


Olveston War Memorial

This month the country commemorates all those who have given their lives in the 1st and 2nd World Wars and subsequent conflicts. It also gives us an opportunity to think of those who have fought, or are fighting on our behalf across the World.

It is easy to imagine, when the War Memorial was first erected at St Mary's Church nearly 100 years ago, how the junction adjacent to the White Hart looked without the raised pedestrian walkways, and five steps focussing up to the War Memorial. Since then, the lowest steps have been absorbed into the footpath, causing a tripping hazard and damaged by vehicles negotiating the junction. The steps too (made from locally mined sandstone) have been badly ravaged by the elements and breaking up, causing health and safety concerns as well as being an eyesore.

Despite changes to both the Parochial Church and Civil Parish boundaries since the War Memorial was first erected, Olveston Parish Council has retained responsibility for its upkeep, and two years ago agreed to undertake necessary repairs. Given the presence of the pedestrian walkway, the Parish Council decided to keep any redesign within the curve of the existing churchyard walls and to add a further step, to ensure the War Memorial was easily accessible from all sides.

Whilst replacing the steps with single stone blocks was considered, it proved to be very expensive, and so the Parish Council (in conjunction with the contractor Country Developments (Bristol) Ltd) identified stone and cappings that they felt were in keeping with the colour and style of surrounding buildings, whilst endeavouring to ensure that the result would last as long as the initial steps.

Financially, the Parish Council sought funding from a variety of national bodies, but without success. Instead the Parochial Church Council and the Parish Hall Management Committee kindly made donations and, together with realistic costings, the Parish Council was able to fund the recent work.

The Parish Council has since been grateful for many positive comments about the refurbishments, and hopes to arrange for the monument itself to be properly cleaned in time for 2014 commemorations of the start of the Great War.

The Mystery of St Mary's Great War Crosses Nick Fear

Against the rear boundary wall of St. Mary's churchyard are two well crafted wooden crosses of similar design. One is inscribed; 'To the memory of A.W.L. Turner of the Ceylon Planters Rifle Corps, severely wounded Gallipoli 1914 – 1918 war. Died at Wickwar 29th December 1964. Aged 73 years'.

Its neighbour reads; 'In memory of Captain F. McL. Mitchell 18 Hsrs, 2ndLt. K. L. Turner, 325233 Cpl. E. Richardson, Worcester Yeomanry. Killed in Action 2.5.18.'

Arthur William Lindsay Turner, born in Nottinghamshire, worked as a tea plantation manager in Ceylon. As with many planters, he joined a local militia in 1907 and, at the outbreak of war, transferred to Ceylon Planters Rifle Corps for active service abroad. He initially found himself defending the Suez Canal against Turkish attacks alongside Australian and New Zealand Forces. In April 1915 his corps went ashore with them at Anzac Cove on Gallipoli. After five days under fire he was shot through both thighs which necessitated him being evacuated for treatment. Sadly his injuries were so serious that they resulted in him having his right leg amputated. To a lesser man this would have ended his war service, but Arthur returned to England, took a Commission in the Royal Artillery to command an anti aircraft battery. He returned to Ceylon at war's end.

Captain Frederick McLellan Mitchell, a Londoner, was a member of Cambridge University Officer Training Corps. He took a Regular Army Commission with the 18th Hussars at the outbreak of war in 1914 and rose through the ranks. In 1917 he was awarded the Military Cross for gallantry in the field.

Second Lieutenant Kenneth Leigh Turner was born in Nottinghamshire and in 1901 took an overseas posting as a Police Officer in South Africa. He served in a mounted militia there, but returned to England in 1917 to volunteer for the army. Giving his occupation as a rancher he joined the Kings Royal Rifle Corps but was soon granted a Commission, transferring to the Cavalry.

325233 Corporal Edward Richardson from Leeds joined the Worcestershire Yeomanry at the outbreak of war. He was promoted after basic training and went to Egypt along with his regiment in 1915.

On the 2nd of May 1918 the Worcestershire Yeomanry and other units were fighting in the Jordan Valley area of Palestine. Holding a line near the village of Es Salt, they were ordered to make an attack on a hilly crest above. Intelligently led by Captain Mitchell the assault proceeded single file in the cover of a wadi. The shelter soon ended and the war diary records the mountainous and strong nature of the countryside over which the troops advanced. At first the uphill struggle went well and was unopposed, but then about 30 Turks were seen approaching the ridge above from the east, 40 more on a neighbouring one. Both sides were intent on reaching the highest point in the area. Speed became essential and orders were received to advance to the objective by the most direct route. Half the force moved onwards leaving the rest as a supporting rear guard. About 150 yards from the summit the leading troops came under shell fire. They then had to move to the right to avoid precipitous cliffs, allowing the Turkish troops to pour accurate rifle fire on them and then on the rear guard. It became impossible to advance further and all troops had to retire to hold their original lines. At roll call it was discovered that 11 men had been wounded, and sadly Captain Mitchell, Second Lieutenant Turner and their Corporal Signaller, Edward Richardson had been killed. Due to the location and fortunes of war the three were buried with care nearby, but after Armistice moved to the tranquillity of Jerusalem War Cemetery where they still occupy the same grave.

The connection between the two Olveston crosses? Research shows that Arthur and Kenneth were brothers. It seems fitting that the three Worcestershire Yeomanry men are mentioned on the same Olveston cross, as they shared the same fate and graves. However, it begs the question as to why are they placed where they are?

Immediately in front of the crosses is the grave of Charles, Isabella and Diana Turner, who lived in Old Down. Charles Edward Turner had served with distinction in the Great War with the Royal Gloucestershire Hussars Yeomanry, rising to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. He had fought at Gallipoli and in the Middle East and was the brother of Kenneth and Arthur. Was it he who had the crosses placed so near to the family plot? Parish records may provide a fuller answer as to their siting, but some memorials seem complemented by an air of mystery and this may be the case with the two crosses. The names of 38 men are recorded on St Mary's war memorial; I believe that they would approve of the commemoration of the four comrades in arms remembered in the same churchyard.

The Parade is always well supported by the village and we look forward to seeing you there again this year.

Pat was born in Ferbane, Co Offaly in Ireland, one of six children. They had a happy rural childhood and were convent educated. When she was sixteen her father's job moved him to Oldbury Power Station and the family relocated to Bristol. At this point she found herself in a mixed sex city comprehensive - quite a change.

She must have adapted well, as after three years she left to become an articled clerk in a Bristol firm of accountants. There she met her husband Roger; they married in 1975 and lived at Claverham. Sadly her mother died two years later. A year later Roger's father died, at which point they moved to Thornbury to be near his mother.

While Roger remained with the Bristol firm, Pat started her own accountancy business in Thornbury when the first of her four sons was a year old. She says she was never a 'domestic goddess'; running her own business enabled her to work around childcare. They had a 'wonderful' girl who looked after the boys for ten years. In 1990 they bought their present house in Olveston. In 1992 Roger joined Pat in the business which was then in Thornbury High Street, and in 2008 they relocated the business to Olveston.

Being so busy with children and her own business Pat had limited time to be involved with village activities. She did, however, join Olveston and Tockington Tennis Club. In 2006/7 June Robbins suggested that she become treasurer of the Parish Hall while John Jones was Chairman and later Geoff Chappell. This year Geoff stood down and Pat took over. During Geoff's tenure the hall underwent a complete overhaul and is now a very desirable venue for many activities including weddings.

Pat is keen to see more community events take place at the Hall; the recent Jazz Evening and Harvest Supper being good examples. The next event will be the Fish and Quiz evening on Saturday 23 November.

The Hall now has a number of regular bookings including U3A Film Society; black out blinds are being fitted to give a more cinematic effect! A very lively Table Tennis Club meets on Monday mornings, with the WI continuing to meet every alternate Tuesday. Those wishing for a more energetic work out can join the Zumba classes on Wednesday evening; dancing classes are on Fridays.

Parking around Olveston School

Further to the article in September's *Meeting Point*, Olveston Parish Council is pleased to report that the community parking area on the verge near the allotments on Aust Road is now available for use. The footpath from the parking area to Elberton Road has been levelled and covered with wood chippings to help maintain it.

The police will now be enforcing parking restrictions around the Elberton Road/Aust Road junction. They will be issuing warnings to drivers who park within 10 metres of the junction, with fines for repeat offenders for 'unnecessary obstruction'.

The aim is to ease congestion around the junction at school times.

Now the parking area is operational, road users should avoid parking anywhere on Aust Road itself (even if further than 10 metres from Elberton Road), and instead use the parking area on the verge. This is to avoid pedestrians stepping out from parked vehicles into single lane traffic that has poor visibility.

The next step to improve road safety around the school will be a consultation by South Gloucestershire Council in the next few months, regarding a 20mph speed limit near the school and time-limited parking restrictions near the church to improve visibility in that location at school times.

Cook's Calendar: November

Scrumptious Sausage Casserole with Cheesy Mash

As the leaves fall and the evenings chill, I long for a log fire and something warming. This casserole is

just perfect for bonfire night; you can prepare it in advance and pop it in when you return, feet numb and the smell of wood smoke on your hair. Serves 6.

1 tablespoon of sunflower oil

12 sausages (I use Powell's breakfast sausages)

6 rashers smoked streaky bacon, chopped into small pieces

2 medium onions, chopped

2 garlic cloves, chopped or crushed

1 teaspoon paprika

2x 500g cartons of tomato passata (or used chopped tinned tomatoes)

300ml chicken stock

1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

1 tablespoon dark brown sugar

½ teaspoon dried thyme

2 bay leaves

350g red lentils

For the topping:
6 large potatoes
150g grated Cheddar cheese
100 ml milk

1 teaspoon Dijon mustard Salt to taste

Heat the oven to 180C

Heat the grill and then brown the sausages, watching to ensure they do not explode. They do not need to be fully cooked at this stage.

Heat the oil in a large lidded casserole then add the bacon pieces and brown, setting to one side when they are done. Add the onions to the pan, adding more oil if necessary, and soften over a gentle heat. Add the garlic and cook,

stirring frequently, for another couple of minutes until the onions are beginning to brown, then add the paprika.

Stir in the tomato passata, stock, Worcestershire sauce, brown sugar, herbs and lentils. Add the sausages and bacon, cover with a well-fitting lid and cook for 30 minutes in the preheated oven.

While this is cooking, peel and chop the potatoes, then boil until soft enough to mash. Drain and mash with the milk. When the mash is smooth I usually use an electric whisk to make the mash light and fluffy. Stir in the grated Cheddar, allow to soften in the hot mash then add salt and mustard to taste.

If you are going to eat the casserole straight away, spread the mash on top of the sausage and lentil mix and put back in the oven to crispen on top. If you intend to eat it later, allow both the sausage mix and the potatoes to cool before layering the potato, as it's easier to spread when cold. Heat thoroughly before eating with delight.

South Gloucestershire Council has launched a consultation on a Policies Sites and Places Plan to set out planning policies in rural areas. The plan, once made, will supplement the Core Strategy. It is intended to cover:

- new polices to be used to decide planning applications in the area;
- identification of new "development" in the area such as shops, community facilities, employment;
- whether there is a need for small scale housing development in villages.

This is clearly an important consultation, and the Parish Council will be holding a special discussion on it at the start of its November meeting. Community Archaeology in Action

The latest temporary exhibition in our local museum displays the results of a community archaeology project in South Gloucestershire. SCARP (the **South Gloucestershire Community Archaeology Project**) was a Heritage Lottery Fund initiative to get local people involved in their historic environment by providing them with training, skills and ongoing support in archaeological techniques. Volunteers in local communities throughout the area were trained in the use of non-intrusive techniques, such as earthwork, geo-physical and building surveys. They also worked hard on documentary research of historic sites. They researched prehistoric, Roman, medieval, and Tudor and post-medieval sites, including industrial heritage locations.

The museum exhibition incorporates a travelling display put together by the SCARP project and shows the range of different sites investigated and the finds that were made. The exhibition also contains some of the museum's own material and contributions from our local Finds Liaison Officer, Kurt Adams. "Humility in Thanksgiving"

I am sure that you have come across people who have an aversion to particular annual events in the calendar. Some may not look forward to Christmas. Others may not like the passing of another year and find New Year celebrations misplaced. My own pet aversion happens to be harvest thanksgiving. This is clearly not a good position for a Christian leader to find himself/herself in, bearing in mind that the core of the event is thanksgiving to God for His generous provision. I have therefore wrestled on a number of occasions with my attitude and have struggled to explain it to others — including my own fellowship at Old Down. Indeed, I have considerable sympathy with them as they try to understand my position, since I have struggled to understand it myself.

As I have sought to come to terms with my apparently irrational position, I have found myself continually vexed by my knowledge of the inequalities of food distribution across the globe and the wastage that occurs here in the West. Unsurprisingly, the US tops the availability charts at 3,770 kilocalories per capita per day. Most of the West, including the UK, is in the "3,000+ club". At the other end of the scale are the African countries which come in below 2,000 kilocalories per capita per day. As I researched the data further, I was shocked by the fact that Eritrea came at the bottom of the table at 1,590 kilocalories per capita per day. The shock was not that Eritrea should be at the bottom, but that my discovery of this fact came in a week which had seen the capsizing of a ship in the Mediterranean carrying many Eritreans and in which at least 114 were killed with hundreds more still unaccounted for.

Now, I am not proposing for a moment that food is the only reason for mass migration. The on-going stand-off between Ethiopia and Eritrea is used as the justification for a regime which is as autocratic as North Korea's. Nevertheless, we have to ask why the migrants are not content to remain elsewhere in Africa, but flee to Europe for a 'better life'. Equally, I am not proposing that there is an easy answer to the food distribution question. My difficulty is only with celebrating the goodness of God to us here in the West, while we, as a society, are willing to waste so much and watch others struggle without. Perhaps a harvest time of fasting and prayer would be a better option than a harvest supper. I am reminded of the parable that Jesus told about the Pharisee who prayed 'God I thank you that I am not like other men.......' (Luke 18:11). We need to be humble in our thanksgiving.
