# Remembering Frederick Addis of Olveston Nick Feat

When I first saw the illuminated brass memorial to Frederick Addis in St. Mary's Church Olveston, it struck a chord as it mentioned that he had been a member of the 12th Battalion of the Gloucestershire Regiment, known locally as 'Bristol's Own'. My own grandfather Henry Fear had died from wounds serving in the same battalion, although in 1916 two years before Frederick's untimely end. Bristol's Own had been a Pal's Battalion raised in 1914 and made up of volunteers from Bristol and its surrounding villages. Its exploits with honours became the stuff of legends, filling the local press with stories, and men became proud to be associated with it.

Looking at his story, I discovered that Frederick, who had worked as a correspondence clerk for the local council pre war, had joined Bristol's Own and was attached to D Company as part of Headquarters Staff. As with several of his comrades, however, before the battalion went to France he was tempted away as a prized trained man, to perform duty elsewhere. As an inducement, this usually meant a promotion. Frederick had already been a Lance Corporal, but he was made up to full Corporal and found himself serving in Princess Charlotte of Wales's, The Royal Berkshire Regiment.

In April 1918 the Germans launched their last major offensive of the Great War. They called this after Germany's patron saint, Saint Michael, but the allies came to regard this as the Kaiserschlacht, The Kaiser's Battle. Frederick found himself in the region of the River Somme in France, in front of the small town of Albert. The Germans attacked in force and desperate fighting, much of a very personal nature, took place. Reserves were sent in to try and stem the attack, by which time over fifty per cent of Frederick's battalion were casualties. At the end of the day the tally was that over 243 men had been killed, wounded or were missing. Frederick was amongst the casualties and his mortal remains were never found. Records state that he was just thirty years old.


Today Frederick is commemorated on the imposing Poziers Memorial to the east of Albert, not far from the battlefield on which he fell. His name is one of 14,656 names on memorial walls which surround a cemetery containing the mortal remains of 2,758 men. Frederick may be amongst them in a grave marked for an unidentified soldier, 'Known only to God'. He may equally still lie at peace in the field on which he fell.

After the war when his family commissioned his plaque in St. Mary's, the fact of his service with Royal Berkshire Regiment, seems to have been omitted. Perhaps like so many local people, they were proud to record that he had been a member of 'Bristol's Own'. Frederick, I feel, would have approved.

## The Garden Line

Although one may feel that November is the end of the gardening year there is much to be done. A lot of clearing up is very necessary to keep the garden looking trim and neat.

If frosts have blackened the green tops of dahlias then now is the time to lift them. Cut off the tops leaving about 5" of stems. Stand them upside down in the greenhouse, conservatory or shed until all moisture has drained away and tops are completely dry. Shake off surplus earth and pack in a dry box with layers of peat or straw between the rhizomes. Cover with either newspaper or sacks, not polythene. Through the winter examine frequently to make sure there is no rot, cut away deceased parts with a sharp knife and dust cuts with flowers of sulphur. Don't forget to label your dahlias, colours, heights, singles or doubles.

If weather is suitable, get on with digging, especially if the ground is heavy. Winter frosts will break it down and also a dressing of lime  $\frac{1}{2}$  lb per square yard will hasten the process.

Spare a crown or two of rhubarb for winter pies. Lift crowns very carefully, taking care not to damage the centre. Pack into a large box with moist soil between the crowns, place in a dark cool place in greenhouse or shed. Young shoots will appear in a few weeks.

For an early crop of broad beans, sow this month in a sheltered part of the garden. Sow two rows 7" apart and 6" between seeds.

Complete the planting of tulips and hyacinths. Under glass, keep an eye on bulbs in pots, don't overwater.

If weather is still reasonable, hardy perennials grown from seed can still be planted in the flowering positions, otherwise best wait until March.

Don't overdo the digging, a little at a time is wise and I'm sure much more enjoyable. You may be planting trees this month. If so, consider your neighbours; spreading roots and branches can cause trouble.

### Aust Parish Council Matters

Towards the end of September, the clerk went on a litter picking expedition south of Whale Wharf to the old railway van, not for the first time. I doubt if Beachcomber had such an interesting haul. An unopened tub of Tesco Value Butterly, a baker's plastic bread tray, an old bucket, a shoe, a couple of dozen plastic bottles (some with original fizzy contents), glass bottles, sweet wrappers, the inside of a car door and all sorts of bits of plastic. What a mess. A lot of this stuff comes on the tide but much is also dropped on the bank.

Perhaps the prize item was a plastic bag containing dog faeces, carefully wrapped and left on the bank for a cow to eat. Why don't people take the stuff home?

At the October meeting, the Council decided to show its support for the OWAG campaign with a modest contribution to its funds. Councillors noted the height of the balloon flown by the group, and were very concerned about the implications for Aust parish as well as Olveston. The Council also discussed the nuisance of commuter parking in Aust village, and will be seeking ways to alleviate this, and also the status – and state of disrepair – of the slip road from the tunnel end at Manor Farm, Aust, to the B4461.

Councillors recently met with representatives of South Gloucestershire planning department at the Greenacres site; the Parish Council is continuing its pressure for the unsatisfactory state of the site to be rectified.

The Council also adopted its new Code of Conduct as required by the Localism Act, and amended its Standing Orders to take account of those changes. Copies of these will be available on the Council's pages of the Olveston and Aust website.

Firstly I must apologise to all those eager to see the War Memorial Steps renovated in time for this year's Remembrance Day Service. Unfortunately the Parish Council has had a few issues with the contractor, and concerns over completion dates have forced the Council to postpone the work until March or April 2013 (weather permitting). On the positive side, last month's 'Parish Council Matters' has elicited some donation promises and we would welcome any further support.

The first meeting for the Parish Vision Steering Group is now to be held at 7:30pm on 16th November in Olveston School Hall (rather than Friday 26th October as previously advertised) and hosted by Ms Val Hudspeth (01454 600992), all welcome.

The Steps and the Parish Vision are just two of a number of interesting projects that the Parish Council is currently involved in. A further project (that can't be postponed) is to seek alternative ways to extend the graveyard at St Mary's. The graveyard is filling up, and current predictions indicate that there is only enough space for another 5 to 10 years. Alternative/ additional sites therefore need to be urgently identified, whilst the Parish confirms what the actual requirements are. So if you have any land that maybe suitable, please could you contact the clerk or any of the councillors.

### 350 Years of Dissent in Thornbury

Our local museum's autumn exhibition explores aspects of the history of a non-conformist church group in a small market town over three and a half centuries.

The members of this church 'dissented' from the prevailing Anglican Church of England in 1662 and still do so today (although their relations with current Anglicans are extremely amicable!). The exhibition traces the church from its origins as an Independent/Presbyterian group, through its transformation to a Congregationalist Church and finally to the modern-day Thornbury United Reformed Church.

For its first 56 years, this dissenting group had no building of their own in which to worship. The exhibition will reveal where their original chapel was, from 1718 until it was demolished in the 1960s. You can also find out about the first minister of the current chapel, who disappeared in 1827 - with £15 of chapel funds! - and about his successor, who travelled widely to raise money to pay off the chapel's debt. Jesse, the father of Handel Cossham, is buried in the URC churchyard, just over the road from the museum. Find out more about him too.

### Village person - Eddie Woodward

Eddie is an endangered species – one of few people born and bred in the parish! He lived with his parents on The Common in Olveston in a cottage rented from the Organ family who owned Church Farm. They lived first in the first house on the left, and then when his grandmother needed looking after they moved to her cottage, the last one on the right – Eddie doesn't know their names, nobody bothered with names eighty years ago!

He had one day at the small school at the top of Old Down Hill called Weston's, but was so unruly his parents were told not to bring him again, so he waited until he was five to start school in Olveston! Actually he says he didn't have much schooling because he was working on the farms.

He was born in 1932 so was seven when the Second World War broke out, and he received his blue card. There was a very urgent need to grow the nation's food and, with so many men away fighting, school children in Olveston were given blue cards. This enabled them to do a day's work on any farm that needed them, and was signed by the farmer before they returned to school

Eddie left school at fourteen and helped his dad who was a timber cutter for local saw mills and sold firewood, until he started working at Thornbury Saw Mills. This was situated behind Pullins Green, and there is still a road called Saw Mill Lane. At eighteen he went into the army to do National Service, which he spent in this country as a driving instructor. When he came out, he returned to the saw mill where he drove a caterpillar tractor and went out with hauliers felling trees in order to load their lorries.

He then found a better job at what was Harnhill Quarry, just outside Olveston on the road to Aust. He drove dumper trucks and excavators for a few years then graduated to their first eight wheel lorry. The quarry had a concrete plant and a tarmac plant and Eddie would get up at 4am, mix the tarmac and then deliver it all round the country. Many journeys were to Wales, where he would often bring back a load of granite, as some tarmac was sometimes mixed with it in preference to limestone. He later moved in to the onsite garage as a fitter.

When Eddie married his wife Iris they lived in a caravan on her father's land off Elberton Road and their daughter Yvonne was born while living there. Later when their son Michael was born they moved to Mill Lane, where Eddie still lives forty years later. He remembers calling in for a gallon of petrol, (one hand-operated pump where Powells the butcher now is), and five woodbine

cigarettes from the shop opposite run by the blacksmith, for 2s 1d - I convert that to roughly 15p!

So much has changed in Eddie's lifetime. Harnhill Quarry has long been filled in, but interestingly he recently met a retired colleague who had been recalled to help with water removal. The quarry always needed pumping when it was working and now water is still coming in and lifting the infill, so his colleague is back working three days a week because he remembers how to work the pump.

Since being retired fifteen years ago Eddie has kept his hand in doing odd jobs, including maintaining the church lawn mowers. Sadly Iris died three years ago, but Eddie is more than capable of looking after himself. He makes sure he has a cooked meal each day, and the ironing I saw was impeccable! He looks out over fields from the front window, and enjoys the wild life which includes a couple of falcons that perch in an apple tree opposite.

## Yours Faithfully

This month we commemorate all those who have died in conflict throughout the world – on Remembrance Day we remember all those who have given their lives for the peace and freedom we enjoy today.

Part of my work involves caring for people whose lives have been touched by the loss of a baby before or just after birth – through miscarriage, ectopic pregnancy or stillbirth.

I have a friend who works in a Hospice and is surrounded by people who are terminally ill and supports their families and friends.

Most people have themselves or know someone who has, one way or another, experienced this sort of personal tragedy. Grief is a horrible, terrible thing but it is what we feel when someone we love dies. There are so many emotions mixed up in it – shock, anger, guilt, longing, pain – and sometimes people say there are times after a death when they feel there is nothing worth living for.

As we search for comfort in times of tragedy, suffering and loss, the Bible gives us profound pictures of compassion in the life of Jesus. For example, in John Chapter 11 Mary and Martha come to Jesus following the death of their brother, Lazarus. We are told that Jesus was "deeply moved and wept". Jesus was a man who knew loneliness, abandonment, and grief of all kinds - the night before He died must have been a long one - He knew full well what He was facing and the way He would die. As He died on the cross He felt that God had deserted and abandoned Him, just as many people do when they are grieving.

However, the death of Jesus was the beginning of our hope. For Jesus death wasn't the end of the story – God showed His power over everything, including death, by raising Jesus from the dead. That gives us the hope that there is much more to come, beyond and in spite of death.

Romans Chapter 8 assures us that "nothing, not even death, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Jesus our Lord". In the darkness and pain that comes with grief we can cling on to that promise – God is with us - grief does not have to be a lonely journey.
