

Wed. 4th Oct. 2017

A short and painless AGM, followed by Meg Wise giving an illustrated talk about the Thornbury Castle builder's rather dangerous love of advertising his high-status lineage: **Heraldry and Symbolism at Thornbury Castle**. (See below.)

Wed. 1st November 2017

Our very own Eric Garrett will reveal the inside story behind **Olveston United Football Club**, **1926 – 1976**, from its earliest days when Colonel Turner of Old Down was their patron. If we're lucky, the illustrations will include the speaker (in his younger days) in football kit...

Wed. 6th December 2017

Nick McCamley will delve into **Secret Underground Cities**, the vast underground places in Britain which housed factories, arsenals and government control bunkers. These will include the 2 million sq.ft. Spring Quarry underground aircraft engine factory at Corsham and the Wiltshire quarry which housed treasures from the V&A and the British Museum.

Wed. 3rd January 2018

Jennifer Bone and William Evans will be revealing what's known about **Sir Samuel Astry, Lord of the Manor of Aust**, and his part in the Glorious Revolution of 1688, when James II was ousted from the throne. Sir Samuel Astry held the position of Clerk to the Crown at the Court of King's Bench from 1677 for 27 years, under 4 monarchs, remarkably retaining his position through a time of political and constitutional turbulence. He was a significant local landowner.

Wed. 7th February 2018

Helen Thomas will be sharing with us some of the results of a project to record oral histories from workers at the Wills factory, in a talk that has been recommended to us called **The Bedminster Tobacco Women.**

Wed. 7th March 2018

Dr. Cathryn Spence, former Director/Curator at the Building of Bath Museum and now Head of Communications & Research at Bath's American Museum and a historical consultant for the National Trust, will share some of the

goodies from her latest book: **The Story of Bath.** Expect illustrations you haven't seen before and some unfamiliar tales from 2000 years of Bath's history.

A Dangerous Path to Tread?

Olveston Parish Historical Society: all welcome.

Wednesday, 4 October 2017, 7.30pm, Olveston Methodist Church

Take a look at this Tudor coat of arms. Looks almost fit for a king, doesn't it? Henry VIII perhaps?

But this magnificent piece of heraldry didn't belong to the king. It was created by the builder of Thornbury Castle, the 3rd Duke of Buckingham, whose claim to royal lineage was better than Henry's own.

Buckingham was flamboyant in the size and splendour of his household and his building works and was especially ostentatious in his display of the heraldry relating to his noble ancestors. He used many heraldic badges, several of them emphasising royal ancestry. Did this help lead to his execution on the orders of Henry VIII?

In a beautifully illustrated talk, 'Heraldry & Symbolism at Thornbury Castle', Meg Wise will share her fascinating detective work into the dangerous path trodden by Edward Stafford, Duke of Buckingham, when he flaunted his ancestry in this ostentatious way.

Open to all. A brief AGM will precede the talk. Make a note in your diary or calendar now. An annual membership fee of £8, payable on the night, gives entry to the whole season of seven talks from October to April. Alternatively, £2 to attend a single meeting, payable on the door.



Going Round in Circles

Those of you who read the August edition of Meeting Point will have seen the interesting news that a train was to stop and allow passengers to board at Pilning Station for the first time in many, many years. All this being due to the efforts of the locally based Pilning Station Group (PSG) http://www.pilningstation.uk

For the uninitiated, a bit of history may be worth recording here. The original Pilning Station was opened in September 1863 and was a stop on the ill-fated Bristol and South Wales Union Railway, running from Temple Meads to New Passage where passengers then boarded the ferry to Black Rock. In 1886, with the opening of the Severn Tunnel, a new Pilning station was opened and the branch to New Passage was used only for freight purposes, but in 1900 the GWR connected the New Passage line to the Severn Beach line, providing an alternative route for heavy freight trains to travel from Avonmouth to South Wales (if you drive slowly by the incline to Pilning Station you can still see the remains of the railway level-crossing on the lower route.) There is insufficient space here to go into much more detail, but older readers may remember the car trains that ran from Pilning High Level to Severn Tunnel Junction, the only alternative to the Aust-Beachley ferry before the first Severn Bridge was built.

During the 1970s a regular commuter service to Bristol and Cardiff ran from Pilning High Level, but following privatisation of the railway system the services gradually reduced until only two trains per week ran, one in either direction. In November 2016 the powers that be decided to demolish the Pilning station footbridge, ensuring that only eastbound (towards Bristol and onwards) services could call at Pilning, at 08.35 and 13.34 each Saturday, making any meaningful journey almost impossible. The latest (2015/16) passenger figures for Pilning were 46, hardly surprising given the appalling service provided by the First Group Great Western Railway Co.

Following a PSG request to First Great Western, it was agreed that on a one off basis on Sunday 20th August the Cardiff to Taunton service would stop to pick up passengers at Pilning at 10.41. Part of the reason for choosing this service was that the weekend musical event at the nearby Plough PH was due to close on the Saturday night.

On a bright and sunny Sunday morning 28 people found themselves on the Up platform at Pilning waiting for the train to stop. Some were festival-goers returning from the event at the Plough Inn and locals from the Meeting Point area included John Oates and family, and Richard Lloyd and myself – we had both left a car at Severn Beach as getting back to Pilning was made impossible by the railway company.



At 10.41 the train duly arrived and we all clambered aboard, some to spend the day in Bristol, others travelling to destinations unknown. The friendly ticket collector/guard was clearly bemused at the influx of Pilning passengers, but was soon busy issuing tickets to us all.

Richard and I had a cunning plan, for we both claim to be authorities on railway timetables, and having arrived at Temple Meads some 18 minutes after boarding the train, crossed platforms and caught the 11.23 to Severn Beach, passing through Montpellier, Redland, Clifton Down, Sea Mills, Shirehampton and Avonmouth before arriving at Severn Beach at 12.02. Driving from Severn Beach to Pilning took ten minutes, and our circle was completed. We celebrated our adventure by downing a pint of Wadworth's 6X at the nearby Plough. What a very fine way to spend a Sunday morning!

The objective of the exercise was to raise Pilning passenger numbers, with a view to providing evidence to the railway authorities that the station is viable if a proper service was to be offered, which would include the re-building of the passenger footbridge, the re-opening of the Cardiff bound platform and a tidyup of the station yard to allow car parking to take place once more.

For those of you wishing to help with this objective, I can recommend the following trip, which I now do regularly on a Saturday morning: cycle to Pilning Station, put the bike on the train and take the 08.35 to Temple Meads, then catch the 09.16 to Severn Beach, arriving just before 10.00 (cost with an old codger's railcard is £4.15). Then treat yourself to an excellent bacon sandwich and cup of tea in the café situated by the shops, followed by riding along the sea wall to New Passage with beautiful views across the Severn, turning right into New Passage lane, then using the cycle path that avoids Pilning and brings you out by the White Horse at Northwick, (all main roads avoided), before cycling home via Greenditch Street and into Olveston/Tockington. An alternative to this plan would be to catch the 13.34 from Pilning (NB Saturdays only) which would have you passing the White Horse in time for a pint or two!

St Mary's CHAT Group

What you might ask, is the 'CHAT' group? Well, a decade or so ago church people wanted wider discussion than was available in ordinary services. So two members of the congregation, Sue Farr and Les Slaytor, with the support of the late Roly Bain, began CHAT (Come Here And Talk) which has continued ever since, with Sue's gentle guidance.

CHAT is a group of 20 or so, of whom 6-9 on average, meet in each others' houses to discuss a wide range of subjects which we have chosen for ourselves, not all of them by any means 'churchy'. Some recent subjects have been "Could we look after ourselves better or should we leave it to the National Health?"; "What do your clothes say about you?"; "What will our grandchildren think of our decision to leave the European Union?" and "Does religion provoke violence or peace?" and at our next meeting we shall discuss "Is there a solution to mass migration?"

Sounds pretty serious? Well I suppose it is, but CHAT is always interesting; gets side tracked pretty often; is sometimes quite funny - and seldom comes to a conclusion!

At our last meeting we discussed "What purpose does the church serve in our society and how has that purpose changed over time?" In discussion over an hour and a half, we felt that the church's message has remained the same and there is no shortage of those with a Christian ethos which is being delivered in many different ways in the churches and chapels in this parish alone, though its historic concern for education and welfare, vital to the community, has mostly been taken over by government.

Whilst these changes have been taking place, people who used to come to church now have a wide range of other things to do and church attendance has generally declined. We felt sure though, that the eternal questions that religion seeks to answer would remain as relevant to people as they have always been and that changes are taking place in both services and buildings to make them more attractive and relevant for today's people.

If that sounds like a conclusion, it must be the nearest we have ever come to one, since we always end the evening with a "bring and share" supper around our host's table where the CHAT goes on until our departure at about 10pm.

Tracey at Clean Cut

It is not often these days that the profiled subject is born and bred in the Parish, but this month she is. Tracey Walters started life with her parents in a static caravan at the home of her grandparents, Bernard and June Trott, in Catherine Hill and, after her family moved to Patchway, she spent all her holidays there, and is at present in the process of buying the house for herself.

She went briefly to Olveston School but most of her primary and secondary school career was in Patchway. When she was starting the fifth form, the family moved to Brynmawr, South Wales, and she attended Nantyglo Comprehensive School. The family moved back within the year but Tracey stayed on with a friend to take her GCSEs. Back in Patchway, she had the choice of staying at school or getting a job. What she really wanted to do was join the RAF as a medical assistant, with a view to qualifying as a nurse. However, you needed to be seventeen and a half to do that. So she enrolled at Brunel Technical College to train as a hairdresser on the YTS (Youth Training Scheme), earning £17.50 a week, later £25.50, of which her mother took £10 for housekeeping. Then she met a boy so decided to give the RAF a miss and has worked as a hairdresser ever since.

In 2001 she took over Clean Cut which had been closed for some time so she had to build up the business again. In 2005 she left to have her daughter Imogen, followed by a second daughter, Grace, and only returned to Clean Cut in 2013. All this time she was living in Aust, but sold her house last year. She points out that Clean Cut is not her business; she is employed by Chris Curtis who owns the property and has known Tracey since she was a baby.



She is the eldest of six children who were never allowed to watch

television in good weather and were then expected to play outside. She has many happy memories of her childhood, from plucking Christmas turkeys for Mrs Pearce at Port Farm, rabbiting with her uncle Pete, haymaking with John Crier and fishing for elvers in the River Severn. A group of families built a jetty at Littleton Pill to float a speedboat at high tide and as a child she learnt to swim in the river there and slide down the mud banks! This horrifies her children today and of course would not be possible anyway since the flood

defences were built. In the summer holidays she went on holiday with the Pearces, driving down to France.

While between houses she is living in Patchway, but with all these happy memories of a country childhood, it is the reason she wants to move back to Olveston for Imogen and Grace to enjoy the freedom of the countryside.

Emily's Sailing Success

Aust Parish Council Matters

Blakedown Site at Elberton

This application has been granted. The parish council's main concerns were over landscaping and drainage and the proposed roof materials. The permission reserves approval of materials and the roofs are to be of traditional materials, not zinc, and the walls of natural stone. The drainage plans are also reserved for final approval.

Whale Wharf

The owner of Whale Wharf had apparently given a charity – Incredible Kids – permission to store equipment at Whale Wharf and was reported in the Gazette to have given permission to use it for their activities. Some concern has been expressed about whether this would be in accordance with the current planning consent and about the potential traffic implications.

Local Government Boundary Review

The Boundary Commission has published its draft proposals about the wards to make up South Gloucestershire Council in the future. I have written about this before. There is a consultation period until 6 November 2017, and, when it has reviewed comments, it intends to publish its final conclusions in January 2018. Subject to parliamentary approval, they will take effect in May 2018.

The main proposal is that the number of Councillors will be reduced from 70 to 61. This will require the redrawing of ward boundaries. We are now in Severn Ward, which covers the parishes of Aust, Oldbury-on-Severn, Rockhampton and Hill. The proposal is to amalgamate these parishes with Almondsbury and parts of South Thornbury and Alveston to create a two member ward. This means that our parishes would have two councillors, who would also both cover the whole of the rest of the ward.

South Gloucestershire Council's 61 members would be elected by 8 three councillor wards, 15 two councillor wards and 7 one councillor wards. You can see the detail of these proposals and comment at: *consultation.lgbce.org.uk*.

New M4 junction

There is another consultation to inform a feasibility study into options for a new motorway junction, 18a, to link the M4 with the A4174 ring road. It will run until 16 October and everyone with an interest in the new junction is encouraged to have their say by completing a survey. See: *southglos.gov.uk/M4J18a*.

"Truly I tell you, unless a seed of wheat falls to the ground and dies it remains only a single seed; but if it dies, it produces much fruit" (John 12:24)

This month our churches will celebrate the Harvest Festival. In a rural community many of us make our living from agriculture, and we are all dependent on farmers for the food we eat - even though modern life rather insulates us from that reality.

While I am a soft-handed townie, all of my family on my mother's side are farmers. My uncle is still working his wheat farm in Lincolnshire at the age of 75! I have seen first-hand his anxiety as the rain eats into harvest time, and his fear that he will never bring in his crop. Farming can be a tough and stressful job.

So it is right to meet and give thanks to God for His provision, and to pray for those who work so hard to produce it for us.

Yet for Christians the whole harvest cycle - from sowing to reaping - is also a powerful metaphor for the life of Jesus.

In the short quote above Jesus is not giving a science lesson on germination, but what he says makes sense. If a seed falls into the ground and 'dies' then from that seed comes a crop that can eventually become part of the harvest.

Christians have come to see these words as a prophecy he made of his own death and resurrection. His body was 'seed' that entered into the cold and dark of the tomb, (the 'ground') and then rose to new life. Christ's resurrected body was both the same, but also entirely new...just as a wheat plant is different from its seed. Furthermore through his Resurrection, over the past two thousand years, billions of people have come to faith in Jesus, (the 'fruit').

Just to reinforce that point Jesus was crucified just before the Passover, and the disciples received the gift of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Both were Jewish harvest festivals: Passover when the 'first fruits' were presented, and Pentecost when the main harvest was gathered.

I hope you will come along to one of the harvest festivals at our local churches. We should never lose our connection with the land, even if, like me, all you really do is walk alongside it and appreciate the hard work that goes into the cultivation!
