lives literally in his own little world.

I thought of him recently as I sat in the living room of my house, reading a novel. It was just after 7.00pm on an evening early in March. I suddenly became aware of a distinctive sound – outside the house – which I had not heard for many a year. It was repeated, my heart beat faster and my curiosity got the better of me. I went and stood outside the front door. There it was again – distinct and mysterious – short and sharp – the hoot of the owl - perched somewhere in the large fir tree on the opposite side of the road. I waited – and the call was repeated about four times – and I waited, delighting in the thrill and pleasure of the evocative and mysterious call. Then there was silence – and I felt strangely saddened and wondered when I would experience this again? I recall it still, as I write, and reflect how fortunate I am to have good hearing. My friend, Derek, would not have been so lucky.

As I stood outside my house, my eyes picked up the stars in the cloudless sky. They twinkled and sparkled in their thousands and, again, I experienced a thrill of wonderment. Because I have good eyesight I was able to see them and marvel at their beauty. But what must it be like for someone who, due to blindness, cannot experience this?

I found myself trying to identify with people who are deaf or blind. Even now, after a period of time has elapsed, I find it is not possible. Because I have never experienced the loss of sight or hearing, I can only imagine what it might be like. And yet does this fact make my any more appreciative of these gifts? Or do I take them for granted?

I have always experienced good health and kept myself fit. I enjoyed running and played a variety of sports. Then a couple of years ago I found that I was experiencing difficulty in writing. A year later, after various tests, I was told that I had Parkinson's. What did the future hold for me? How would I cope? What would be the effects of this illness? I am learning: medical diagnosis and tablets are preparing me – yet, in all honesty, I have to admit that I have still to overcome the element of fear that is present. I am also learning that taking good health for granted is perhaps very natural but not necessarily totally sensible. But I am determined to be positive. Life will go on and I shall

cope. Parkinson's affects people in different ways and I am grateful that, at the moment, it affects me in a mild way. But I do wish I could control the involuntary shake in my arm!

A final thought. It is all too easy to take people, as well as things, for granted. May we live in such a way that we value and treasure the gifts we have and give thanks for them.
