


The Great War comes home to our Parishes. Nick Fear

War had been declared on the 4th of August 1914. Men connected with our area had said their fond goodbyes and gone to fight. Reports in the local newspapers had been grave although most of the places mentioned were formerly unheard of, foreign and seemed very far away. The war had not yet come to the local villages and hamlets but the images must have been in the minds of some who had found themselves writing home from 'Somewhere in France'. Many had been professional soldiers whose expertise could not be bettered and none more so than the officers and men of the county's much loved Gloucestershire Regiment, our 'Glosters'.

The 1st Battalion, to many the finest one in the regiment, had been in action from the start. It had taken up positions near Mons in Belgium in late August and heard the sound of severe fighting nearby. Probing patrols had come into contact with a much stronger German force and the first casualties had occurred. The Glosters' prowess prevailed and the Germans were routed. A sensible and well planned withdrawal took place and over several weeks battalion perambulations saw it visit several locations and cover many miles.

In late October it found itself transported near a picturesque town called Ypres. Its buildings were magnificent, with a towering trading palace, the Cloth Hall, next to the gothic structure of Saint Martin's Cathedral. Both were cool contemplative places through which the sounds of battle, then some distance off, reverberated. The streets seemed deserted and many homes evacuated although some innocent pleasures existed and the local population were more than friendly.

On 21st October orders came to move east along the road to Menin. At first a sheltered position was taken in a valley behind the small railway station in the village of Langemark. News came that the Worcestershire Regiment were in the area and a battalion of Welsh troops. The local connections to Gloucestershire must have been reassuring.

For the next few days the German positions had been reconnoitred; these had been static, but getting too close resulted in the discharges of accurate rifle and machine gun fire from them. On 31st October the situation changed and became critical, when the Germans mounted a determined attack on British lines.

The Worcesters and Welsh were in action in the village of Gheluveldt. The 1st Battalion of the Glosters moved to their rear to cover them. They took positions astride a small crossroads, with deep ditches providing sound cover and a good forward view. A few houses to one side awarded it the local name of Veldhoek but it was barely a hamlet by any standards. For good measure the 1st Battalion built a barricade across the main road, blocking access down it. Orders were then received to move back a few hundred yards towards Ypres to the cover of a wood.

On the following day there was a slight respite, allowing men to clean equipment and cook a good meal. German troop movements were observed and shelling occurred to the front.

On 2nd November the battalion moved further back to a place called Sanctuary Wood, although this was no haven. The men saw a Belgian armoured car in action on the Menin Road and also cavalry going forward although neither stayed for long. The Germans shelled the area with high explosives and in particular the aptly named 'coal boxes'. These large destructive shells burst in the ground and showered the area with a black residue like coal dust, which clung to uniforms and skin. The circumstances of the day meant that confusion reigned, with rumours of German breakthroughs and unfortunately some of our own artillery shells falling short, causing casualties.

Through all of this, an attack was ordered and the 1st Battalion went bravely forward under fire, only to return to their starting point without making contact with the enemy. A roll was called and several men were found to be absent; some were known to have been killed, others simply missing. One of these was Charles Durnell from Littleton-on-Severn. He had worked in the local brickyards before joining the Gloucestershire Regiment prior to the war. Fate bestowed on him the sad epithet of being the first local man to be killed in the Great War. He has no known grave and is remembered along with friends on the mighty Menin Gate at Ypres.

The news of Charles's death would have taken days to return home; the effect on his large family can only be imagined. On 17th November the toll increased with the sad news of Charles Watts George from Oldbury on Severn being killed in battle. Nine days later the first man from Olveston, William George Edwards died from his wounds received in action. The war may have been fought far from our area, but the heart-breaking results had come home to haunt our parishes.

Littleton event in remembrance of the Great War

Littleton decided to have a WW1 themed Village Challenge event this year, as it is the centenary of the opening of hostilities. The challenge involved 3 teams and several games with fancy dress, potato peeling, artillery (with spud guns) and casualty evacuation across a simulated trench. There was also a poetry competition on the WW1 theme and there were some outstanding entries. All the poems and a beautiful poppy made from the fancy dress headgear are on display in the Village Hall. We'd like to share with you the winning poem from Jan Major.

I was dreaming last night of summers long past When I was a boy, running free, running fast Through field after field to the stream where I could Paddle and splash, and build dams with the mud. Playing for hours then home for my tea, Then bath, some cocoa and bed for me. Now I'm a soldier at war, living in mud It's filthy, it stinks, it's streaked with the blood Of the wounded, and those who are dead. I can't stop the visions running round in my head Of the fighting, the screaming, men dying in pain I want to be that boy by the stream again. Looking for water voles, not seeing rats Running over our legs, some big as cats Bold as brass, whiskers trembling, eyes gleaming We shoot some and hit some but still men are screaming With revulsion, with horror, we can't take much more Our bodies are failing, our hearts are sore. In my dream the mist's rising from the heat of the sun Warming the fields so that boys can have fun

But then a shout wakes me – "On with your masks!"

It's not mist we can see, but poisonous gas

Silently rolling like a wave to the shore

Oh when will they tell us what it's all for?

Why is George killing Hans, why is Kurt shooting Fred?

By the end of it all there'll be thousands dead

I hear mothers' cries, I hear widows' screams

Shattered lives, shattered minds, shattered dreams.

A hundred years on will the world be the same?

Was it worth being pawns in the Generals' chess game?

If we can raise £15,000 it will provide a brick built centre for the community for health education, education, the ladies sewing group, a church and all sorts of community uses. We're doing it through a local Christian charity, the Bridge Trust, based in Almondsbury, so you can be sure that all the money raised will go directly to the project and none will be squandered along the way. Olveston Parish Council Matters

Flyers placed on telegraph poles are tolerated on the understanding that they are for local, singular events and that the flyers are removed promptly after the event. In future, please could organisers delegate an individual to ensure that the adverts are removed promptly.

Recently Olveston Parish Council has been discussing **Community Land Trusts** with South Glos Council, St Mary's Parish Church, the Parish Vision Group and local land owners and is to hold a **public meeting** at **7.30 pm** on **19**th **November** at the **Parish Hall** to open the discussion to all residents.

Community Land Trusts (CLT) (www.communitylandtrusts.org.uk) are non-profit, community-based organisations run by volunteers that develop housing, workspaces, energy generation, community facilities or other assets that meet the needs of the community, and are owned and controlled by the community. CLTs are defined in Statute as a corporate body laid out in Section 79 of the Housing and Regeneration Act 2008.

A CLT is set up by the community and for the community. The members of the CLT control it and the assets can only be sold or developed in a manner that benefits the local community. If the CLT decides to sell the asset, the cash realised is protected by an asset lock and is re-invested into something else that the trust's members think will benefit the local community.

People who live and work in the defined local community, including occupiers of the properties that the CLT owns, must have the opportunity to become members of the CLT. The CLT should actively engage members of the community in its work and ensure that they remain engaged in the development and operation of the CLT.

All CLTs are not for profit and any profits generated by the CLT cannot be paid by way of dividend or otherwise to its members but must be used to further the community's interests. A CLT does not disappear when a home is sold or let but has a long-term role in stewarding the homes. In some cases they will remain the landlord of the rental homes or will retain an element of unsold equity in the homes. At the least, the CLT will retain the freehold, endeavouring to keep the homes or assets at permanently affordable levels.

Progress with the Olveston Parish Vision

A thank you to those parishioners who came to the Drop-in Event in the Parish Hall to see progress with the Parish Vision and offer comments on emerging ideas.

On display were posters setting out issues which were identified through last October's Community Questionnaire and possible actions to address them. There were posters about local shops and services, internet services, community facilities, travel and transport, housing, traffic and parking, the environment and street lighting, flooding, and communicating issues and events in the parish. Copies of the posters may be viewed on the Olveston Parish Vision website – www.olvestonparishvision.co.uk

The Vision Group is now digesting what people have said and is starting to pull together the final Vision Document. This will include an action plan with actions for South Gloucestershire Council, the Parish Council, and not least to be taken forward by the community itself. It is hoped the process can be completed early in 2015. A draft of the Vision Document will be placed on the Vision website offering an opportunity for further comment.

One emerging idea to help provide some local needs housing and protect key services for the parish is to set up a Community Land Trust (CLT). The Parish Council is organising a public meeting to be held in the Parish Hall on 19th November to provide more information about CLTs and to gauge public support and seek a mandate to proceed further. The clocks have gone back, Halloween has come and gone, and the dark days of winter have arrived. It's time to clean out and fill the bird-feeders, help the birds and receive the pleasure of their company.

The members of the tit family will become frequent visitors if you care to put

food out. The two commonest are the blue tit and the great tit. Some have asked why the smaller of the two is called the blue tit when its body is yellow. You have to look at its head to see the sky blue markings. Interestingly the birds themselves can see ultra-violet light and so for them their heads shine as a mark of fitness and good health. The larger bird is the great tit which is identified by the black stripe that extends down the breast. Males and females can be told apart by the bolder, broader stripe in the

males whereas in the females the stripe is less well defined and thinner.

The coal tit is a less frequent visitor and, in my experience, does not like to linger at the bird feeder; it's more likely to grab and go and is therefore easy to miss. Some say the pattern of black and white on the head reminds them of a badger and certainly it's a good identifier for the bird. Look for its yellow breast with a peachy hue along the line of the wings and listen for its 'pitchoo' call.

Finally, look for the long tailed tit which is an infrequent visitor to the bird table.

This bird prefers to roam the hedgerows in families of around ten birds and so can be found during those long winter walks. Mostly black and white, with touches of brown, it's easily recognised by the colour and by its long tail. Often the first clue is its high pitched 'zsi-zsi-zsi' call. If you see one, look for the others for they are bound to be there. And, to repeat a tip from a more experienced birder, always look around below the long tailed tits as they provide excellent cover and warning for

different small birds that prefer to skulk along undetected.

Autumn slides into winter this month. Now is the time that much of our wildlife starts to plan ahead for spring.

Fox vixens will be searching out suitable places for an earth, ready for cubs in the New Year. They will look for up to three sites. Then if one is disturbed she will gather up her cubs and move them to a readymade new home.

Atlantic salmon gather in the estuaries to swim to the very place of their own birth to spawn. They will perish shortly after laying their eggs in the gravelly river bed following an arduous journey which often takes weeks.

Grey seals will actually be giving birth at this time of year, their furry white pups clinging to the rocks around our shores through the autumn storms. They grow quickly with their mother's fatty nutritious milk, shedding that snowy fur within two weeks and joining mum in the water after just a couple of months.

Even rooks stay by their rookeries this late in the year, maybe keeping an eye on their nests and planning any improvements for next spring. Of course others decide to just hunker down and dream of warmer days. A nice leaf pile is all that's needed for hedgehogs to settle in for their winter sleep.

We still don't know where many of our pipistrelle bats roost in winter, as numbers in summer far exceed the number of hibernating sites. Bats also mate in the autumn, but the females will 'store' the sperm and not become pregnant until next spring!

From Olveston to Aleppo: Olveston Parish in the First World War

Everyone is invited to hear Eric Garrett talk about the results of his researches into Olveston's part in the First World War.

Tonight is also the occasion of the launch of his new book on the subject, 'From Olveston to Aleppo'.

In the book, besides describing life on the home front, he traces the journeys and experiences of the local farmers who made up the Oldown Troop a hundred years ago, after they found themselves shipped to Egypt with their horses. Eric describes, in a matter-of-fact way, how, in the years that followed, they found themselves not only subject to aircraft attack, shellfire, rifle and machine gun fire, but at the mercy of sandstorms, locusts, heat



exhaustion, rain and mud, very cold temperatures, malaria, influenza, diarrhoea, scorpions and snakes. A personal dimension is provided; three members of Eric's family were in the Troop.

We're in Olveston School Hall for this meeting because we're expecting a larger than usual turnout. Make a note in your diaries - and remember to bring £6, if you'd like to buy a copy of the book!

Avon & Somerset Search and Rescue Team

In Avon and Somerset we have our own search and rescue team. Manned by volunteers and available 24hr a day, 365 days a year, the team responds directly for the police.

Why do we have such a team? The simple answer is that we have the highest cliffs and areas prone to flood and that is sufficient justification on its own. The team has recently been used in searches for missing vulnerable people, helping the evacuation of Northmoor during the recent flooding, assisting members of the public to safety from potentially hazardous locations and recovering bodies. There are a variety of skills within the team but the basic ones are searching rough and /or steep ground and being able to evacuate any casualties safely to definitive medical care. Did you know, by the way, that most of the things being searched for are found by a backward glance? There is a big difference between searching and looking.

The team is aware of the needs to preserve evidence if the emergency is likely to require a criminal investigation. However there are extra skills within the team and these include technical expertise to enable cliff rescues and also swift water and flood rescue which is becoming ever more relevant.

The area ASSAR covers is 1855 square miles with a population of 1.5 million. The team members are based all over the area ensuring they can respond wherever and whenever they are needed. As part of the national Mountain Rescue organisation, the team has close links with the Exmoor Search and Rescue Team, SWAST, the Coastguard the Search and Rescue Helicopter Service, currently run by the military, the various air ambulances and with the Hazardous Area Rescue Team of the ambulance service.

This wide range of activities requires a considerable amount of equipment; radios, computer mapping, ropes (and very long ropes too for Cheddar and the Avon Gorge/Clifton Suspension Bridge), technical gear for allowing hoisting or lowering of rescuers and casualties, vehicles to transport this equipment, dry suits and the associated equipment for flood and swift water rescue and stretchers of different types. The list is extensive and that excludes the personal gear that team members buy for their own use such as safety helmets, harnesses and the like. There is regular monthly training and regular training beyond this for the specialist teams. All this requires

volunteers who are prepared to make this sacrifice of time and money. Being a voluntary charitable organisation, the team rely completely on the good will of those who support it financially and materially.

Hugh Price, a local Team Member says: "We're very proud of the way we can help people that are far from help in our area. We search for and rescue the unwilling and unable, the despondent trying to take their own life or the person with mental health problems who is confused and lost. It's a hugely committing role but immensely rewarding."

"Life's too short?"

Last weekend I found myself watching the Formula 1 Japanese Grand Prix where the weather conditions were particularly adverse. Although the safety record within Formula 1 has improved immeasurably since the "bad old days" of the 1970s and early 1980s when fatalities were unacceptably frequent, the sport is not without its risks. Owing to an unfortunate series of events resulting from the adverse conditions, one of the drivers – a talented Frenchman, Jules Bianchi – was involved in a collision with one of the recovery vehicles attending to a previous accident. At the time of writing, Jules Bianchi's condition is viewed as 'critical but stable'. When Jules Bianchi woke on the morning of the race, I doubt that he, or anyone else, foresaw the condition in which he would end the day – hanging onto his life.

This example made me think of his, and our own, motivations in life. Obviously, Jules Bianchi was, and hopefully still is, a very gifted driver. It was his ambition to reach the pinnacle of his pursuit and become world champion. However this ambition may now never come to fruition. It challenges us to think about our own motivations and ambitions. Although expectations from our lives will vary considerably across the population, often depending on early experiences and opportunities, we can never be certain that they will be fulfilled. While average life-spans are increasing, none of us can be certain about tomorrow. We therefore need to hold on to our objectives and ambitions lightly. This is equally important if we are to live a balanced and fulfilling life throughout its phases.

For the Christian, the perspective is a little different. When an earthly life is apparently cut short, it does not represent the end, since the guarantee for the believer is everlasting life. This changes the outlook on ambition. When writing to the Philippians, the Apostle Paul talks about "pressing on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus". In other words his ambition was in the eternal realm. This takes pressure off of having to fulfil his ambition in his lifetime. That said, Paul acknowledges in his letter to the Ephesians that '....we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.' The implication is that God has pre-ordained those things that he wants us to achieve. So Paul was comfortable that God would leave him 'in place' for as long as necessary, while realising that 'to be with Christ is far better'. For Paul, life was never too short!
