

Go 'Mohican' in 'No Mow May'

For me, this is a happy coincidence - giving wildlife a helping hand, whilst also feeling less need to conjure a perfect lawn. Conservation charity Plantlife is encouraging us to leave the mower in the shed for all of May and having a 'Mohican cut' lawn. What's reassuring is this wildlife-friendly time-saving initiative is backed by science.

Plantlife has released results of its citizen science project called Every Flower Counts. The study was the largest-ever

survey of the humble lawn. This study revealed not only the astonishing diversity of wildflowers growing on Britain's lawns, but also that simple changes in our mowing practices can benefit wildlife, resulting in enough nectar for ten times more bees and other pollinators.

Amongst many things, the study showed:

- the three most abundant lawn flowers were daisy, white clover and selfheal.
- across the country, all the surveyed lawn flowers combined produced a colossal 23 kg of nectar sugar per day, enough to support 2.1 million honeybees (that's around 60,000 hives),
- the highest production of flowers and nectar sugar was on lawns cut once every four weeks. This gives 'short-grass' plants like daisies and white clover a chance to flower in profusion, boosting nectar production tenfold,
- by contrast, areas of longer unmown grass were more diverse in their range of flowers, with other nectar-rich plants like oxeve daisy, field scabious and knapweed increasing the range of nectar sources for different pollinators and extending nectar availability into late summer,
- on average most lawns could support 400 bees a day, but 'superlawns', or those with lots of flowers, can support as many as 4,000.

This year, if you have a lawn, why not treat yourself and wildlife to 'No Mow May' and leave the mower in the shed for all of May?

Alongside this, think about having a 'Mohican Cut' lawn for the summer. This means having two lengths of grass. Leave some patches completely unmown to let taller flowers come into bloom, and then cutting these areas back in early September. For the rest of the lawn, keep the grass shorter by mowing once every month to a height of around one to two inches. This cutting regime supports the biggest range of wildflowers, and by consequence, insects and pollinators.

We are also all invited to be part of Plantlife's *Every Flower Counts* citizen science project for this year. Taking part is simple:

- 1. Leave your mower in the shed for No Mow May and let the flowers grow.
- 2. From 23rd May to 31st May take part in *Every Flower Counts* by counting the number of flowers in a random square metre of your lawn. Information on *https://www.plantlife.org.uk/everyflowercounts* shows you how to do this.
- 3. Enter your counts on Plantlife's website to get your Personal Nectar Score, which will show you how much nectar is produced by the flowers on your lawn and how many bees it can support.



Thornbury Men's Shed

With lockdown and the projected increases in unemployment, the need for Men's Sheds has never been more important. Red Cross research, 'Life after Lockdown and Loneliness' showed 41% of people polled said they were lonelier because of lockdown with 33% stating they had not had a meaningful

conversation in the last week. Recent evidence shows loneliness and isolation can be as hazardous to our health as obesity and excessive smoking. Surveys from mental health charities are finding that millions of people report feeling lonely on a daily basis. Men typically find it more difficult to build social connections than women. It is not the case for all men, but for some, when retirement comes, it can feel like personal identity and purpose is lost. Men's Sheds can change all of that.

Men's Sheds offers this to a group of such men where members share the tools and resources they need to work on projects of their own choosing at their own pace and in a safe, friendly and inclusive venue. They are places of skill-sharing and informal learning, of individual pursuits and community projects, of purpose, achievement and social interaction.



Our Men's Shed activities may involve carpentry, metalworking, bike repair, gardening equipment repair, electronics, tool renovation, model engineering and vehicle restoration.

Reclamation, reuse and restoration will feature strongly - then some say that is true of the men tool

Whatever activities are pursued, the essence of a Shed is not a building, but the

network of relationships between the members.

The Shed workshops are open for members on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9:00 to 17:00. An increase in opening sessions is envisaged. Thornbury Men's Shed, a not-for-profit local organisation, is financed by membership subscriptions and sales of repaired and recycled items. 

Spring: Arrivals and Departures

I think that one of the things that best marks the passage of the seasons is the wildlife we see in our gardens and surrounding areas. We are very lucky in this area to have such wonderful countryside which we can explore without the need to travel far. Whilst on a local walk in March I noted 16 different bird types. These included: Fieldfare, Pied Wagtail, Gold Crest, Green Woodpecker, Greater Spotted Woodpecker, Little Egret, Buzzard, Goldfinch, Bull Finch and Chiffchaff. Some of these birds were readying themselves for their migration back to their breeding grounds and some had recently arrived in this country to breed here.

Birds provide a very visible and audible sign for us as we move from winter into spring. We notice that some birds which were present in winter are no longer to be seen, whilst others such as the Chiffchaff have just arrived in the UK from southern Europe or North Africa. In spring, birds become highly active as they look to nest build and breed.

These photographs, which I have taken locally, feature just a few of the birds we can see in spring in this area. Birds which have quite possibly just made that long migration to be here or are about to migrate back to their breeding grounds.



The Fieldfare

The Fieldfare is a strong migratory bird and large numbers winter in the UK. They are a member of the Thrush family and can often be seen in large flocks arriving around October and departing in March. They rarely breed in this county. They migrate south to us from

Northern areas such as North Norway and Sweden.

Whilst seen mainly in trees, hedgerows and fields they will come into gardens in very cold spells to eat available berries and seed. This photograph was taken in my garden, which it claimed it as its territory, trying to keep away other birds such as Blackbirds and Blackcaps who were also trying to feed on the fallen apples and berries available. So, when food becomes short, they become very territorial, and scuffles can break out.

The Little Egret

This bird first appeared in the UK in 1989 and it numbers are increasing annually in the UK. It is a small white heron. On the south coast it is a breeding species and is mostly found around estuaries. You can also see them along the Severn estuary. I believe the one in the photograph - taken on The Common - is a winter visitor and has recently migrated to Europe as I have not seen it for several weeks now. Numbers of egrets wintering in the UK are

comparatively low just 4500 in the UK with roughly 700 breeding pairs in the UK. So, this bird which has spent a lot of time around the Common this winter is a welcome winter visitor.

The Chiffchaff

For me, the Chiffchaff marks the coming of spring where you are likely to hear the bird singing high in trees with a clear and distinct call 'Chiff – Chaff, Chiff - Chaff'. Unless it is disturbed you can clearly hear its call repeatedly for long

periods. It is a member of the warbler family and has bland olive-green plumage with buff underparts; it is very similar to the Willow Warbler however its call is very different. The Willow Warbler has an ascending and descending trill. It is one of the smaller birds approximately 11cms.



It is a partial migrant and those who do migrate to Southern

Europe or North Africa will depart in September and return in early March. Interestingly the male bird migrates to the UK up to three weeks earlier than the female and is the last to leave. It is possible you may see their nests. They build a domed nest for the first clutch of 4 to 9 eggs in April, made of dead vegetation and feathers close to the ground in tall grasses or bushes. You may also see them eating from the underside of tree leaves as they eat aphids, caterpillars and insects. They do move quickly from tree to tree so sometimes can be heard but are more difficult to see. The photograph above

The Goldcrest



The Goldcrest along with the Firecrest is the Britain's smallest bird weighing only 5.5gramms and 9cm in length. Despite its size, in European folklore it is known as the 'king of birds'. This being due to its scientific name R,regulus meaning 'king or knight'. Early ornithologists did not believe that this small bird could migrate from eastern Scandinavia crossing the North Sea as it was too small. They believed that they rode on the backs of Woodcocks or Short Eared Owls on their migration journey. A theory which is now,

obviously, dispelled.

Goldcrests are partial migrants and numbers swell considerably in Britain with birds migrating from eastern Scandinavia. Migrating Goldcrests arrive in Britain from late August to November, joining our native stock, and depart in March or April.

They are quite difficult birds to see but are very identifiable with the female having a gold crest across the centre of its crown and the male an orange crest. Once you can tune into their call, a very quiet and high pitched 'zi -zi -zi' and stay still you will hopefully see one. Their favoured habitat is pine or dense wooded habitat. They can also be quite inquisitive so, if you locate one, they may come reasonably close to you for a short period. This being especially the case when hungry following their migration journey. However, they move very quickly within and around trees. The photograph was taken in Harnhill.

So, these are just a few examples of some of the birds you may see locally, which either arrive, or depart, our area in spring. By the time you read this other very visible summer migrants will have begun to arrive, such as swallows, house martins and swifts. These will have made a very long migratory journey to our area from Africa. Let us hope the sun shines for them when they arrive!

Moving out of the city, he lived first in Alveston, then Thornbury and finally moved to Tockington in 1978. Soon after moving into the village Tony was seconded for two years to the Research Reactor Project at Halden in Norway.



This was a great experience and very interesting time for him and his wife Maggie. While there they both learnt to cross country ski which later proved useful in unexpected circumstances. He was Editor of Meeting Point from 1985 to 1987, during which time there was no Assistant Editor. In the bad winter of 1986 the local roads were impassable, but he managed to deliver the draft copy of the magazine to the Chairman by skiing from his home in Tockington to Olveston. The picture, left, was taken on that occasion.

About this time, he co-founded the Countryside Group with Ted Addis concentrating on two sites, Wild Acre Wood on the outskirts of Olveston and the lower reaches of Old Down Quarry. With willing volunteers, they cleaned up the

sites and planted many trees which continue to grow well to this day. The group eventually fell into abeyance but there is hope it might resume.

Tony has been a keen sailor and was Sail Training Officer for Thornbury Sailing Club for five years, initiating both youngsters and adults into the art of sailing on the difficult River Severn.

Tony and Maggie are keen cyclists and in 2009, with no backup, they cycled from Land's End to John o' Groats staying with friends and B&Bs, covering 1110 miles in three and a half weeks. In 2012, he was persuaded to join Thornbury U3A Committee, resulting in him taking on the role as Membership

St Mary's Church Tower Restoration Project Pete

Over the winter we have explained how the tower is to be restored and had hoped by now to have been able to give you a start date. But the pinnacles, the most complex and expensive part of the job, are far more eroded than had been expected - worse than any experienced elsewhere - due to being in the direct line of the prevailing winds straight off the Atlantic and coupled perhaps with many years of Avonmouth pollution.

So, to give the best possible performance for the very long term it was decided to use the finest and most expensive limestone, as used on Gloucester Cathedral, which comes from France. The combination of Covid and Brexit, means that we are not sure when the stone will arrive, though hopefully it will be here by the time you read this. Meanwhile, with all necessary action having been taken, the work on carving will begin once the stone arrives and, on the tower, once the scaffolding goes up. Watch the Tower!



The Thornbury Carnival committee has confirmed that the carnival, scheduled for Saturday 3rd July, will go ahead - although attendees should expect changes to the event's format. Some Local Geology

Hamish Orr-Ewing

Anyone looking at the geology map of this part of the country would be struck by the kaleidoscope of colour which reflects the large number of rock and soil types in the area. In fact, Bristol and its surroundings, probably has more varied geology than any other region in Britain. Most people take it for granted - or don't even notice it - as it is all around them and always has been. Yet local geology has shaped our lives, whether it be the type of house we live in, the availability of water supply, the type of farming that can be carried out or the presence of mining and guarrying.

Some of the earliest rocks in the area are the mountain limestones which you can see in the Avon Gorge and the Mendip Hills. They were formed about 280 million years ago as coral formations in shallow seas. They are slightly soluble in acid rainwater which gives rise to cracks and fissures which eventually enlarge to form large caves such as those at Wookey Hole, If the water reevaporates out, the limestone is redeposited and tends to form the calcium carbonate 'glue' which makes rock rather than a granulated soil. Much of Olveston sits on grey limestone, and you can see it peeping out of the highway verge in Denys Court (see below) as well as in exposures in many local quarries.



Of course, it is the stone from which most of the early village buildings are constructed. Nowadays most of the market for guarried limestone is for roadstone and concrete aggregate. The limestone which was originally laid down horizontally was later affected by subsidence and horizontal pressure and was squeezed into giant corrugations. The 30° dip on the limestone face in the Avon Gorge is evidence of the massive scale of the movements involved.

Towards the end of the carboniferous limestone era, the climate changed, and land surfaces became heavily forested swamps. Successive layers of organic material built up in what is

now known as the 'coal measures.' These were later eroded back to the limestone in the Olveston area, but further west they remain in a band from

Cromhall down to Syston and formed the basis of Bristol's coalmining industry which worked coal from 1250 to 1968.

In the Olveston area the eroded limestones were overlain by Triassic mudstones, which have remained as horizontal strata to this day. The most recognisable feature of the material is that it is red, due to its high iron content and this has given rise to many local placenames such as Redcliffe, Redland and Redfield in Bristol. The Triassic strata was formed approximately 180 mission years ago in desert conditions and may vary from sandstone, loose sand, mudstone to clay. The clays are used for brickmaking and hence the presence of a clay pit and brickworks on Over Lane. This was originally set up to provide millions of bricks for the construction of the Severn railway tunnel, but the business continues to this day.

Where the Triassic overlays the limestone, it has filled up the limestone fissures and penetrated areas of limestone scree weathered from limestone cliffs. This gave rise to another rock type – conglomerate, which looks like a pink concrete with grey limestone aggregate. Occasional lumps of it can be seen in the St Mary's Church boundary wall on Church Hill, contrasting with the grey limestone of the remainder. (Not a geological matter – but of interest - this wall is capped with blue coping blocks which were cast from molten slag which was a by-product of the once thriving Bristol brass industry.)

The triass is in turn overlain by lias clay strata of a yellow/grey colour. Within that there occur isolated layers of fossil-bearing limestones. The best place to view this is either side of the first Severn Bridge, where the cliff face shows a neat section. The beach below is littered with fossils from the limestone layers, particularly after heavy rain and freezing conditions. If you take children there, armed with bucket, hammer and safety goggles, you will be guaranteed to find fossil shells and even some bones.


Tel 01454 851545 Mob 07715 705670 The last geological period since the ice-age has involved substantial sea-level rises as the ice began to melt, and this is still ongoing, being given an additional recent nudge by manmade global warming. As the sea rose, rivers backed up and silt was deposited over the previously eroded land surface. The depth of silt at Avonmouth is over 80ft, showing that the Avon Gorge was originally much deeper. The silt formed flat flood plains either side of the Severn as far as Gloucester and beyond. It extends to the foot of Church Hill in Olveston and can be viewed by walking on Catherine Hill. Left to its own devices, this area would be flooded by the higher tides each year, with a little more silt being deposited each time. However, man has intervened and constructed a flood embankment which extends from Avonmouth to Gloucester. The addition of rhine drainage has allowed the former marshes to be turned into agricultural land. Anyone walking at Whale Wharf may observe tidal flotsam which has, in places, be deposited within inches of the top of the embankment, suggesting that raising it is long overdue.

This first week in May is Christian Aid week, when we will be thinking about the climate chaos in Kenya and how we can help people access life-saving water. Global warming is increasing and having devastating effects on the whole planet. The most damage is done by CO₂ in the atmosphere and to combat climate change we need to reduce and remove it. The most powerful weapon we have are trees, they can capture and store carbon for centuries. We need to plant more trees and protect existing forests.

Trees also play a major and important role in the Bible used figuratively and literally to help us understand God, the creator of the world. "Ever since the creation of the world his eternal power and divine nature, invisible though they are, have been understood and seen through the things he has made" (Romans 1: 20).
